NOTES ON ORGANIZATIONS CONCERNED WITH THE WELFARE OF AFRICANS

The organizations concerned with the welfare of Africans in Johannesburg may be classified as local and national. Local organizations are those which are primarily if not wholly engaged in activities locally, while national organizations are those which, while interested in and perhaps having responsibility for local activities are also organized on a national scale.

LOCAL :

Johannesburg Child Welfare Society: Maintains creches in the municipal townships, secures grants under the Children's Act for destitute mothers with children, and, generally, carries on child welfare work amongst Africans.

Anglican Mission at Sophiatown: Runs a nursery school for African children and trains African nursery school teachers there.

Feeding of African children Committee: A new organization, under the chairmanship of Mr. Robin Stratford, K.C., and representative of various bodies, to provide African children with one meal a day, whether they are in school or not and during school-term and holidays.

Transvasl Association of Non-European Boys' Clubs; a Transvasl Association of Non-European Girls' Clubs: Organize clubs for African boys and girls; also trains (part-time) African men and women as leaders.

Non-European Moral Welfare Society: Maintains a home at Orlando for unmarried African women before and after confinement.

Talitha Home: A similar institution at Western Mative Township for delinquent African girls.

Transvaal Pathfinder Scouts Association: Organizes scout troops for African boys, and trains African leaders. A training centre is to be built outside Roodepoort.

Girl Cayfarers' Association & Girl Guide Association: Organize detachments of African girls and young women slong lines of Girl Guides.

Bantu Lads' Hostel: A voluntary Committee - maintains a hostel at Orlando for African youths committed by the Court.

Helping Hand Club (Undenominational) for Native Girls.

& St. Martin's Hostel (Anglican): Maintain hostels for African young women employed in domestic service, factories, and offices, as nurses, students, etc. The Municipality also has a Momen's Hostel and is planning another for various classes of African women.

Bantu Men's Social Gentre: A Club for African men. Under the direction of a committee consisting of Africans and Europeans, most of whom are elected by the members. Numerous outside bodies also use the Centre as a meeting place.

Bantu Sports Club : Provides sporting facilities for Africans.

Alexandra Health Centre: Alexandra Township. A Committee under the chairmanship of Mr. Justice Schreiner, and representative of the African people, the University, and subscribers, maintains a large health centre (with the collaboration of the University), an extensive, nursing service, and a health propaganda and after-care service. It also maintains a creche.

Transvaal Non-European Blind Society: Maintains the Blind Institute at Roodepoort, and another at Hamanskraal, and is also engaged in preventive work.

Transveal Association for the Care of Cripples: The Non-European Committee runs a Clinic at the Non-European Rospital, and has secured land for an After-Care Home at Orlando.

Transvaal Deaf & Dumb Association: Is developing its work amongst Africans, and has an African investigator.

Johannesburg Sental Sygiene Society: Is investigating the extent of mental disability amongst Africans on the Sitwatersrand (under a grant from the Bantu Welfare Trust) with a view to the establishment of a home.

Rand Epileptic Association : has not yet provided a home for African epileptics, but is anxious to do so.

Johannesburg European-African Women's Association: Maintains the Margaret Ballinger Home at Roodepoort, for African children in need of a holiday away from home surroundings.

Bridgman Memorial Hospital & the Gospel Mission Maternity Hospital: Provide pre-maternity and confinement care for African women.

Race Welfare Society: Provides a clinic to advise African women.

Legal Aid Bureau: Provides free legal aid for Africans unable to pay for legal assistance where such is necessary.

Bantu Refuge, Driehoek: An old people's home. The committee of management operates under the office of the Director of Native Labour. Grants are given by the S.A. Native Trust, municipalities and the Chamber of Mines.

Hospitals : The following hospitals provide for Africans :-

Johannesburg Non-European and Coronation Non-European and Frincess Alice - (both under Hospital Board).

Rietfontein - Tuberculosis (Provincial Administration). - do - Gontagious diseases (-do -).

Johannesburg Joint Council of Europeans & Africans: Watches over the interests of the African people in Johannesburg, makes representations to Government, municipal and other authorities.

Federal Committee for Adult Education amongst Africans: Recently formed to correlate and extend night schools for Africans.

Libraries: Municipal Libraries, Winifred Holtby Memorial at Western Native Township, and Municipal Library for Africans at Bantu Men's Social Centre. Also Carnegie Library Services for Non-Europeans (outside Johanneeburg).

Council of Ron-European Trade Unions: A federation of African Trade Unions.

Yocational School for Africans, Orlando: Municipal.

Municipal Homeoraft Centre : Municipal.

Donaldson Orlando Community Centre :

MATIONAL :

African Rational Congress: Is concerned with the disabilities of the African people, and makes representations on their behalf.

National Council of African Women: Is concerned with the development of social welfare work amongst Africans, and also with their disabilities, particularly those of African women.

Daughters of Africa : - do -

National Council for Child welfare: Includes Africans in its activities, directly and through local child welfare societies.

Mational Council for the Care of Cripples: Includes Africans in its activities, directly and through provincial associations.

National Council for the Blind: - do

Rational Council for the Deaf : - do -

National Council for Mental Hygiene: - do -

Pathfinder Scout Association: Organizes Scout activities, directly and through divisional organizations.

Girl Wayfarers' Association: Organizes similar work amongst African girls and young women in Transvaal, Orange Free State, and Swaziland.

Girl Guides' Association: Organizes girl guide activities amongst African girls and young women, directly and through provincial organizations.

Home Improvement Associations: There are two organizations - one in the Transkel and the other in the Ciskei (lately extended to Basutoland) for the training of African women in home crafts etc.

Jan Hofmeyr School of Social Work (Mational Council of Y.M.C.A.'s:) Training of African and other Non-European social workers.

Friends of Africa: Concerns itself primarily with the industrial side of the Welfare of Africans and with the development of co-operative accieties. It also publishes pamphlets on political and other topics of general interest.

Campaign for Right & Justice : Concerns itself with African trade union organizations and the general welfare of Africans. It also combats "fascist" forces in the Union.

S.A. Institute of Race Relations:

NOTE: The foregoing lists probably overlook several organisations and this memorandum must therefore be regarded as subject to alteration and additions.

All the organizations (other than Government and Municipal) are in need of funds to carry on their work, and in most cases, the work could be extended if funds were available.

be noted :-

Esployment Bureau for Educated Africans; Recreational Centres for Domestic Servants; Community Restaurants; Orphanages; Centre for African organizations; International Glub; Co-operative Societies.

MINUTES OF MEETING OF THE GENERAL COMMITTEE HELD AT THE BANTU MEN'S SOCIAL CENTRE ON MONDAY, 9TH JULY, 1945, at 1:00 O'CLOCK.

PRESENT: Mr. J. D. Rheinallt Jones (in the Chair), Councillor A. Immink, (Hon. Treas.), Mr. C. P. Alport, Major H. S. Cooke, Mrs. Isabel Havemann, Mr. J. H. Hunt, Professor I. D. MacCrone, Miss Eudore Meyer, Mr. David N. Murray, Mrs. Dora A. Phillips, Mr. J. Richard Rathebe, Ven. Archdeacon R.P.Y. Rouse, Rev. S. S. Tema, Mr. L. I. Venables, and the Director

The Chairman welcomed Mr. C. P. Alport who was attending the Committee for the first time

The Director reported that Mr. M. L. Marsh had found it necessary to resign due to being transferred from Johannes-burg to another part of the country. Regret was expressed that Mr. Marsh was leaving, and it was agreed that a letter of appreciation be sent Mr. Marsh for his services not only on the Committee but on behalf of the whole Johannesburg community.

APOLOGIES: These were received from Miss L. M. McKenzie, Professor J. L. Gray, Mr. Julius Lewin, and Mr. J. de Kock.

MINUTES: The Minutes of the last meeting of the General Committee had not been circulated, but were on the table and had been read by several. It was agreed that they be approved.

REPORT ON RESULT OF TERM'S WORK: The Director reported that the results of the term examinations and the general averages of the students had been surprisingly good. Only two members of the student body-both first-year students-had to be asked to leave the school. Full and careful consideration had been given each case by the School Committee.

On the suggestion of Mrs. Havemann, supervisor of field work, it was decided to minute the appreciation of the Committee for the excellent co-operation of all those agencies which were offering facilities for the practical training of the

students.

completed to allow the Director and Mrs. Phillips leave from their duties at the School for six months. A locum tenens had been found in the person of Mr. Oswin Bull, until very recently Director of Education, Basutoland. Mr. Bull would be present at the beginning of the next term (August 1st). He had been offered £60 per month for his services in this connection, plus 6d. per mile for motor travel in the interest of the School. This action was confirmed by the Committee, and general agreement was expressed at the quite ideal solution which had been found. The Director and Mrs. Phillips were given the best wishes of members for a pleasant and restful vacation.

SCHOOL FINANCES: The Director reported that he had had an opportunity of discussing the future grant from the Union Government to the School with Mr. W.G. Mears. Chairman of the newly-created Union Advisory Board on Native Education Mr. Mears had suggested that the Committee write him and place before him estimates of the amount required for School purposes next year. After discussion, the Director was asked to frame a letter which would be submitted to the following before being sent to Mr. Mears: Mr. Immink, Major Cooke, and the Chairman. It was urged by the Hon. Treasurer that the amount named should be 24,000.

It was decided to arrange with the Bank that Mr. Oswin Bull should be authorised to sign cheques in the absence of the Director.

CLASS IN TYPING: The Director explained the necessary for teaching students how to use the typewriter. In their work with various agencies reports had to be submitted in typed form. In spite of the difficulties of obtaining typewriting machines, a very fine offer of four typewriters had been made by Messrs. Harris & Jones at a total cost of £65. Authorisation for the purchase of these four machines was granted if, after inspection the Director was satisfied that they were in good conditation, and that the firm would keep them in serviceable shape.

which they had had with Mr. Venables regarding accommodation to be offered the school in the new building to be erected for the Municipal Non-European Affairs Department adjacent to the Bantu Men's Social Centre. It was planned to erect, on the first floor of this building, five classrooms, two offices, an assembly room, and a large arts and crafts room. These rooms, together with supplementary wash and cloakroom facilities, would provide quite adequately for the school until a separate site could be acquired and a new building erected. Mr. Venables spoke briefly, intimating that his Department was glad to make accommodation available for it realised that considerable services were being provided by the school for his department. On being questioned as to rentals to be charged the School, Mr. Venables advised that they would be purely nominal.

SALARY SCALES FOR SOCIAL WORKERS: The Director drew the attention of the Committee to suggested Salary Scales for Social Workers by The Social Workers' Association. Due to the lateness of the hour, it was decided to include these scales in the Minutes so that members might consider them at leisure. Mr. Venables intimated that he would like to discuss the figures with the Chairman in comparison with the salaries of workers in municipal service. The suggested scales are as follows:

To clear the air on the position of Congress in Natal, I want to state that the Executive Committee elected at Pietermaritzburg recently is the recognised to lead and conduct African National Congress affairs in the Natal Province.

The so-called breach of the constitution is merely technical and if there has been any constitutional breach it seems to have been made by leaders concerned in the notice calling the Conference and in the manner the Conference appears to have been conducted. It is the leadership and not the people on the Conference who must shoulder the blame.

My last letter to Rev. A. Mtimkulu was written after Mr. Champion informed me, in the presence of Rev. Mtimkulu, that the latter has already been invited by the new Executive Committee to meet them.

It was no recognition of Rev. Mtimkulu as a leader of any recognised body. He (Rev. Mtimkulu) asked me to write so that he could convince his supporters of the arrangements.

The publication of the letter, although it might have been intended to cause political and constitutional confusion, is, if Rev. Mtimkulu did not attend the Executive Meeting he agreed to attend, bad taste and a breach of faith.

It must be made clear that this decision is not a recognition of Champion over Mtimkulu. Both are friends of mine. Congress does not belong to either. It is merely placing the interests of unity and the cause of the people in its proper perspective.

Congress is nobody's private concern or property.
It is a mass liberation movement for the people and as such all of us as leaders, for the time being, must bow to the will of the people and work for their advancement and the raising of their status.

All who believe in Congress and its mission will sink personalities and support the new Executive Committee as long as it works in public interest.
