

a meeting held 8th March, 1960.

"8. COMMONWEALTH SCHOLARSHIP SCHEME:

" The Secretary gave a brief outline of the proposals of the Commonwealth Education held at Oxford in July, 1959.

" Prof. Sutton stated that he had been invited to attend a meeting in Pretoria in connection with the scheme and that he thought there was a likelihood that the Union Government, which had not yet offered any scholarships, might shortly do so.

" The Chairman stated that he felt sure that if there was any way in which the Council could assist in the matter they would be prepared to do so."
