ANNUAL REPORT OF THE BOARD

1936

The year 1936 has been a year of remarkable advance in the increase and improvement of plant and equipment. The rather heavy expenditure involved in these improvements has been undertaken not in any spirit of extravagance or to provide frills and luxuries, but in response to definite and severe pressure upon the facilities of the Hospital.

Further provision for the Out-Patient Department was vaguely foreshadowed at last Annual Meeting. Before the year was out the matter had to be taken vigorously in hand, and the Board is proud to exhibit to members of the General Committee and visitors at this Annual Meeting the well-planned and convenient Out-Patient block near the main entrance to the Hospital grounds. Our Medical Superintendent is working at high pressure at best, with the number of out-patients constantly increasing and it was impossible to expect her to continue longer in the cramped and crowded quarters of the old Out-Patient Department. The increase of 1,450 in the number of out-patients over last year, is sufficient explanation of the urgency of the need met by this new block. The cost will be approximately £1,300. The following table will serve to indicate the growth in the Out-Patient Department from 1,929, the first full year of working to the present:—

The old Out-Patient Department rooms have been converted into quarters for the Native Staff Nurses and the old dispensary into a laundry for the probationers to do their own personal washing.

The additions made to the Native nursing staff during the year compelled the Board to undertake the provision of increased accommodation for them. Our architects, Messrs. Kallenbach, Kennedy & Furner worked out a clever plan for the addition of a second storey over the former scullery and back verandahs, thus providing upstairs two new dormitories and downstairs a much needed enlargement of the Native staff dining-room. These additions have made necessary the borrowing of a

further £1,000, bringing the Hospital's debt back to £2,000 from which we had so joyfully reduced it last year. But the Hospital's main concern must be to save life and not to save money. The necessity for these enlargements of plant was inescapable.

Another natural result of the increased work of the Hospital was that the sterilizer equipment became inadequate. A new electrical sterilizer unit has been added at a cost of £200. For this use was made of the Howard Pim Memorial Fund. This fund, it will be remembered came into existence through the family of the late Howard Pim asking that tributes to his memory should take the form of gifts to the Hospital rather than that of flowers.

But even yet the Hospital has not overtaken the demands upon it. For months past the wards have been almost continuously full to capacity. The average length of stay of patients in the Hospital has dropped from 10.5 in 1935 to 8.5 in 1936, that is, patients are being discharged sooner than is desirable in order to make room for others. Whereas 1935 showed an increase of in-patients of only 10 over 1934, the increase in 1936 over the previous year was 246. There are, of course, limits to the expansion of a hospital like this on a private foundation, not only limits imposed by the difficulty of financing such expansion, but limits imposed by the fact that to create too large an institution is to sacrifice certain personal values that the smaller type of institution possesses. Nevertheless there is within these limits a definite demand for more ward accommodation and it is probable that the Board will have to face the necessity of providing such extra accommodation in the near future.

Increase of work and of plant also requires increase of staff. The Board gratefully records the addition to the Honorary Staff of Dr. G. Drury Shaw and Dr. C. F. Krige. Four pupil midwives have been added to the Native Staff and two additional Native staff-nurses. Indications are that another Sister may have to be added soon. The pressure of work upon the Doctor, in the Out-Patient Department is such that the Board is seeking a way of providing some relief through the part-time assistance of a dispenser. If some of these things are forecasts rather than actual report of last year's activities they nevertheless form a legitimate part of the year's report since they present a picture of the present position arising out of last year's abundant success.

Owing to the somewhat unusual qualificational requirements of an institution like this on a missionary foundation, it has been found desirable to seek the assistance of the London Missionary Society in the securing of nursing sisters. We have secured through that channel Miss Willett, who has already been several months on the staff, and Miss Buist, similarly secured, will be arriving shortly. The Board is very grateful to the London Missionary Society and especially to its Secretary, Rev. T. Cocker Brown

of London for this assistance. The Society has not only assisted in the examination and recommendation of candidates but has arranged passages and advanced passage money, to our great convenience.

In spite of the addition to our indebtedness already referred to the Hon. Treasurer's report indicates that the Hospital is in a sound financial position. Annual donations show a distressing decrease of £171 13s. 3d. but within that amount is included a grant of £100 which there may yet be hope of securing. Fees actually received from patients show again an encouraging increase of £211, from £1,861 in 1935 to £2,072 in 1936.

Special attention should be called to the fact that Grants-in-Aid have increased by only £25, and that from the Native Development Fund. The increase there is earned by the increase in the number of probationers receiving instruction. The City Council of Johannesburg has increased its original grant of £500 per annum to £750 as from 1934 and the Board is confident that the Council will wish soon to reconsider the position again in the light of the Hospital's rapidly expanding service. The Provincial Council grant has remained at £1,000 per annum from 1928 to the present, while the total number of in-patients has increased from 665 (for 1929, the first full year) to 1,794 in 1936, over 150% and out-patients from 1,136 to 7,990, over seven-fold. Obviously the Province is not bearing its full share of the financial burden. On the £ for £ basis of patients' fees collected, plus annual donations we ought to be receiving £2,906 per annum from the Province. The Municipality, the Provincial Administration and the Public ought to recognize that this Hospital is doing a great public service, a service not available in any other institution in this area, and doing it on a very economical basis. An important part of that service to the community and to the country is the training of Native midwives, who take the South African Medical Council's examination and receive the Council's certificate. Nine probationers took the examination in 1936 and seven passed and received their certificates. There is no lack of employment for those who pass.

The Board has been glad to welcome to its membership during the year Mrs. Sargeant who represents the Methodist Church and Councillor Mrs. Wordingham, representing the City Council.

The religious interests of staff and patients continue to be provided for by the religious services conducted in one of the wards on Sunday evenings by ministers of the various churches, both European and African and by the more intimate Bible Class for the Native staff on Saturday evenings led by Mrs. Bridgman and others.

The Christmas visit of the Mayor and Mayoress was graciously carried out by Councillor and Mrs. Donald Mackay, our present Chief Citizens.

Once more the Board records its cordial thanks to the Honorary Consultants, Prof. W. Gordon Grant, Dr. James Black, Dr. G. Spence Smyth, Dr. R. L. Girdwood, and the Honorary Consulting Anaesthetists, Dr. D. Crawford, Dr. C. Becker, Dr. M. B. Barlow. Although Dr. Drury Shaw and Dr. Krige have but recently joined the Honorary Consultant staff, we need not wait till next Annual Meeting to include them also in our record of appreciation and thanks.

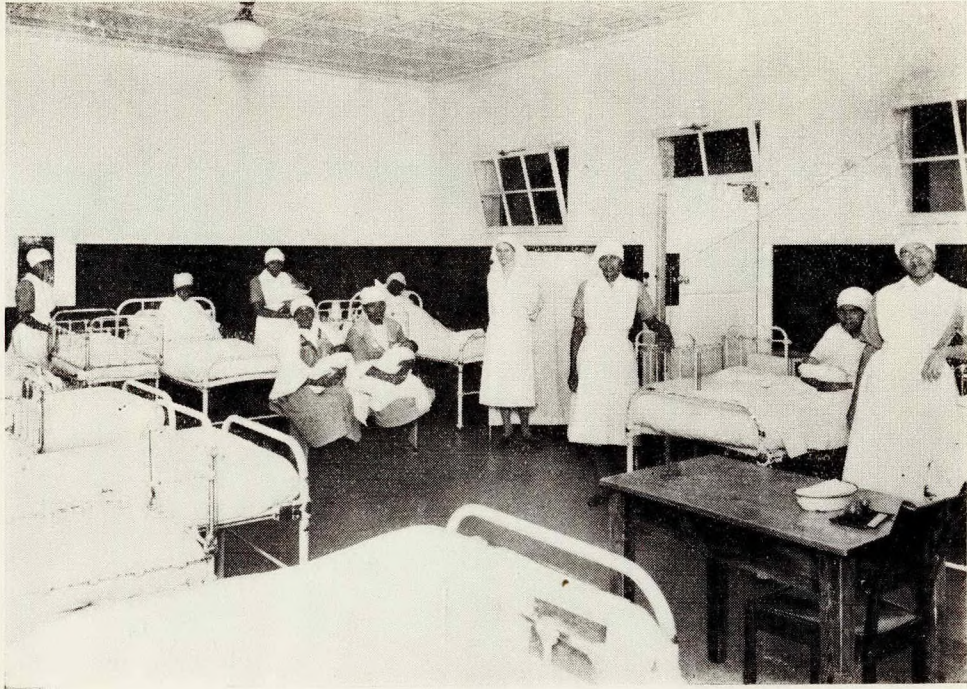

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE MEDICAL SUPERINTENDENT

For the Year ended 31st December, 1936.

The year ended December 31st, 1936, shows a marked increase in the work of both In-Patient and Out-Patient Departments of the Hospital. In-patients have increased by 246 whereas out-patients increased by 1,450; 125 more babies were born in hospital in 1936 than in 1935.

Nine pupil midwives sat for the South African Medical Council's Examinations in Midwifery during the year and 7 succeeded in obtaining their certificates.

Dr. Black proposed at one of the Board Meetings held during the year that he be relieved from the night consultant work, and proposed the names of Drs. Drury Shaw and Krige as additional members of Staff. They very kindly accepted the proposal.

OUT-PATIENT DEPARTMENT

HON. TREASURER'S REPORT

1936

During the past year great progress has been achieved in all departments of the Hospital services. Our new Out-Patients block has been completed at a cost of £1,300 but to provide this very necessary addition we were compelled to double our loan, which now stands at £2,000. Further additions to the main building to give us absolutely essential accommodation to house an increased staff mean the expenditure of another £1,200, and this work which was begun in January, 1937, is now almost completed. Most of the Howard Pim Memorial Fund has been spent on further sterilizer equipment.

Our available cash at 31st December, 1936, stood at £1,747 or £700 more than a year previously, the £1,000 which we borrowed having been paid to the Contractor on account of the total amount payable for the Out-Patients' Building. Our liabilities for capital expenditure total £1,500 to-day, so that a very small balance of cash in hand to meet our current liabilities—approximately £250—will be available in 1937, and it is probable that further borrowing will be necessary unless we can obtain increased support from the public.
