FRONT:

This has just begun to get going. A package has been drawn up and people have been trained in presenting it to other orgs. The package itself is a general overview of ECC. The most important aspect of our presentation will be the way we facilitate workshops with the orgs around ECC, affiliation and what it means. This is #1 priority for ECC this term.

CONCEPTUAL DISCUSSION:

At a day away held at the beginning of the term we began our discussion around our direction and future. We started off with an input from town on ECC's history, which was periodised in the following way (same as CT's starting point and fairly CT-centric): 1- the local launch up until Nov. '84 (including a few decades leading up to our formation); 2- Nov. '84 to mid-'85 (our national launch); 3- after festival to June '86 with the declaration of the state of emergency; 4- from the SOE till the present. We looked at all the "phases" in terms of our aims, form, content and our constituency.

The process from here was to try and draw out the lessons learnt from our history and to take that further. It was felt that this was a useful starting point for our discussion and that a group should be set up to co-ordinate the process from there. It was decided that we would use the structures that already exist and thus the education group has been extended to work out the

MORALE:

Towards the end of last term our morale was fairly low, mainly due to campus action, exams etc. Our assessment, identifying the problems and beginning work on solving them, definitely increased our morale and we began this term optimistically. Numbers have dropped somewhat, with between 20 and 30 people attending GB's. Our plans for work around Namibia, building our front, our SRC candidate and discussion around our direction have definitely all helped to increase our morale.

NATIONAL:

The little time our NO spent with our exec and co-ordinators of subcomms was incredibly useful. We're looking forward to having him/her to ourselves for a while...PLEEEEEZE!!

Our biggest problem is that most of our membership don't feel as though they belong to a national organisation. However, the national media went down very well on campus- it was distributed at the Dakar reportback meeting and thus fell into the hands of a very broad spectrum of people.

National Conference- people are very excited but we have not had very full discussion around it as yet.

INTER-REGIONAL CONTACT:

The joint projects in the campaign created the space for a lot of contact between branches, but since the campaign, contact has been very sporadic with town and non-existent with Stellies. There has been a problem with our contact with town not going through the correct channels, but this has been sorted out with the hope of having regular joint exec meetings and regular

8. GENERAL OVERVIEW:

- workshop around meeting procedure etc., came up with a framework for running successful meetings which has been very useful.
- frontwork has been prioritised and is getting on the road.
- the Namibian war to be a small focus and we'll probably be working jointly with NANSO on some activities. Our plans so far are: T-shirts; article in VARSITY and student viewpoint in the Cape Times; some kind of focus on UCT radio, possibly in the form of an interview with a Namibian; a film on Namibia combined with some sort of input; statement posters; possibly an ECC speaker if NANSO hold a mass meeting.
- subcomms are looking into their roles outside of campaign work, in a more creative way.
- we're putting up an ECC candidate for the SRC to take on the Conscription Advice Service portfolio on the SRC. We are hoping to have extensive profile for ECC through our candidates campaign.

So, all in all, we are feeling very optimistic about the general day-to-day workings of our organisation and are feeling like we have finally found our feet and know now more or less what we're doing. (Security has been neglected 'cos there was nothing to report on.)
