He seems to be brooding a great deal, and tends to become easily upset.

I am sending his most recent letter to you an I am mure that his request for an application to court will be of interest to you. Also, I think the matter can be nore conveniently handled in Cape Youn than up have. Do you think that anything can be done to easist him? If you think legal ection is desirable, would before and Aid in Cape Your be willing to fact the bill? If D & A cannot do it, please let up know and I shall see about mising the cash elsewhere.

Frankly, I am surprised at the delays which Bob is experiencing in receiving his letters. The prison anthorities have always done overything possible to ensure his confort and their present actions just do not add up. The authorities will, of course, have read Bob's letter to us, and they will also see the letter which I have written in reply (copy enclosed herewith). This might overcome the difficulty he is having about his letters.

On the other hand, it might be a good idea to go to court for the "definition of rights" which Bob refers to. Perhaps even the whole basis of his detention could be challenged in sourt? I recall my last discussion with you about this whon you said that you would have to see the detention order which was served on Bob. If you propose legal setion, then I source correctly? - that you would be able to demand scores to Bob. I have written to Bob, as you will see, to try and clarify this. Also, I have discussed the matter with Ernie Wentsel. He is drawing up an opinion and will sond this to you as soon as possible.

I shall probably be going away ment wook for about three weeks. But if you write your name on the back of the sevelope when you reply, my sourctary will forward your letter to me.

As you have probably heard, Astrid and I are now divorced. I have a flat in Hillbrow and if you over come to Johannesburg, I shall be delighted if you will come and stay with me.
