Out of their money the Ratchidi-Barcelong are paying £108 per year to the National Wavy and Assistant. £60 to the Diggings Headman and £36 to the teacher at Mathonyane. £150 is being spent on the site at Matetsane and about £600 will be required for the first five rooms of the new school which is to be built.

Barolong National Fund Application for.

Sir,

With reference to the conversation you had with us on the 13th inst (Councillors of the Barolong Tribe) at Mafeking on the above matter, I am directed by the Tribe to make this application on its behalf.

The Barolong respectfully pray that may it please the Government to allow them to draw the sum of three hundred pounds (£300) sterling from the National Fund in care of the Government for the purpose of providing cash to the Deputation they are sending to Europe, to lay before His Majesty King George V certain matters on the question of forthcoming peace to be concluded between Great Britain, Her Allies and Germany.

M A F E K I N G .

Memorandum of Agreement
made and entered into at Mafeking
on the 12th day of February 1915
between Leko Ko Montsioa in his
capacity as Paramount Chief of,
and as such acting for and on
behalf of the Barolong on the
Molapo and Mosita Native Reserves
and portion of the Setlagoli Native
Reserve at Maitzani of the one
part and William Letsapa of
Kraaipan as representing Gaesegoe
Phoi in his capacity as Chief of,
and as such acting for and on
behalf of the Barolong on the
remainder of the Setlagoli Native
Reserve of the other part.

— Whereas the Barolong
people have for some years past
been engaged in litigation with
the Mafeking Divisional Council
and with the Government on the
subject of the respective rights
of the Mafeking Divisional Council
and the Barolong people over the
Native Reserves in the Division
of Mafeking.

— And Whereas the costs

so incurred amount at the present time to a sum of about £500. And Whereas the parties hereto acting as aforesaid have agreed to pay the said costs and to provide an Educational and National Fund in the manner hereinafter provided:

Now therefore it is hereby agreed and declared between the parties hereto on behalf of the Barolong people represented by them respectively as follows: —

1. That Government be asked to collect as from the 1st January 1915 the sum of three shillings per annum from each and every Native paying hut tax on the Molepo Mosita and Setlagoli Native Reserves such sum of three shillings to be paid to the Government Superintendent of Native Reserves together with the usual hut tax payable to the Government.

2. That out of the money so collected for the year 1915, the costs above referred to are to be paid and the balance together

with

with such amount as shall be collected from year to year shall be paid to and become a Barolong Educational and National Fund to be expended for the benefit of the Barolong represented by the parties hereto.—

3. That such Fund shall be applied to the promotion of education of Barolong children and to the payment of deficient salaries of teachers and similar objects also to the erection of fencing along the boundaries of the Native Reserves, under the Fencing act, payments of salaries to the National Secretary and Deputy Tax collector and matters of a similar nature.—

4. That each party hereto and his successors in office shall during the continuance of this agreement after payment of the costs before referred to have the management of his own share of the taxes collected without interference from the other party and apply the same to the purposes above indicated for the benefit of the Barolong represented by him.

5. - That this agreement shall be in force for a period of thirty years from the date hereof and shall thereafter be renewed from time to time—

Sir,

I have the honour to enclose
herewith copy of an agreement
entered into between myself and
Chief Gaezege Phoi with a
view to the liquidation of the
costs incurred in the action against
the Government and Mahekung
Divisional Council and to the
creation of an Educational and
National Fund for the future.

I shall be obliged if the
agreement can be forwarded
to the Government with your
report and I feel sure that
the object for which the tax
is created and is to be applied
will commend themselves to the
Government and to yourself. If
the Government approve of the
agreement I shall be obliged if
the three shillings tax can be
collected yearly by the Superintendent
of Native Reserves from every
payer of hut tax on the Molapo
Mosita and Sellaoli Native
Reserves at the same time as the
Government hut tax.
