NATS ARE SWEEPING ASIDE ALL FREEDOMS **EDITORIAL** WE SALUTE YOU

Advance Suppressed in drive to Police State CAPE TOWN.

WITH the issue of NEW AGE to-day as a democratic people's paper a new challenge is being made. It is to hold at least one sector of the front against the relentless drive of the Nationalist Government towards the dark conception of a one-party, one language republican dictatorship of the police-state order. All liberties are being swept aside without formality. True to the pattern of events in such countries as Italy and Germany, the opponents of Nationalism are being attacked one by one, and invariably under the pretext of "suppressing Communism."

New Age has been welcomed by wide circles, particularly of those in the Trade Unions and the popular organisations of the national groups. They are first in the line of attack and New Age will open its columns to them as a platform for their rights and a voice for their grievances. But there should be no complacency and no surrender. The attack on Advance was also an attack on the whole of the English Press and through them on the freedam of information as a whole in South Africa.

THE EXTENT TO WHICH THE NATIONALIST CAMPAIGN OF INTIMIDATION HAS SUCCEEDED IS ONLY TOO CLEARLY TO BE SEEN IN THE SPINELESS REACTION OF THE DAILY PRESS. WHEN THE WATCH-DOGS OF THE PUBLIC SAFETY FALL ASLEEP OR SLINK AWAY FROM THEIR TASK, THEN ALL THE PEOPLE ARE IN DANGER.

BY what must be considered an arbitrary and despotic act, the Nationalist Government has chosen, without a hearing or the right of defence, to silence the voice of a legal newspaper. No grounds were given, no charge was ever brought against Advance.

In the state of tension and anxiety brought about by the increasingly intolerant and threatening behaviour of the Government, many voices once firm in the cause of freedom have grown silent. The suppression of the only completely independent people's paper in South Africa has sent a shiver through the country but has not raised the storm of protest and struggle that would have been signs of a vigorous democratic society.

But it is against the conscience of freedom-loving men and women to stand by and see their rights, won over centuries of struggle, snuffed out.

FREEDOM AND HAPPINESS

While men live they will surve for freedom. Their voice can and must be heard unless we are to be marched blindfold into a new age of tyranny and enslavement to false ideals. Nine out of ten South Africans reject this fate: they cherish dreams of a new ageof freedom, happiness and fulfilment for all.

For these reasons a newspaper dedicated to the service of the-South African people has been founded and makes its bow today. The gap made by the suppression of free journals can never be filled and the injustice cannot be righted until their liberty is restored in Tuil. New Age will be what its readers and supporters make of it and its strength can come only from their unity and the knowledge of a just cause.



CONFERENCE of trade unions representing workers of all races will be held this year, probably in December, to establish a new trade union co-ordinating centre which-unlike the Trades Union Council -will be open to all organised workers' unions. Trade Unions are now being approached to take part, according to a statement issued last week by Messrs. L. Masina and O. A. Olsson, joint secretaries of the Co-ordination Committee which has been established to carry out this purpose. The statement reads:

S.A. Trades and Labour Council ment, (1949), delegates of 14 unions which opposed the dissolution met in Durban in their individual capacities. They felt that effective unity cannot be obtained where any section of the Trade Union movement is excluded from participation, and that the untimely dissolution of the Trades and Labour Council had resulted in removing the only common meeting ground open to all trade unions.

"They decided therefore to make every endeavour to create a new body to further the principles embodied in the old Trades and Labour Council constitution, which has stood the test of nearly 30 years of trade union experience.

"A committee, to be known as the Trade Union Co-ordination Committee, has been established, with headquarters in Johannesburg, to carry out this objective. It has local representatives in Cape Town, Durban and Port Elizabeth. The first meeting of this committee was held on Tuesday, October 19, and a course of action agreed upon.
