ANNUAL REPORT OF THE BOARD

1935

Since the last Annual Meeting two members of the General Committee have been taken from us by death, Mr. William Anstey and Mr. E. Orlando Leake. We add our tribute of respect and affection to the many similar expressions already made by various bodies which, like ourselves, have had the interest and help of these devoted servants of Christ.

The Board has lost the services during the year under report of Dr. Ethel Rolfe, who was also the first Medical Superintendent. Dr. Rolfe, who resigned owing to the transfer of her husband, Rev. H. Rolfe to Queenstown, had been a very active and useful member of the Board. Although it does not fall strictly within the scope of the report for 1935 we must refer also to the resignation of Mrs. L. Noble, who has just resigned from both Board and House Committee, as she is leaving South Africa for an extended period. She will be greatly missed for she has done splendid service on both committees.

Again, as last year, the chief growth in the Hospital's service has been in the out-patient department, which shows an increase of 1,426 patients over the year 1934, while 1934 showed an increase of 1,241 over 1933. These remarkable figures indicate the very valuable work that the Out-patient Department is doing both in remedial and preventive medicine. The attendances at the infant welfare clinic have been 450 and at the post-natal clinic 81. The period during which free service is given at the post-natal clinic has now been extended from three months to a full year, which will greatly extend the usefulness of that department. The total number of in-patients has been about the same as last year, ten more to be exact. The daily average has been almost exactly the same.

After Dr. Hope Trant left in May to take a post in Northern Rhodesia, Dr. Janet Robertson and Dr. Walker-Pole acted as joint-locum until the arrival of Dr. Charlotte Carlisle at the end of October. It proved impossible to find a temporary resident superintendent. By dividing the work between them these doctors were able to provide constant attendance, while at the same time keeping up their private practice. The arrangement worked very satisfactorily, and the cordial appreciation of the Board was expressed to them.

Dr. Carlisle has come to us from a large Mission Hospital at Mysore, India. She began work on the first of November and in spite of the handicap of dealing with a different race under different conditions from those to which she has been accustomed, she has already established herself in the confidence of the patients and the staff.

The only structural changes to the Hospital plant during 1935 were the erection of a house for the caretaker and the domestic staff and the enlargement of the laundry, as projected in the last annual report. These improvements have added greatly to the comfort of the workers and the efficiency of the work. The growth of the out-patient department is putting great strain upon the very limited quarters available for it. In order that any extensions made may be co-ordinated with possible future developments a sub-committee is studying the probable structural requirements of the next ten years, with a view to the formulation of a co-ordinated plan.

Two legacies have been received during the year, which have helped very materially in maintaining a sound financial position. From the estate of the late William Geddes the sum of £412 was received and from that of the late E. O. Leake £250. The Board is most grateful for these bequests and would take this opportunity of assuring friends of the Hospital that the remembrance of the Hospital in their wills would be a fine consummation of the interest they have shown during their active participation in its work.

Another notable gift of the year was that of the Deferred Pay Board of Control, the sum of £100. The Board wishes also to thank Messrs. Kallenbach, Kennedy & Furner for the remission of a substantial portion of their architects' fees on the new building, and our treasurers, Messrs. Howard Pim & Hardy for the remission of the entire cost of clerical services, amounting to £90. We do not forget that this is in addition to the personal services so freely given by Mr. J. Montague Pim, the Honorary Treasurer.

It is rather distressing to note a falling off in annual donations of £258 from last year's figures, but this is accounted for in part by the fact that a £50 subscription came in too late for the year's report and further by the fact that £140 less of V.D. drugs were requisitioned for than during 1934. The cost of these is refunded by the Union Health Department and the amount is then entered as a donation. While donations, therefore, appear less by that amount the same amount is absent also from the expenditure side of the account. The actual shortfall in annual subscriptions is £68, which is serious enough over against the need. We trust that friends old and new will more than wipe out that shortfall in 1936. The Board records its hearty thanks to all donors and subscribers.

The fees paid by patients again show a substantial increase, about £300. The total amount of fees collected, just short of £2,000, represents nearly 30% of the total revenue. The proportion of fees collected to fees charged is 41.6% for the in-patient department or 58.6% if we include out-patients. It should be a great encouragement to our subscribers that their gifts make possible a service so manifestly appreciated by the Native people, and that the Natives are ready to meet such portion of the cost as they are able.

The back-bone of our financial support is the annual grants from the Provincial Council, the Municipal Council of Johannesburg and the Union of South Africa Native Development Fund. Should any of these be decreased the Hospital would face a serious situation.

The Board is glad to report that the Endowment Fund, which had to be borrowed to help meet the original cost of erection of the Hospital has now been repaid in full and is invested. Another notable feature of the financial statement is that, in spite of a substantial increase in salary costs, due in part to the temporary arrangement for Medical Superintendent, the total cost of maintenance for 1935 shows only a slight increase over 1934. That this is so is due to a considerable saving on other items of expenditure, some of which reflects the careful economy of the Matron, Miss Matheson.

It should be noted that there is still a bond of £1,000 to be considered over against the favourable financial position.

There has been introduced during the year a pension scheme for all European members of the staff, financed through an insurance society. In connection therewith an age-limit of 55 years has been prescribed.

Only six probationers have sat for the Medical Council examination during 1935 of whom four passed.

The religious services on Sunday evenings have been kept up through the year and the Board again thanks the ministers, both European and African who have conducted them.

The customary visit was paid to the Hospital during the Christmas season by the Mayor and Mayoress, Councillor and Mrs. Maldwyn Edmund and the visit was much appreciated by patients and staff.

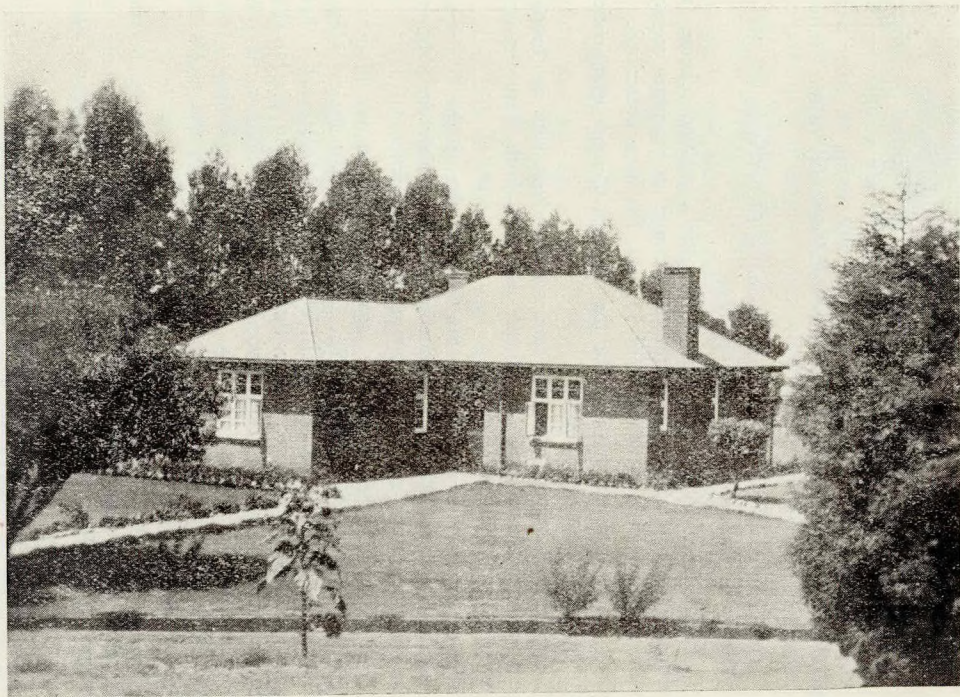

Mention has already been made of the Hon. Treasurers, Messrs. Howard Pim and Hardy, under whose guidance our financial affairs run so smoothly. The Hon. Auditors also, Messrs. Aiken & Carter have again deserved our gratitude for their help so freely given.

The Hospital which came into being as the fruitage of much faith and high devotion, and which has been maintained by many prayers and gifts and much good-will has completed another year of service to the bodies and souls of its patients, for which we give thanks to God.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE MEDICAL SUPERINTENDENT

For the Year ended 31st December, 1935.

The year ended December 31st, 1935, shows an all round increase in the work of the Hospital. The number of in-patients has not increased to such a marked extent as the out-patient numbers. In-patients show an increase of 10, whereas out-patients have increased by 1,426. Thirty-six more babies were born in the Hospital than in 1934.

Six pupil midwives sat for the South African Medical Council Examination in Midwifery during the year and four succeeded in passing.

The position of night sister, which was left vacant when Sister Cato resigned, has been filled by temporary sisters, Sister Walker filling the post at present.
