But I do miss my friends and the stimulation of London. We go there from time to time, for various things, and keep in touch; it's a long and expensive journey.

Yes, I know Miriam Basner - knew her husband very well - and we hope to be in touch with her when Spring comes. She is really very poor - I mean she has very little money - and even to invite her here means spending money on petrol, so we hope when it gets warmer to visit her.

I am supposed to be going on tour in Europe for the ANC next week.
