Azapo has always rejected political structures which try to divert the struggle from one of its primary goals, namely repossession of the land through a socialist government. We will be satisfied with nothing less".

Transvaal Indian Congress
(TIC) spokesman Dr R A M Salvaloojee said the Government was to offering "no change at all. It is the same thing as before. The African majority will still be confined to the homelands and those in the urban areas will still fall under the terms of the 39-year lease".

TIC and Azapo were reacting to the President Mr P W Botha's opening address to the new tricameral Parliament yesterday. Mr Botha said the Government would be looking at the granting of full property rights to blacks in certain areas in South Africa and the self-governing home-

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
