## DEATH OF COUNCILLOR XINIWE

Councillor Bretram Buxton Xiniwe who died last week at King-Williamstown, was born in 1886 and educated at Lovedale where he obtained his teachers' certificate. He did not practise as a teacher but became a law agent at Butterfield.

Late Mr. Xiniwe was a musician and pianist, a patriot and politician being one of the first members of the Native Representative Council a position he retained to his death. He and Professor Z. K. Matthews were the two Cape rural representatives.

The late Councillor Xiniwe came of a good family. His father Paul was one of the most progressive businessmen in King-Williamstown where he owned the well-known Temperance Hotel. His mother was a singer of note. Both parents sang before Queen Victoria before the South African War.

Councillor Xiniwe leaves a widow, a married daughter and a son who is still at school.

## WHY WE MUST REMEMBER MENDI DAY ON SUNDAY

The Mendi disaster, according to the report which appeared in the last issue of The Bantu World, is to be remembered this Sunday. There are Africans, and some of them well educated, who do not know why any fuss should be made of Mendi Day and why they should be asked to remember it by paying their shillings to the Mendi Memorial Scholarship Fund.

This is not surprising. In the first place, many of these people are not well informed as to what happened in the English Channel on February 21, 1917, when the troopship Mendi sank with 615 Africans. They do not know the full story of this tragic event in the history of our race, because the story has never been fully written. Those who wrote something about it confined themselves to describing the terrible scenes in the English Channel, and the bravery and courage of the men of the Mendi. No one has linked this tragedy with the gigantic struggle that was going on in Europe. No one has made it quite clear that these men were on their way to help save Christianity and civilisation from the forces of Prussian barbarism.

Others too they were not the only Africans who went to the rescue of Europe in its anguish; thousands from South Africa were already behind the firing lines in the cold regions of France and others had played their noble part in the sandy deserts of South West Africa, and in the marshy and malarial districts of East Africa. Then there were Africans from British West Africa, Central and East Africa

from the French African possessions, and the Belgian Congo, who participated in the defence of Europe against itself. Briefly it was "Darkest Africa," this vast continent becoming a lamp of freedom, a torch of liberty, to the human race in its anguish.

It was not the first and last time that this continent, regarded by some scientists as the cradle of the human race, saved Christian civilisation from the blood thirsty men of Europe and Asia. Those who read the Book of books will remember that when the Romans and the Jews wanted to destroy the Infant Jesus, the angels told Mary and Joseph to find refuge with the Infant in Egypt, and they did so and thus saved Christianity for the world. Again they will remember that it was an African who helped Christ to carry His Cross to Golgotha, while the Jews jeered and spat at Him and the Roman soldiers sjamboked Him. Africa has played a noble part in God's scheme of things.

### The Second World War

During the last war she again went to the rescue of Europe. "It is Africa," says a writer, "that has transformed the face of the world for all of us; the old lands of Sultans and Pharaohs have burnt into front-page news. Egypt, Libya, Tunis, Algeria, Morocco, are all once more on the lips of men." It will be remembered that it was at El Alamein on the African continent that the first crushing defeat of the Nazi "invincible" armies was inflicted, and that marked the turning point of the war. From that time the Nazi armies were smashed all the way to Berlin. And Africa was there! This land of sunshine, kindness, hospitality and generosity has an important role to play in the affairs of progressive mankind, no matter what the enemies of its inhabitants think and say. It is God's purpose that it must play his role.

### What Africa Has Done

In commemorating therefore, the sinking of the Mendi with 615 Africans in the icy waters of the English Channel during the first World War, we are recording our appreciation of what Africa has done for humanity since the birth

of Christ. The Mendi disaster is not an isolated incident in Africa's history; it is one of the many incidents that have won the admiration of all right-thinking men the world over. The spirit with which the men of the Mendi were imbued was the same as that which prompted men in "Darkest Africa" to show hospitality and generosity to European explorers, such as David Livingstone, Mungo Park, Stanley, Brazza and many others, and this is the spirit underlying the Christian religion and the spirit of humanity.

As a people we must pay homage to the heroes of the Mendi disaster because they belong to our race, and their heroic deeds and sacrifices are part of our history. So let us keep their memory green, and by so doing we shall be honouring Mother Africa.

## GERMISTON HOUSING PLAN

The Germiston Town Council has agreed to buy 1,116 morgen of land for £114,000 adjoining Palmietfontein Airport to be used for building a village primarily for the accommodation of Africans engaged in factories at Wadeville and other industrial areas.

Mr. W. A. Parnell said the council must take a long-term view. The Germiston public generally felt that Germiston's industrial area was situated in a spot of the uncertain times through which the country was passing.

With the growth of industries they must see that the necessary labour was found. This meant that housing near the industries was essential.

## Australian Aborigines to Stand for Parliament

The Australian Aborigines League is to nominate three candidates for the Australian Senate at the next Federal elections. One of the candidates will be Mr. R. Saunders a former Army lieutenant who holds the Military Cross. He was the first of his race to hold a commission in the Australian Army.

## "DREADFUL URGENCY" OF SOIL PROBLEM

Addressing the National Veld Trust in Cape Town on Monday, Dr P. J. du Toit, formerly Director of Onderstepoort Veterinary College, said that the world population was increasing by 55,000 a day. At this rate, in fifty years time everybody would be living on a semi-starvation standard.

Dr du Toit continued: "The rate of increase in the population of the world is so alarming and the amount of soil available for the population of food is decreasing so rapidly that, unless something is done to check this immediately, we are heading for one of the worst catastrophes the world has ever seen."

"In the face of this problem, everything else can wait. There is a dreadful urgency about the whole matter. The remedy must come immediately. In another generation it may be too late."

Dr du Toit said that the rate of human breeding must be checked and everything possible done for the conservation of the soil.

### SEN. BROOKES SAYS:

## FUTURE DEPENDS ON CO-OPERATION

Speaking in the Senate on Tuesday, Senator Edgar Brookes said that the task of the Opposition was to save white South Africa from the deadly peril into which it was being brought by the Government.

If the policy was to bring the whole Non-European population into conflict with the European population, South Africa could not look for outside help.

The Union had been industrialised and was now entirely dependent on a non-European labour force.

During the session of the Fagan Commission the Rev. Mr. Stoffberg had said to the Natives: "We need them; they need us."

That was true. There was an inescapable economic unity in South Africa.

"We must make friends of our possible enemies." The Natives wanted co-operation, but the Government's policy and propaganda was actually driving a wedge between European and non-European, discouraging every force that made for co-operation.

In the last year, the Government had succeeded in turning into enemies those non-European leaders who had formerly been its friends.

So far as the Native groups were concerned, he was impressed by the growth of nationalism among them, a nationalism which, if fanned, would make the Minister's nationalism "a Sunday School picnic" by comparison.

In the past year, efforts had been made to decide the future of all the non-Europeans. The non-Europeans were claiming that they should be consulted about their own future. There had been talk of a joint commission of the two Houses of Parliament. He would rather see something in the nature of a true national convention.

He was a liberal and proud of it. A liberal believed that men were men and had a right to be so and that anything, whether economic or otherwise which sought to bring about a reduction of their freedom as men, had to be fought

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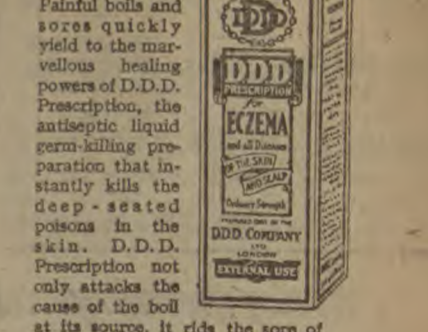

### GRANT KHOMO IS TENNIS TOPS

GRANT KHOMO, THE SOUTH AFRICAN BANTU triple tennis champion, was born at Potgietersrust, Northern Transvaal, 26 years ago. He is seventh in a family of 8 children, was educated at Khaiso Secondary School where he first learned how to use a tennis racket at the age of 15.  
Later Grant proceeded to the South African Native College, Fort Hare, where he succeeded in obtaining his B.A., C.E.D. degrees. While at Fort Hare, he strove hard to improve his tennis and was fortunate in having as fellow student, Mr. S. Sikakane, then at his best, and many other tennis enthusiasts. But it was in rugby where he first obtained his Provincial colours when he represented Border in the Inter-Provincial Annual Rugby Tournament.

His first taste of major tennis tournament play was in the Transvaal Bantu Open Championships held at Alexandra Township in October 1947 where he caused a sensation by capturing the Men's Singles and sharing the Doubles titles. It was indeed a remarkable performance considering the fact

that to reach the finals, he had to defeat such experienced tennis veterans as L. Moorosi, J. Mylcs and Ralph D. Moiefe—beating them all in 3 straight sets and crowning this exceptional achievement by routing the redoubtable B. Matshaya 6-0, 6-2, 6-0 in the final.

**Brilliant Career**  
The brilliant success was but a forerunner of many more triumphs, for, immediately after the Transvaal championships, he was selected top representative of the Transvaal team for the South African Bantu Inter-Provincial and National Open Championships held in December 1947. Unfortunately the Open Championships could not be completed in Johannesburg owing to inclement weather. Khomo's D. Day came at Bloemfontein when he became the South African Bantu tennis Champion in April 1948.

In the recent South African Bantu tennis tournament held at Port Elizabeth in December last year, Khomo enhanced his reputation by accomplishing a unique feat, that of becoming a triple champion, by winning the Men's Singles, Men's Doubles and Mixed Doubles. He has now won both the Transvaal and S.A. Singles titles for two years in succession.

**Khomo's Other Hobbies**  
Grant Khomo also follows with great interest football, rugby, golf, cricket, athletics and indoor games. In soccer he is popularly known as "Khomo The Great" an all-rounder. He has represented the Transvaal and S.A. in Inter-Provincial competitions on numerous occasions.

Being of a quiet disposition and rather shy—especially when members of the opposite sex are about, Grant Khomo is, nevertheless, a champion with a keen sense of humour. A peculiar feature of his modesty is that, after winning a match, when asked how he played, he will always say: "just managed to scrape through." He is captain of a well-known soccer team at the Bantu Sports Club, the Celtics F.C.

Grant, who is now back to Johannesburg after holidaying with his parents in the Northern Transvaal, is a teacher at the Orlando High School and a member of the Orlando Lawn Tennis Club which is affiliated to the Johannesburg Central Tennis Association.

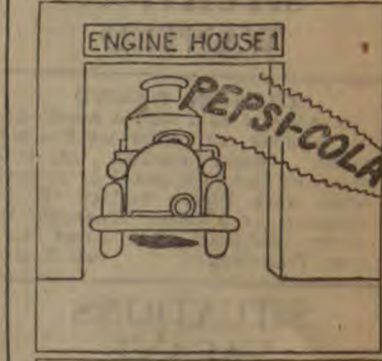
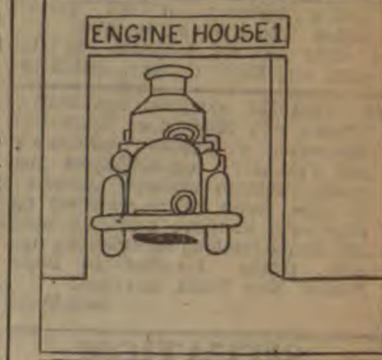
**Westerns Bat**
