The Non-European Affairs Committee of the Johannesburg City Council, at a Meeting held this afternoon, agreed to accept the Hon. the Minister's request as outlined in his statement released to SAPA on the 5th June.

The effects of this request will be that the Central, Mai Mai and Wolhuter Beerhalls will close on the 16th June. It has been the Council's desire for some two years to close the Central Beerhall as soon as two or three smaller beerhalls could be erected to take its place. Permission to establish these new beerhalls on an experimental basis has now been granted. These new beerhalls are to cater for the lunch-hour demand between noon and 2 p.m., and for the residents in the City between 6:30 p.m., and 8 p.m.

In view of the fact that the Hon. the Minister has agreed that there should be provision in Hostels for the supply of Kaffir Beer to the persons living in those Hostels, the 400 persons living at Mai Mai will still be able to obtain their Kaffir Beer in the Hostel, and this will also apply to the 3000 odd men living at the Wolhuter Hostel. In addition, the Wemmer Hostel, which previously has had no Kaffir Beer facilities, will be able to supply residents. At these Hostels facilities will be available at the weekends for residents, whereas previously the Minister had asked that the Denver and Western Native Township beerhalls be closed on a Sunday. This will mean that the residents of Hostels will largely remain within the Hostel grounds which, it is felt, will be preferable to their being forced to travel to the Native Residential areas to obtain Kaffir Beer, probably returning through the streets of the City to their Hostels in large numbers.

The Council's attitude has been that they wished to close down those beerhalls which were incorrectly sited, and which caused large congregations of natives near busy thoroughfares. There will be some difficulty in selecting such sites for the three new beerhalls, and care will be taken in the selection of the sites to avoid the mistakes of the past. It has always been the Council's policy that it would be far better for the Kaffir Beer to be distributed from many centres rather than a few. In view of the agreement now come to with the Hon. the Minister, it will be possible to supply Kaffir Beer to those employers who wish Kaffir Beer made available to their employees who live in Compounds within the City. There are altogether thirtythree compounds, each housing more than 50 persons, and house approximately 15,000 natives in all. Kaffir Beer will be supplied strictly for consumption by the employees of those particular firms. In order to take care of the lunch-hour demand, the Hon. the Minister has agreed that suitable methods of distribution to other employers in predominantly industrial areas be investigated, and a Departmental Committee has been set up for this purpose.

The supply of Kaffir Beer to those living in the Native Residential areas is being adequately catered for by the beer-gardens and beerhalls which have been established, and which are to be established in the next year.

While the new arrangements may not be as convenient for all those who at present patronize the beerhalls, it is hoped that the new arrangements will remove the undesirable aspects of the present beerhalls. It is now hoped that employers of native labour will co-operate and give the Council support in the new scheme.

I would like to pay tribute to all those who have helped in achieving the present arrangements. I convey our appreciation to the Hon. the Minister and his Officials for taking cognizance of the Council's desire to make facilities available for the day-time workers in the area, and for those permanently resident in the City.

It has been the Council's desire to provide facilities rather than make the present patrons of the beerhalls
the prey of the illicit liquor dealer and the shebeen keeper.
The Hon. the Minister has recognised this in the new agreement.

A number of other bodies supported this view, and made suitable representations to the Minister. I would particularly like to name the Johannesburg Chamber of Commerce and the Transvaal Chamber of Industries, and to thank my colleagues on the Non-European Affairs Committee and those of my fellow Councillors who have throughout supported me.
