

For the past two years I have been compiling an oral history of the experience of hundreds of South Africans who have fled into exile from 1960 onwards to escape from the apartheid system. I have compiled verbatim accounts from men, women and children of all races, faiths and ~~both~~ political co-ords who ~~fled~~ ^{chose exile} for many different reasons and in many different circumstances - some in desperate ~~and~~ illegal cross-border flight ~~others~~ ^{some} for political or educational reasons and others in search of educational sanity and others to obtain military/guerrilla training.

The years 1960 to 1990 have been the most turbulent and formative years of South African history. In their life stories, the exiles reveal the many-sided nature of the political and social changes which have placed the country in the forefront of contemporary history, and created ~~the~~ the widest global dispersal of people from a single country in modern times. The exiles' stories are ~~at once~~ ^{at once} told as personal sagas ~~but~~ ^{and} also universal ~~stories~~ ^{But they} bear witness to the universal cultural shock of racial dispersal. But they ~~also~~ ^{also} reveal a compendium of economic, cultural and personal shock which ~~are~~ ^{are} at once the universal content of ~~the~~ life in exile and an essential part of the ~~but-~~ ^{but-} pang of the new South Africa.

The work is well advanced, and a book based on the selected spoken testimony is in preparation. But the completion of the work, the transcription and editing of the mass of material and the gathering of further interviews from former exiles now back in South who could not previously be contacted still lies ahead. I hope to complete the whole work within the next year. But I ~~do~~ need financial assistance to enable me to carry on.

The Africa Fund



Mission Statement:

The Africa Fund, the tax-exempt associate of the American Committee on Africa, has been working for freedom and independence in Africa since 1966. The current focus is on South Africa's apartheid policy and on its continuing war against the people of the neighboring countries.

The Africa Fund both aids the victims of the South African regime and educates Americans about the need for a U.S. policy that supports freedom instead of apartheid. It maintains a close working relation with leaders of the African National Congress, labor, and human rights organizations in South and southern Africa in order to respond quickly to changing needs.

Program Areas:

- The Africa Fund and the American Committee on Africa have spearheaded the drive to end U.S. investment in South Africa through sanctions and divestment. This movement has already resulted in Congress's banning all new investment in South Africa and 26 states and over 83 cities have acted to withdraw over \$21 billion from corporations that invest in South Africa.
- Its "Unlock Apartheid's Jails" Campaign, with Bill Cosby as the Honorary Chairman, collected and dumped at the South African Embassy and Consulates over 100,000 keys symbolizing the demand to release South African political prisoners. The Africa Fund continually alerts a network of concerned community leaders throughout the United States to new arrests, detentions, bannings, death sentences, and the continuing torture of political prisoners.
- The Africa Fund provides humanitarian assistance to the families of South African political prisoners, and to African refugees in southern Africa and the United States. In particular, it works to provide funds and supplies for refugee centers administered by the African National Congress. In the last three years it has sent over \$500,000 in aid for refugees and other victims of apartheid.
- It also conducts a wide-ranging educational program on southern Africa and U.S. policy. This includes publications, a telephone hotline for anti-apartheid organizers, an in-house research center, and continuous work with the electronic and print media.
