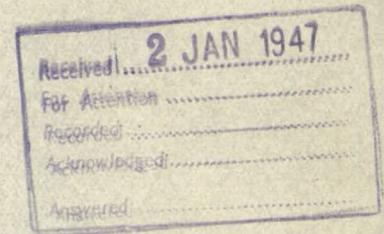

Pharmacy Training for Non-Europeans.

I read with a good deal of interest your letter regarding which we are prepared to co-operate in any way possible. Certain questions come to my mind.

- 1) Would it be possible for the course to be taken intensively, three months theory and then eight months practice, or would one have to be engaged in practice and attend evening classes for theory?
- 2) What requirements are laid down covering the size, the equipment and the class of work done in a hospital desiring to thus take in apprentices?
- 3) What would the apprenticeship fees be, payable by the hospital to the apprentices?
- 4) Am I right in assuming that a hospital taking in apprentices must have a fully qualified pharmacist in charge of the pharmaceutical department to train apprentices?
If this is true, do you think you will find pharmacists in this country willing to undertake this work? If I am right, I think pharmacists in this country are trying to raise a colour bar in this country and would not easily get the consent of their Board for this training.

We could take in one, if it were possible to have say a six months course so that one was in school and the other doing practical work, we could take two thus ensuring that we would always have someone here for practical work while

the other was getting his theory. That might be a proposition for you to consider. For instance, in Johannesburg you would have the same course covered twice a year. I would send up student A for January to July while student B would be doing our work. Student B would go up from July to January, and student A would be doing our work.

Pharmacy Course for Non-Europeans:

This Institute has been making inquiries regarding training facilities for Non-Europeans as pharmaceutical apprentices, and several of the Technical Colleges have indicated their willingness to provide the theoretical part of the course provided sufficient apprentice-trainees are forthcoming to take the course.

It has been suggested that some of our large hospitals might take on Non-European apprentices in their dispensaries, but I understand that such institutional training is not at present ^{required} by your Board and that the matter will be discussed at the next meeting of the Board.

I shall be grateful if you will submit the following points to your Board for consideration when this matter is discussed :-

1. What requirements are laid down covering the size, equipment and class of work done in a hospital desiring thus to take in apprentices?
2. What would be the apprenticeship fee payable by the hospital to such apprentices?
3. Must a hospital taking in apprentices have a fully qualified pharmacist in charge of its pharmaceutical department to train apprentices?
4. Would such apprentices have to attend part-time classes while training, or could they first complete either the training or the theory and then proceed to the other?

It will be greatly appreciated if, after the Board has met, you can give me the ruling of the Board on all the above points.

Pharmacy Training for Non-Europeans.

With reference to your letter of the 9th December, 1946, JRA/OMA., I have to inform you that my Board has advised the Provincial Administration that it supports the principle of pharmacists in training being apprenticed to Hospitals and sees no fundamental difference providing that training is confined to Non-European Hospitals in the case of Non-Europeans, although there may be practical difficulties.

Under the present regulations of the Pharmacy Board however it is not possible to apprentice pharmacists in training to Hospitals, either European or Non-European, and therefore until the law on this matter has been developed or clarified this Hospital is unable to take any Non-European pharmacy students in its Non-European Hospitals.

Training of Non-European Pharmacists.

As you know, the Institute has for a long time been trying to see a training course established for Non-European pharmaceutical apprentices at one of the large Technical Colleges. The difficulty has always been to get sufficient apprentices in one centre to make up the minimum enrolment for the course (± 15), as so few chemists are willing to apprentice Non-Europeans.

We are now making an approach by letter to all the Pharmacies in the classified directory in Johannesburg, and I shall be glad if you will do the same in Cape Town, asking whether they would be prepared to apprentice a Non-European (Coloured or African) in the event of a course being offered by the Technical College.

I feel that the approach should be made by individual letters rather than by circular, as there is more probability of a reply in the case of individual letters.

Perhaps if Mr. Moltano will sign the letters there may be some response.

NON-EUROPEAN PHARMACEUTICAL APPRENTICES.

This Institute has from time to time received enquiries from Non-Europeans (mainly Africans) about the possibility of becoming apprenticed to pharmacists. At present no facilities exist for the theoretical part of the Pharmacy course for Non-Europeans, but the Witwatersrand Technical College has indicated that it will consider providing the course should a sufficient enrolment (15 to 20) be forthcoming.

It will be readily understood that the minimum enrolment can never be achieved until 15 or more pharmacists are found on one centre who are willing to apprentice Non-Europeans, and I am writing to ask whether you would be willing to apprentice a Non-European, beginning, say, in 1948.



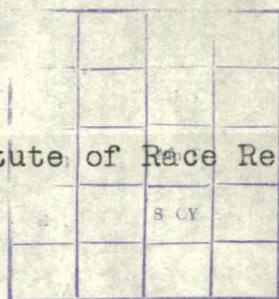

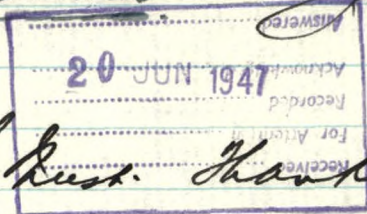
