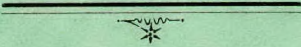

BRIDGMAN MEMORIAL HOSPITAL.

Report of the Board.

The Hospital has completed its first year of service without the guiding hand of its founder, Mrs. Bridgman, who resigned a year ago at this time, and left for America on furlough with but little expectation of returning. We are glad to introduce her in her new capacity as Honorary Life President of the Hospital, a title that was conferred upon her by the Board at the time of her resignation. If the Hospital has been able to carry on without noticeable impairment of its organization or service it is due in large measure to the state of efficiency to which it had been brought under her leadership on the side of plant, equipment and organization. The impetus given the Hospital by her will not be lost.

Dr. Lennox.—With sad hearts we miss amongst us at our Annual Meeting our late Secretary, Dr. John Lennox. For two years he had given to the work of Honorary Secretary the same meticulous care, the same complete devotion, the same high standard of efficiency that has marked his work in his many spheres of service to the African people through forty years of very active missionary life. We miss his cheery smile, his friendly word, his wise counsel, his gracious personality, a graciousness rooted in the divine Grace. We rejoice in a life lived to full fruition. He rests from his labours and his works do follow him.

Up and Onward.—The Report for 1939 records that “the year was one of quiet steady progress. There was no new building, no new large scale equipment.” The same may be said of 1940. But the second sentence in last year’s Report “It was a year when the already provided building and equipment were used with ever increasing approach to full capacity” is also true of 1940. That being so our blessed state of adequacy could obviously not continue long. The Minutes of the Board for the first meeting in 1940 record that the attendance at out-patients for October-November of 1939 constituted a record. The top figure was 1,147. The number

of out-patients for February, 1941, was 1,398. The previous record had been exceeded several times in the intervening months. The breaking of records for numbers in the Out-patient Department is no longer news.

The total admissions of in-patients in 1939 was 2,721. In 1940 it was 3,014.

Early in 1941 the pinch of outgrown accommodations began to be felt. There must be additional accommodation for a new European sister. Then it appears that the labour wards are insufficient and on some occasions deliveries have actually had to be accomplished in the wards. We must turn the operating theatre into labour wards and provide a new theatre. With more labour wards more native probationers will be necessary requiring further nurses' quarters. The Board is therefore faced at the moment with a scheme for the erection of a new operating theatre and sterilizing room outside the present building but connected by corridor with it, and nurses' quarters under the same roof. The architects are working on the plans.

Midwifery Training.—In view of the importance of the Midwifery training work of the Hospital it is worth noting that the Hospital has purchased a very fine set of anatomical models which will greatly facilitate the teaching of the necessary amount of anatomy. It is gratifying to note also that the grant from the Native Affairs Department for the training of Midwives has been increased from £10 to £20 each per annum. The number of pupil midwives now in training is 24.

The Hospital and the War.—Thus far neither the work nor the income of the Hospital has been seriously affected by war conditions except for the greatly increased prices of essential supplies. Just now, however, we are faced with the possible temporary loss of our faithful and efficient Matron Matheson, who has volunteered for military service. If she does actually leave us we shall certainly feel like a war casualty until we have had time to make the necessary convalescent adjustment.

Street Collection.—For the first time the Hospital has been granted the privilege of a Street Collection which will take place under the direction of Mrs. Wagstaff on October 25th. We trust that all our friends will enter that date in large script in their diaries.

Vacancies in the Board.—The Board records with regret the loss from its membership by resignation since last Annual Meeting of Professor J. M. Watt, Mrs. L. Noble and Mrs. E. A. Sargeant and from the House Committee of Miss B. G. Alexander. It is probable also that Rev. S. S. Tema who has taken up duties as Secretary to the Christian Student Movement with residence at Fort Hare will be unable to serve on the Board. To each of these friends the Board extends hearty thanks for very valuable services. These resignations together with the death of Dr. Lennox who was a member both of the House Committee and the Board leave us much depleted. Some nominations will be submitted for your acceptance at the Annual Meeting. We are glad to record one valuable accession in the person of Mrs. Ray E. Phillips, who is already assisting in the work of the House Committee.

Staff Nurse.—Staff Nurse Millicent Titi was found in November to be suffering from tuberculosis and she was admitted to the T.B. Hospital at Rietfontein where she still is. Nurse Millicent had been with the Hospital for two years as probationer and five years as staff nurse. She had given splendid service and this interruption to her career is keenly regretted.

Finance.—Further attention is called to one or two features of the Hon. Treasurer's report. A new record has been set up for the amount of patients' fees collected—£3,512. It speaks well for the honesty and self respect of the African people and for their appreciation of the Hospital's services. It should be noted also that in spite of the higher cost of medicines and other supplies the average cost per adult in-patient per day is actually less than last year 6/8.2 as compared with 7/3.8 for 1939. We must anticipate capital expenditure for building in 1941 of something near £2,000. We shall therefore require the continued support of all our friends.

Thanks.—The thanks of the Board are here recorded to all the members of the Honorary Staff and the Relieving Staff whose names are recorded in the Report of the Medical Superintendent. The Board wishes to express its appreciation to Dr. Carlisle and Matron Matheson and all the members of their resident staff, both European and African, both professional and domestic. The fine co-operation of all has made the work of the year go smoothly and has ensured its being well done. The professional staff has at times worked under great pressure.

To our Hon. Treasurer, Mr. J. Montague Pim, the Board is indebted for his careful handling of the finances of the Hospital and his ever reliable advice on financial matters. The Board endorses heartily the Treasurer's words of thanks to all to whom we are indebted for grants and for donations, also to those who contributed toward Christmas cheer, and for the Christmas visit of His Worship the Mayor and the Lady Mayoress, which was all too brief through no fault or wish of theirs.

A special note of thanks is due to our Honorary Auditor for again auditing our accounts.

Once more we record our thanks to all those ministers, European and African, who have conducted the religious services, especially to Rev. Henry Nawa, our Chaplain, who conducts divine service for the out-patients every Wednesday morning.

To Mrs. Bridgman we send our most affectionate greetings, and we pledge our best efforts to the continuance and development of the work so dear to her heart.

Annual Report of the Medical Superintendent

For the Year ended 31st December, 1940.

The statistics for the year ended 31st December, 1940, still show a further increase on those of 1939.

In-patients returns show an increase of 243 on those for 1939, and in the Out-patient Department an increase of 1,722.

During the year eight pupil midwives sat for the South African Medical Council's Examinations in Midwifery and four passed.

We would wish to thank our Honorary Consultant Staff for all the help they rendered to us during the year, and I wish to express to Matron, the European Nursing Sisters, Dr. Altschul, Miss Rogers and Miss Goulden, and to our Native Staff Nurses my sincere thanks for their willing co-operation in the running of the Hospital during 1940.

In May it was with heavy hearts that we said "Bon Voyage" to Mrs. Bridgman who has left us to make her home in the States. She was always most keenly interested in the practical working of the Hospital and though on the other side of the ocean her thoughts are definitely felt to be with us, especially was this so on Christmas Day when Matron presented the usual gifts to the patients. We hope that Mrs. Bridgman will be very happy with her family and enjoy many years of happiness with them.

Honorary Treasurer's Report, 1940.

In 1940 there is no expenditure on increased accommodation to report, but the Accounts show that the Hospital has been exceedingly busy utilizing its accommodation to the full. Hospital fees paid by In-Patients increased by £148 to £2,016 and those paid by Out-Patients by £167 to £1,474. Both the total amounts of fees paid are records.

Our Annual Donations are reduced by £117, which is less than we feared they might be owing to the tremendous demands on the public in these times. We were able to transfer £1,500 to the Reserve for Depreciation. This Reserve now stands at £4,811 or almost 20% of the cost of our Buildings and Equipment.

The Grant-in-Aid from the City Council of Johannesburg is now £1,000 per annum, for which we are extremely grateful. Our income this year shows that we have received £1,125 from this source, but that is only because the financial years of this Hospital and the City do not coincide. We are also very grateful to the Native Development Fund of the Union Government for the sum of £790 towards the training of Native Nurses and to the Provincial Administration of the Transvaal for the continuation of its Grant of £1,500 a year. Finally we must thank our Donors and Subscribers for their continued support and our patients, not only for paying their accounts so well, but also for telling their friends about the Hospital and what it can do.

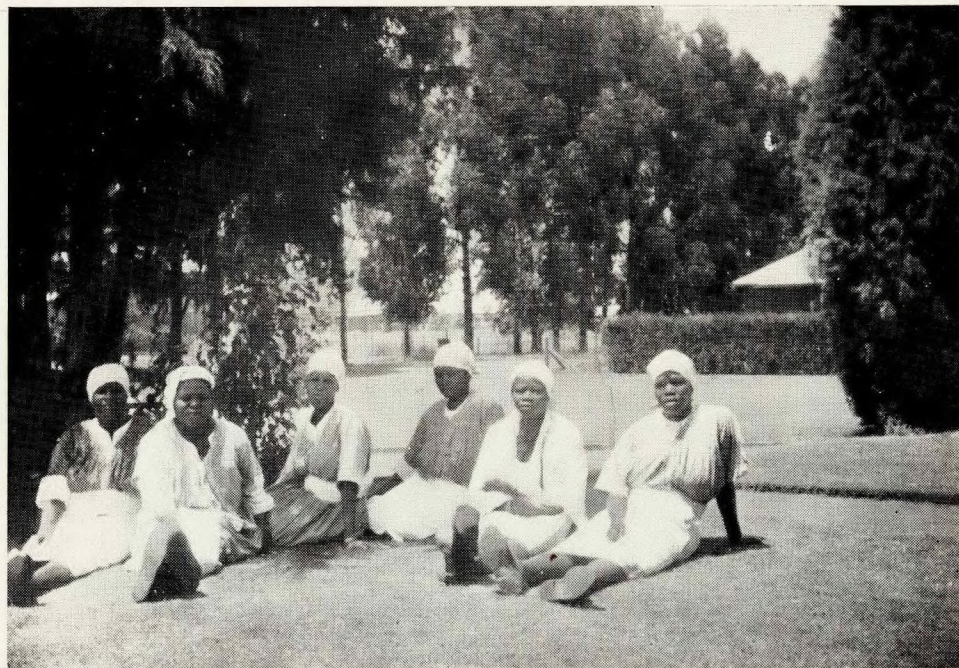
