Says Chief Mametsi

Seventy-one Sotho speaking Chiefs gathered at Olifant's River on Saturday for an indaba with Dr. Verwoerd.

They thanked the Minister for calling them together.

But they expressed polite doubts about Bantu Education and the system of Bantu Authorities.

Here is what they had to say:

Mr. A. Boshomane: "I deplore the fact that we were called after the acts were made law.

"We do not want sham power, because people will laugh at us.

I appeal to the Government to respect the chiefs.

"This can be done by letting them take part in framing the laws.

"Many of our Chiefs are so poor and ragged. Their allowances should be increased."

Mr Bethuel Mooketsi: "I don't see any purpose in holding this discussion. The laws are already passed."

Chief Mametsi, Leydsdorp: "Now that the chiefs are being made authorities, the thing should be carried right through to Parliament, where the laws are made."

"The chiefs should be Members of Parliament."

The Rev. S. S. Tema (spokesman): "We dislike differences with white people.

"We are here to live together in peace.

"God did not wish our lives to be full of strife.

"Our people complain about this education.

"They may be ignorant but when they see a cow in calf, they do not expect it to give birth to a donkey.

"Africans believe that if a person who does not like you gives you a sweet, you won't take it.

"Africans say that if this education is taken over by a department which they fully believe doesn't like them, then they cannot willingly accept it.

"The people say that since this education is under the Native Affairs Department, it will turn our people into slaves.

"Show us then, that it is not so."

"The Ministers of the Church are weeping.

"The Church started education among the African people.

"Now that education has been taken from us to the department, will it not change our children?"

"Will religious training be allowed?"

Mr. Stephen Mamabolo, speaking for the Transvaal Baskomane:

"When we left Johannesburg on Friday, a lot of people came to the bus.

"They told us: you must not go and sell us out.

"It is well-known that the Chiefs are afraid to stand up to the Government.

"We are your children, so please do not kill us."

Mr. Maja: "Education knows no colour. I cannot reconcile my conscience to the introduction of Bantu education.

"I ask the Minister to give me a precedent for such separate education in any country."

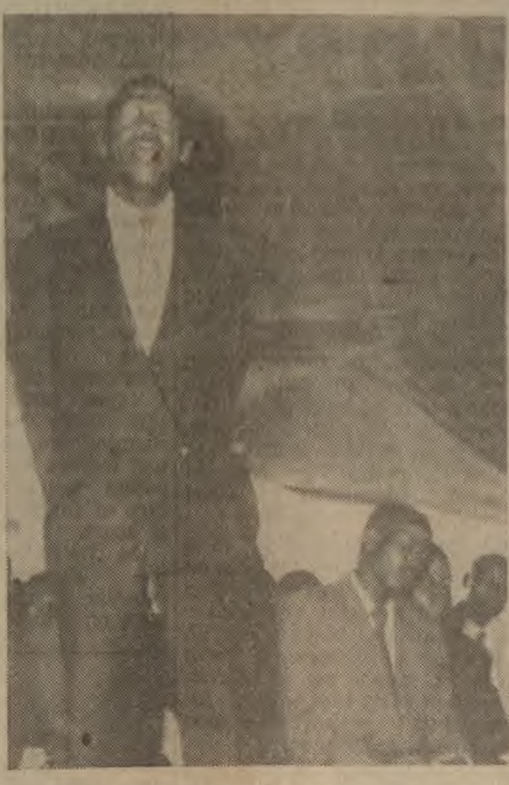
There were angry murmurs of dissent when Chief Ramokgomo spoke. He said:

"Everything the Government says is acceptable.

"I assume even the other Chiefs here are agreeable to it."

After he sat down there was a buzz of talk.

An African constable added: "We are just Africans. You can't believe."

This meeting is being called by the Anti-Rent Co-ordinating Committee.

Natalispruit is to fight a test case against the new rents.

Last week, Mr. T. Rampai paid the old rent of £1-10s.

He told a meeting that it was accepted on account, after much ado.

Mr. Mngomezulu says that residents are prepared to continue the struggle to the bitter end.

Dr Verwoerd Speaks for Two Hours

FOR SEVERAL HOURS ON SATURDAY, DR. VERWOERD LISTENED TO SO-TOO CHIEFS CRITICISE HIS LAWS.

THEN HE REPLIED IN A SPEECH LASTING TWO HOURS.

DR. VERWOERD SAID THAT THE CHIEFS DESERVED TO BE GIVEN MORE POWERS.

"The Bantu Education Act is based on old Bantu law, and is meant to operate on traditional lines.

"The Chiefs have been forgotten for a long time and there is frustration.

"If they accept the acts, the old ways will operate again.

"The Bantu have good traditions. They should not try to imitate the whites.

"Chiefs and Councillors should be their old selves, and they must move with the times.

"Good Chiefs and good Councillors will be able to improve themselves and their tribes.

"The Bantu Education Act is a gift to the African people.

"It is not poison to kill them.

"It is up to the Bantu to show how they will handle it."

Dr. Verwoerd said that the State would help the Bantu committees bit by bit.

"If we give them everything at once, it will just end there."

Dr. Verwoerd said it was not true to say that the Bantu were not consulted.

He, himself, could not be everywhere.

But there were various officials in his department whom the Bantu could meet.

That amounted to consultation.

"I have had occasion to consult with some Chiefs. These Chiefs said to me that if the State thinks a thing is good for them, we should just go ahead.

We need not consult them.

The Minister said that the English churches were refusing to part with the schools.

"The Church is like a Regent.

"When the time comes for the Regent to hand over his powers, he would like to keep his position. So he says that the young Chief is not good.

"That is exactly what the churches are doing."

Dr. Verwoerd said there were two ways to consolidate Christian teaching:

1. Teachers will be taught to open lessons with prayers.

2. Each school will be open to every denomination, and not to any particular church.

He appeared before Mr. Brink on a charge of abduction.

She went with Blignaut to Eersterus. They spent a day there.

He then sent her to his parents in Middelburg.

They agreed to marry as soon as he bought his discharge from the police.

After a few days she received a telephone call from Blignaut's sister asking her to come back quickly as her parents were looking for her.

Two of her sisters had left home in the same way and her parents did not look for them.

When the girl's mother was called to the witness-box, she could speak neither English, Afrikaans nor vernacular.

The interpreter, Mr. Ndhrazi, could not speak her language.

After a long interruption, the case was resumed when the woman's brother undertook under oath to interpret to the "best of my ability."

The mother said her daughter left home without permission.

Blignaut was found guilty and sentenced to three months' hard labour.

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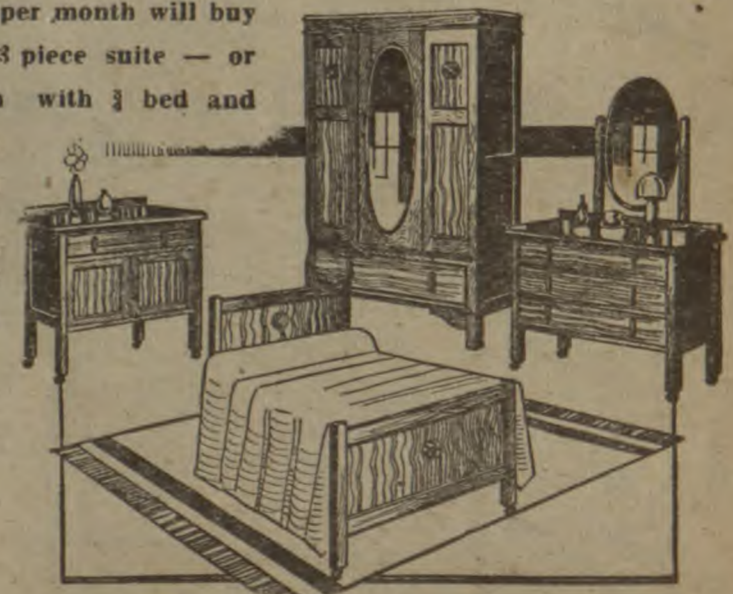

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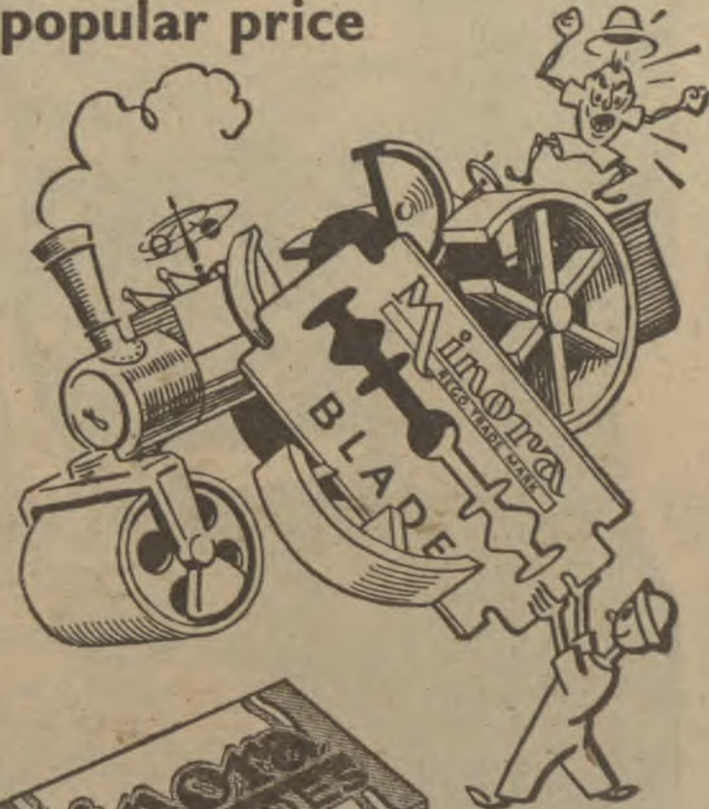


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WOMEN'S WORLD

All About Our Nurses

For the first time in South Africa two African nurses are being used in factories under a Durban "Family Health" scheme reports the Tribune.

The scheme, instituted by the Industrial Health Centre at the Institute of Family and Community Health, Clairwood, has drastically reduced absenteeism among factory workers.

The sisters prepare a complete case history of every worker in the factory.

Nurses look after the children of factory workers, immunise them against disease, check their feeding and vaccinate them.

RECIPES

BEEF DONE IN LAYERS

Cut 1 lb of round beef in cubes of one inch. Pare and slice three good sized potatoes and four onions. Put a layer of potatoes in the bottom of a baking dish, then a layer of meat and onion. Dust lightly with salt and pepper. Put in another layer of potatoes, meat, onion and salt. Peel and cut in halves four good sized tomatoes and slice finely. Add them and also a tablespoon of butter in the small pieces. Cook in a moderately slow oven of 300 degrees for 2 1/2 hours.

STEAMED CUSTARD

Ingredients: 1 egg, 1 teacup milk, 1 teaspoon sugar, butter for greasing. (This is just

sufficient for one person).

Method: grease a cup and piece of paper. Break the egg and beat it up. Add milk, sugar and flavouring. Mix well and strain into grease cup. Cover with greased paper. Stand the cup in a saucepan containing water. Stand at side of fire. Steam until set. Do not let it boil. Serve hot or cold.

YEAST BEER

6 bottles of cold water, 1 cup compressed yeast, 3 cups of sugar, 1 teaspoon ground ginger mix to a paste in a little cold water. Pour water into a large basin. Add sugar, and stir until dissolved. Mix yeast with a teaspoon sugar. Add little warm water and add this and ginger to other in-

gredients. Stir well. Put into bottles and cork well. Leave for a day or two.

BOTTLED APPLES

Use only apples which are free from blemishes. Peel and cut into quarters. Remove the cores. Drop the quarters immediately into weak brine (salt and water). This prevents discoloration. When all the fruit has been cut, drain it from the brine. Wash in fresh cold water. Make a thin syrup consisting of 4 oz sugar to one pint of water. Pack the apple quarters firmly into bottles. Pour in the cold syrup. Seal tightly. Sterilise the filled bottles for 10 minutes on two successive days.

I shall for a change allow Mr. Alfred I. M. Mampono, B.A., who is in charge of the Orlando library to say something in this column. Here follows his letter.

Your recent article under "Listen to me," in which you gave us a list of the Gold Coast African Cabinet Ministers, did not only immensely interest me but also made me put on my thinking cap for a while. I asked myself, if by a miracle we could achieve our independence overnight could our African Cabinet Ministers measure up to that standard of not only educated Gold Coast Ministers but also of men of deep learning and cultural background? My answer was no, because we are inclined to emphasise the political and not also the other indispensable agencies of independence such as cultural, educational and economic needs.

Unfortunately the Orlando library statistics reveal a shocking apathy of its residents towards this fountain of knowledge.

I feel the Orlando residents should be proud to possess not only the largest library in Municipal locations in the whole of the Union of South

Africa, but also the best-stocked.

Are the Orlando residents not indifferent to their source of knowledge if out of a population of 91,500 only 309 adults are registered members of this free library and of the children from standards one to matriculation 21,000 are registered? Out of a book stock of 12,974 books the circulation hardly doubles the stock every year. There are more than twelve primary schools in the area and one of the biggest High Schools in the Union only a few hundred yards from the library.

My Christmas and New Year wish to Bantu World readers is: read the Bantu World every week and two good books from your nearest free library every month.

Thank you, Mr. Mampono. I am sure your words will make more people at Orlando and everywhere read more, and those who do not read begin to do so.—J. M. NHLAPO.

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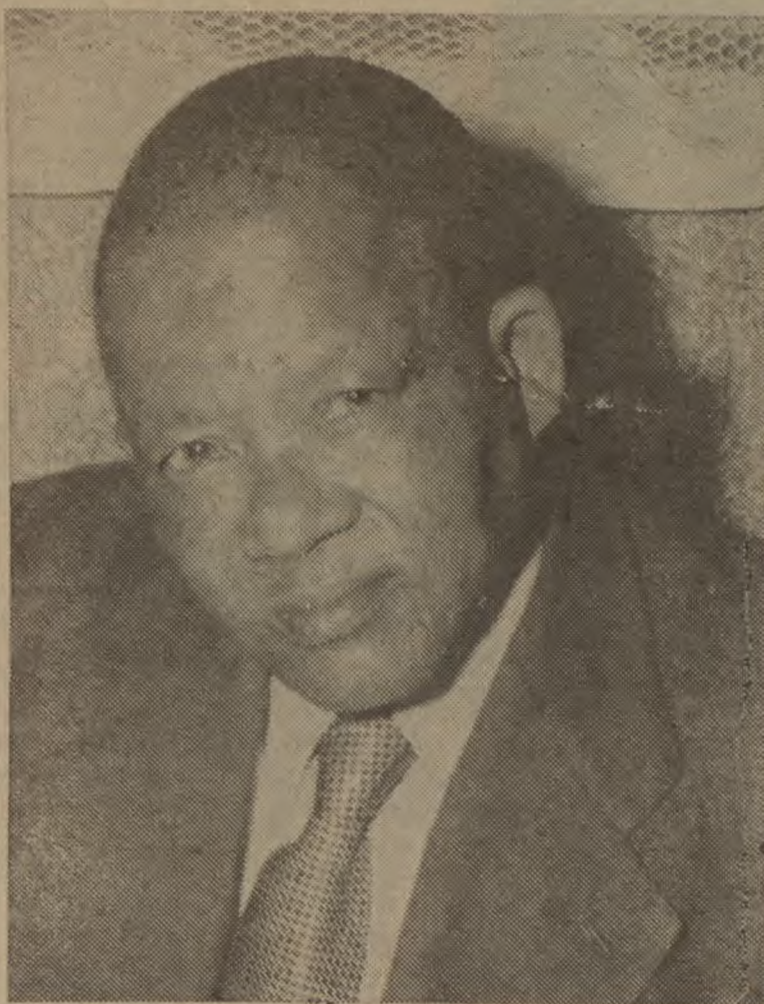
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AFRICAN AUTHORS

Mr. N.G. Mokone

Mr. Nowen G. Mokone was born on November 26, 1899, at Monamaladi (Greysfontein), a farm near the tribal village of Botshabelo (Putfontein) in the district of Lichtenburg, Transvaal. Mr. Mokone's mother died when he was only three months old.

Petrus Sebeke and Mosidi Mokone, Mr. Mokone's parents were very religious and generous people. "Up to now I still reap dividends of my mother's hospitality," Mr. Mokone likes to say, when he comments on people's kindness to him because of his mother's generosity to them when she was alive.

At the age of 10, Mr. Mokone went to live with a German missionary and his wife. They made him one of their family, and taught him to speak, read and write some German.

After his primary education, Mr. Mokone was sent to Kilmerton Institution, where he was trained as a teacher, and afterwards employed as a teacher in the practising school, at a salary of £4 per month.

In 1924, Mr. Mokone joined the staff of the Bethel Training Institution, in the district of Lichtenburg. Four years later, he was married to Miss Priscilla Nkomo daughter of the Rev. Mr. Nkomo of the Methodist Church, and sister of Dr. William F. Nkomo of

Pretoria.

A year after his marriage, Mr. Mokone was supervisor of schools, the position he holds to this day.

Mr. Mokone has always been interested in his mother-tongue, Tswana. The T.A.T.A. made him secretary of the vernacular committee. This committee was later dissolved and the Transvaal Education Department formed a Tswana Board of which Mr. Mokone became secretary.

As an author, Mr. Mokone has made a most valuable contribution to Tswana school literature. He compiled a series of Tswana readers called "Montsamaisabosigo" (My night-guide). The series up to standard 4 has been in use for some time. Standards 5 and 6 as well as a Tswana Course covering the work of standards 1 to 6, by Mr. Mokone, are about to be printed.

Mr. Mokone is also a member of the Tswana Language Academy (TLA.)

Seretse was not Paramount Chief for Bechuanaland. He was chief of the Bamangwato tribe. Killing a person in cold blood is a "planned murder."

Where can one get the Johannesburg map?—"Anxious to know all," Johannesburg.

Get one from the Central News Agency or any bookshop.

I am a regular traveller by train. I use a second class ticket but I never find a seat. Can I be allowed to pay less as I always stand?—"Very Worried," Roodepoort.

There is no reduction made for standing. I think there should be!

I am 18 years old. I am deeply in love with the boy who gave me a child. My parents don't want him at my home because he is a hooligan. My boy friend was annoyed when he learned that my parents want me to leave him. He has since stopped calling on me. Should I forget him?—"Worried Girl," Lydenburg.

He is the father of your child. Should he want to get married, you should agree even if your parents object. Explain to them that you are taking this step in the interest of your child.

I have made a girl pregnant and her parents demand damages which my parents are paying. Now her parents want to return this money. They say I am running about with too many girls. They say they will look after the baby themselves when it is born.—"Worried Boy."

Prove your sincerity. Do not take the money back. It is your duty to marry the girl. You would then find that the attitude of her parents changes towards you.

Please apply me with the address of Philips Records.—"Jin," Pretoria.

Try P.O. Box 7708, Johannesburg.

There is a girl I want to make love to. She is attending school. I fear to confuse her mind as she is due to write her examination soon. What should I do?—"Delco Kid," Alexandra.

Wait until examinations are over. The news you sent has not been received.

I have been asked to pay £65 lobola for a girl. I have already paid half. I got married by special licence. I paid £5 and 3/6d. for the certificate at the Native Commissioner's office. I was however told to take the papers for completion by a Minister. I paid the Minister his fee of £1. Before the bans were called for the third time my marriage was stopped because my father-in-law said I had not finished paying lobola. What should I do? My wife is staying with me already.—"Worried," Klerksdorp.

You are already married. You can ask the Minister to sign the papers without publishing the bans. No bans are necessary with a special marriage. The fact is that time is being wasted in your case unnecessarily. You can still pay the balance of the lobola.

I passed my Standard VI in 1943. I did not get my certificate. Where should I apply? Can one who has had a baby become a nun?—"Worried," Johannesburg.

Write to the principal of your school. If you have had a baby and the child lives, you cannot be admitted to a nunnery.

Kindly furnish me with the name and address of a good Dry Cleaning establishment where I may send my topper for dying.—**L. J. M. Saltpan.**

The process of dry cleaning and dying is similar in all establishments. Send your topper to a dry cleaner in Bloemfontein.

I was in love with a certain girl for a year and nine months. She became pregnant and I paid £15 damages. I asked her parents to allow her to come over and stay with me and the kids. One day after two months we quarrelled. My girl friend then took her children (twins) and returned to her home. Her people came and said they had nothing to talk but were taking back their daughter. They also took my furniture worth £65. 10. 0., blankets, shoes and a pair of trousers. When I try to talk to them they threaten to assault me. Please advise me what to do.—**E. B. M., Alexandra Township.**

Both parties are in the wrong. Firstly, you had no right to take your girl friend to live with you even before you paid lobola for her. Her people are wrong to confiscate all your personal property. Confiscation is only done by order of court and is executed by an official of the court. If your girl friend still loves you arrange to see the Native Commissioner with her about this matter. He will call your people to his office and arrange for your marriage.

I am a young married woman with two children. My husband does not support me. With his wages he buys nothing for me and the children. What have I to do?—**E.T. Alexandra.**

Report your case to the Native Commissioner. He deals with husbands who neglect their wives and children.

Is it possible for me to leave my job and return to school, as I have no father to pay my fees? To whom can I apply to pay my school fees?—**P.N. Mulaudzi, Sibasa.**

Of course it is possible provided you can afford to pay fees. I know of no one to whom you can apply. This is really a private matter. Why not do your studies by correspondence while remaining in your job?

Who is the author of the book "Law of the Vulture"? What is script writing? I often read of scripts written for films. What are they?—"What to know," Kilnerton.

Check with a library for the author. Script is "printing" with hand. Scripts are written for film or radio. For a script adapted from a novel, the author of the novel must give his approval, and will almost certainly want to be paid.

Where can I get the book "Up From Slavery"?—**D.M.T. Ramokotjo, Johannesburg.**

Try Lovedale Press, P.O. Lovedale, C.P.

I passed my third year Teachers' examination in 1941, but I have no proof. I am definite my name appeared in the pass list, but the authorities disclaim that. Will you kindly ask those Lovedalians who passed that year to send me through you, the official pass list.—**Distressed, Steynsrust.**

Who are these "authorities" you are referring to? It is no use going from the "authorities" to the Lovedalians for a pass list. Write to the Education Department, P.O. Box 13, Cape Town. If your name is not in the 1941 list, you did not pass the examination.

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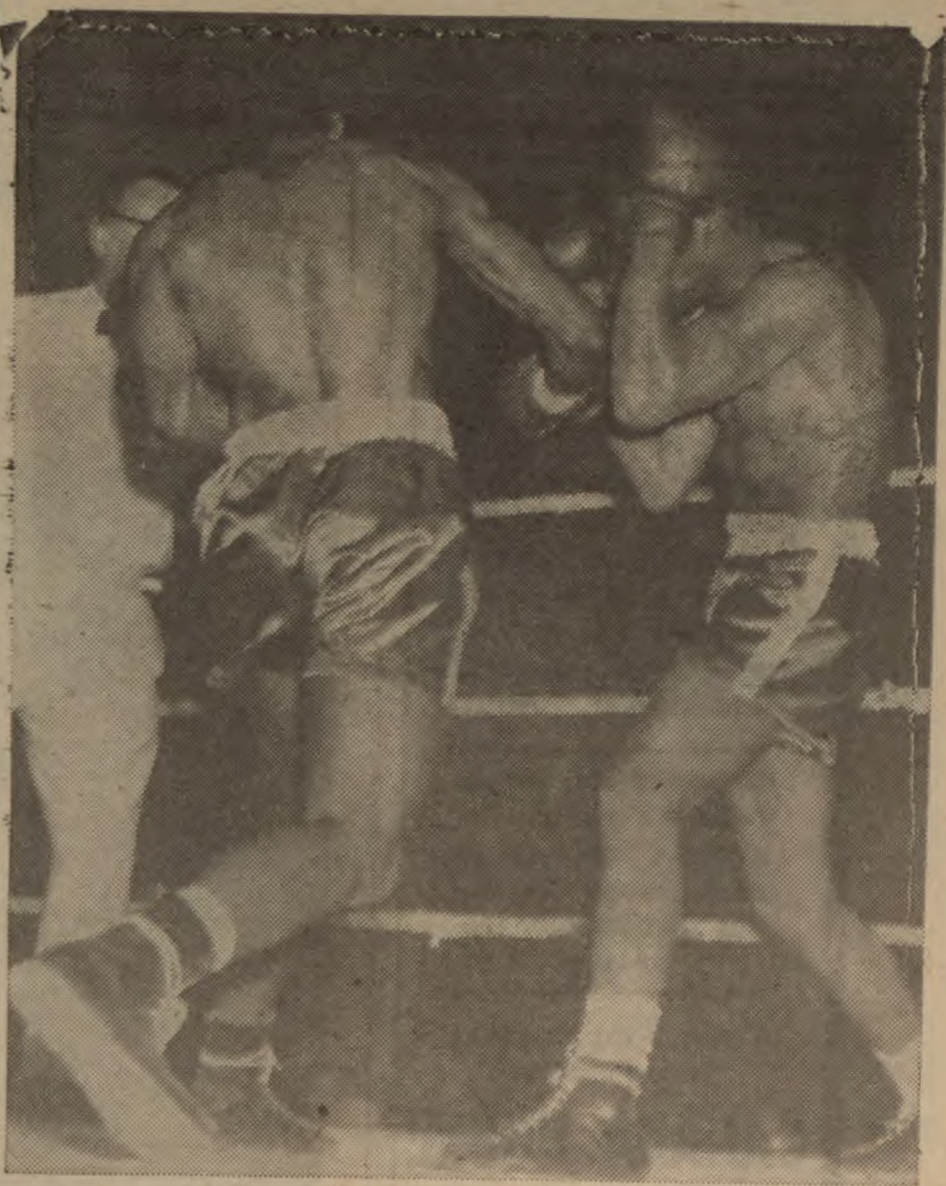

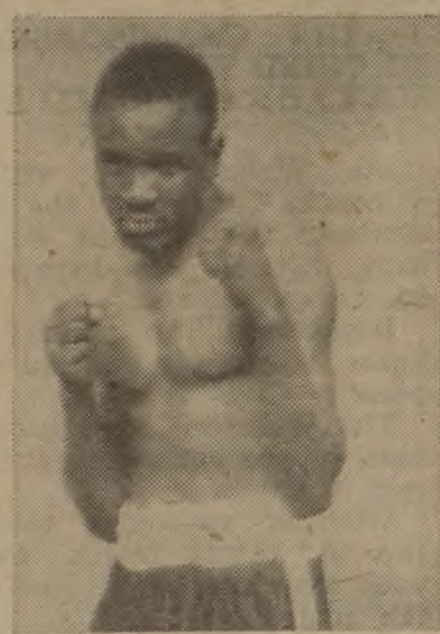
