We, as representatives and leaders of our people, do hereby publicly acknowledge and declare that the Notarial Deed of Donation and Trust on the 29th April, 1936, and as amended from time to time, in which you, "Colonel James Donaldson devised a certain gift to the Trustees appointed in such Deed upon the basis that the assets and monies forming the subject of such gift should be dealt with by the Trustees for the benefit of certain Bantu Population", was a gift of vision and of outstanding national character.

This is shown by Article 4 of the Deed of Donation and Trust defining the purpose of the Trust thus:-

\*\*4. The purpose of the Trust shall be to give assistance to persons and or bodies for the advancement of the status, the improvement of the conditions and the removal of the disabilities now suffered by the Bantu Population of the Union of South Africa and generally to seek the benefit and betterment of the said Bantu Population of the Union.\*\*

This declaration shows your insight, full understanding of the basis of the African's burden. It shows courage of conviction, a creative and constructive mind with a desire to see right and justice in operation for all in South Africa.

Your donation has been an inspiration of hope to our people and an immeasurable influence for good towards better race relations.

In themain purpose of the Donaldson Trust you have indicated beyond doubt that you desire the African in South Africa

to be developed to his fullest capacity of ability like other races by the "advancement of his status;" improvement of his conditions and the removal of the disabilities now suffered by the Bantu Population."

Thus you showed yourself not merely a friend of the Bantu but a friend of justice which is greater and more fundamental. You have shown yourself a lover of and a believer in your fellowmen irrespective of colour. You reached down and lifted as you rose.

You seem to have taken greatest pleasure in giving as you seemed to believe that "it is more blessed to give than to receive."

Your selflessness and self-effacement in creating this great benefaction has been a symbol of a great and generous mind.

The turning of your great mental energies to the details of administration of the Trust, as you must have done in the amassing of the fortune which has become of great human bemefit, is an indication that you do not only believe in the purposes of the Trust but you also wanted those purposes carried in spitit and letter.
