Sir, I was called at Francho - when we found Rev. Goronyane, Mr. Janyang, Messrs Makothu, Setlogelo, Nyokong and others, and they committed themselves that they will pay for all my accounts in England, to show their determination they have already sent £20 to England by telegram yesterday. I failed to meet Lord Siega and Sepopioa at the station on my coming back. They waited for me at a wrong door. When I arrived at home Mrs Platje forced me back to the station. I found the Bloemfontein train still waiting to go back, so I stayed a while with them. After consultation they asked me to write to you to add more weight on their telegram. We agreed that there will be nothing wrong if you show the magistrate the memorandum to King George. Tell them that it was given to Governor-General on Feb 6th. Lord Buxton said we have full rights to go and see our chief more especially that the nationalists want to divide our chieftainship we are going to speak for it. This point should not be left out, ~~by word of mouth~~. The second thing we have to demonstrate to England that we are also people and our leaders (chiefs) should also be given full royal respects and when speaking well considered that they are there for the people (or for real people).
