

Dear Leslie,

Thank you for your letter of 8th May. The "second letter" you refer to gave me no real headaches. I just wanted time to digest it fully and work out a suitable reply.

What ever correspondence you send me will always be read in the light of your obvious efforts to improve an existing situation.

I think the conversational approach to U Thant is a good idea. Nevertheless, for purposes of record, I must formally present your request and suggestion as modified by our Executive Committee. After that it would be a good idea if we saw U Thant together. My only problem is that, at the moment, I cannot say exactly when I will be going to New York. I have programmes in Europe in June, July, August and September. I may have to go to Latin America in November. From there, I shall certainly go to New York. Should there be a change in my plans I shall let you know.

By the way, in my next Newsletter, I have had to deal strongly with the whole question of racial discrimination. I have made use of the opportunity not merely to criticize those who openly practice apartheid but also all those hypocrites who are ready to condemn apartheid but who do not hesitate to practige racialism in their day to day relations with other peoples. This is really the purpose of the editorial. I am sure you will understand.

This letter is written to place on record the appreciation and thanks of our members for the decision of your Executive to support the above proposals. Most particularly are we grateful for your own strenuous efforts and those of your colleagues who assisted in gaining this favourable decision.

We thank you, also, for your willingness to soft-pedal attacks against this country pending the outcome of these negotiations.

In the latter regard, we might have been wiser to have delayed our approach to our Prime Minister until you had talked to U Thant. As you know, this early move was made to remove any suspicion that we were working behind his back, in the full knowledge that it might be disregarded or rejected out of hand. In such an event, we will promptly try again, relying on you to ensure that thoughtless rejection is not used as an excuse for renewed hostilities; which action would rule out the possibility of a change of mind. After all, U Thant himself may prove not all that easy to persuade, which is the reason why we so desperately need your so very valuable help.

Despite these recommended words of caution and the bitter fears and hostility still to be overcome, our members and well-wishers are vastly encouraged by the progress so far made. We would like you please, to convey this sentiment to your colleagues together with our warmest thanks and heartfelt wishes for the success of your coming mission.
