At its recent meetings, my Executive Committee discussed the problems associated with the intake of African students to the Medical School in Natal. Very considerable concern was expressed about the numbers and standard of those who applied for admission and the problems with which the Medical School is confronted.

Discussion emphasized the need for more and better facilities for African secondary education and I was instructed to write to your Council asking that it take this matter up with the government.

In a paper (enclosed), "Manpower Training: Educational Requirements for Economic Expansion", Dr. E. G. Malherbe draws attention to the manpower requirements of South Africa for the future and notes the state of Bantu Education. I refer you to the various Tables and Appendices and to pp 8, 9 and 17 of the paper.


Under separate cover I am sending to you 6 copies of the paper by Dr. Malherbe in case you might wish to give them to other members of your Council.
