Did you afterwards come across Kerneth, or don't you remember?---No, we met Matthews, Kenneth came up later.

Kenneth did srrive later, did he?---Yes.
And Mat thews you say you met there?---Yes.
So, did you go along with the good work picking up these bombs?---Yes.

Did you find bombs like those that are lying on the table there?---Yes.

The same as those four exhibits? exhibits.

Exhibits 4, 5, 6, \& 7, and about how many did you collect then, can you recollect?--About 43 or more.

And what did you do with these things?---Some of them we put in a hide-out there. Others in a hole.

Did you put them in various hiding places?--In two places.

And did you arrange them when you put them there, laying them side by side in the hole?---Yes.

And then, did you see any of the other accused there? --Accused No. 8 was there. 20
Yes, but I mean apart from those, did you see any there?--You didn't see No. I there that day, Jeff?--No.

Well did you come down off the mountain?---Yes.
And what did you do when you came back from your long trek?--Mark then said he was going to report to No. I what we had done.

No. 16 said he was going to report to No. 1?---Yes,
Did you go too or not?--No, I did not.
Now before we go any further, I want you to have a look at these photographs. I'm going to show the photo- 30 graphs Exhibits 8 and 9. Now those are photographs of bombs. Do you see them there?---(Handed to witness). Yes,

Do you remember, did you pack them away something like those photographs?---Yes.

I don't say those are the partbioulap places where you packed them away, but if you can say that, go ahead and say it? $-\cdots$ Yes, this is the way they ere put away.

And then you covered them with grass more or less in that way in the bushes?---Yes.

Now do you remember going to a meeting behind the graveyard?---Yes, I do remember.

Now firgt of all, do you remember who spoke at that meeting?---John Nkosi spoke.

Is that Accused No. $4 ?--$ Yes.
What dic he have to say?--He said it was our work to kill the S.B.'s.

And who were these S.B's?---The Special Branch people.
Of the Police. Did he tell you when you were to do it?---He gaid we will watch their whereabouts, where they usually walk and go around and then uae the pangas to kill them.

Now was there any talk at that stage about fire- 20 arms or the use of firearms to kill the special btanch?--That was said by Accused No. I.

What did Accused No. 1 have to say?--He said we carnot use explosives but that would be evidence.

Do you mean firearms that make a noise?--Well, he used the word "explosives".

You couldn't use explosives to kill the Special Branch, is that it?--Yes.

Why couldn't the Special Branch be exploded?---He said they would be evidence, they would leave evidence. 30

These exploding things leave evidence, do they?--That's what he said.

But pangas don't, is that the point?---Yes, he gave us an exanyle for instance, he said we could use a piece of iron or steel, which is underneath a motorcar.

Yes?---0ld motorcar, which when we strike, the person con fall at the same time,

And no evidence left?---Yes.
Now was there any discussion at this time, about any particular Special Franch policeman that should be dealt with?--- Yes, he said that those were the people who were selling us.

Who said this?--Acoused No, 4. He said the Speciel Beanch were the people who were selling us.

And did he name any members of the Special Branch? ----Yes, Harwy was named.

Harry? -- And Rolty was named. They were the people that we had to stert on first.

Start killing firet? - - Yes, and then the names of Kumalo and Matshene, they were also mentioned.

Now whose name was Kumalo, do you remember?--I didn't know Kumalo then and Matshene, but I came to know 20 them afterwards.

Well, now do you see Harry sitting in Court here, or don't you know Harryp--I know him, yes. (Witnese points out Harry).

Now whet arrangements were made for the killing of Harry and Rolty?-No, we were just divided up and told which had to concentrate on the killing of Harry.

Now tell me first of all, who divided you up?Accused No. 4.

And how did be divide you up?-... Those who were 30 staying in the vioinity on close to Harny's place, must kill him, and those who were staying in the vicinity or close to

Rolty's place must kill Rolty.
And who did you have to kill?---Rolty.
Do you know who hed to go and kill Harry?--Do you want me to name the names?

Yes, if you will?--Acoused No, 1, Acoused No, 16, Kemeth, s name of Della was mentioned, Philbert Mathlaka,

Any of the other sccused?--Of those who are here, 1t's Aceused No, 16 and Accused No, 12 and Accused No, 1.

No, 1,12 and 16 , you say were together in the party wi th Kenneth, you saw?-..-Yes. 10

Now do you remember what No, 4 called you people, or don't you remember?---I remember, yes.

What?--The 12 Disciples.
Now did you go out on your killing expedition after Rolty, or don't your remember?--Yes, we did.

And I take it you did not nucceed?---Yes, we did not succeed,

Did any of the acoused go with you?--No, no one of the accused went with me.

None of the Accused went with you. Do you know 20 if any of the people outside went with you?--You mean outside the Court?

Any of the witmesses wa iting outside?--No.
How do you remember that aftor thise meeting, some time efterwards, certain people were arrested?--Yes.

Did you hear about that?--Yes.
Now after those people were arrasted, did any of the accused come to you?--Accused No, 4 came to me.

Was he alone when he came to you?p--He came with Hendrik Lebise.

Anyone else?---And Philip Mogaswa,
Is that the last witness?---Yes.

Now when he came with them, what did he want?-He sent Philip to oall me in the house,

Yes?--And then I went to them, and then he told me to go and show Hendrik Lebise where the bombs were, and then I went and showed him.

And did No, 4 go with you?--No, he went away.
Now then did you speak to him again subsequently?-He just gaid that if anybody askes me whether I had seen I must say no. The police were looking for him.

Now after that day, did he come and see you
again?---Yes.
What did he want?--He said I must go and show him where the bombs were.

So dia your---Yes.
Up on the Skurweberg, bomas like that?--Yes,
And wher you got up there, did you show him the bombs? ---Yes.

And were you and he alone, or were there others with you? $--N N_{0}$, there was a third person with us.

Who?----Tegarus Ioate.
Now you know this last witness Mogaswa?--Yea, I know him.

Do you remember if by any chance he was there on that second oceasion, or only on the first oceasion?--Not on that occasion. He was there on the third occasion.

Was there another occawion?--Yes.
Tell me what happened then on the second occasion?--
Wo took bombs, about £ive, we put them in the bag.
What sort of a bag?---It is a leather bag that
fastens over like this, with a flap.
Allright, what happened to the bombs?--They were put in that bag.

Yes?--And then tied with a string.
Yee, and then? $-\cdots$ And Nrosi carried them.
Where did he go with them?--He got into a taxi with them.

With the bombs in the bag?---Yes.
Now you tell we that Philip Mogaswa was not there on that occasion, but you say there was a third occasion?-That day Philip \#asn't there.

Allright, now tell me about the occasion when Philip was there, What happened then? - -John IFosi came there 10 with an unimown parson.

Still No, 4?--At about 2 o'clook at my home.
Yes?--I tola him that it was too early for us to get out there. The soldiers will see us, so they must come later.

Did they?---They eame later.
And then what did you do?-...Then we went to Philip Mogaswa.

Yes?--I vent to call Philip Mogaswa. I did not call him to tell hine to go with us,

But he did?--I told hill that licosi wanted hime I told Mrosi that I dicin't want to go alone, because it's far, and it was therefore, that Nkoas told he to call him.

Now let's get to the start - did you and No. 4 and Philip and someone olse then go out to the Skurweberg?--Yes, four of us.

And when you got up thore, what happened?-We took the bomibs.

What bombsi---Bombs like these smaller one.
About hiw many bombs did you teke?---About five, 30
And what did you do with them?..-He put them into
his suitcase.

And then what happened to the suitcase?--John Nkosi and the unknown person went away with them,

And did you follow after?--From the mountain we came with them, but then we separated.

Allright, do you know where John Nkosi went then With the suitcase with the bombs?--Mo, I don't know where he rent.

You don't know whether he went into a bus or a texi?--He said that he was going to a taxi. He even asked for money to pay the fare, and Philip gave him a sixpence, 10

Towards his taxi fare?--Yes,
Now tell me, at these meetings which you attended, was there any sign given at any time that you can recollect?-Yes.

What was that sitn?---The lifting of the right hand with the oven palm and saying the word "Iswelethu", and then the answer would be "Be Afrika".

Now was that done at most of the meetings you were at, or can't you remember?--Every meeting.

Now tell me what were these meetings? Of what otganisation?--P.A.C. meetings.

Is that the Pan Africanisf Congress?--Xes.
Everyone of them?---Everyone.
You have told us about the various persons who sppke at these meetings and came out with these various ideas, which you have outlined to us, about the killing of the Special Branch and sedzing of the europeans and the filling of them in the Republic and these others things that you've said - what was the reaction of the people who listened to these meetings? Did they applaud what was said by the 30 speakers, or did they not like what was said by the speakers? --They were in agreement with what was said.

Everyone?----Yes.
And did they show that they were in agreement with this, or did they just remein silent?--xes.

Now look at the scoused and tell me, if any of them epart frou Mark Schimers, No, 16, who you have elready told we was one, if any $o_{2}$ the others were cell leaders of these various cells?--Accused No. 6 was Central cell leader.

Yes?---And Accused No, I was the Modala cell leaders.
Yes?---No. 8 Black Rock. That's all I know. 5 Now do you recollect a meeting one day at the housco of Accused No. 16? m-mes, I remember.

Where you wont early? ---Ies,
Now why did you GO early? - - Beceuse it was meeting day.

But I meen, you went to have a maeting, and at the meoting you left early, your meeting broke up cerly?---The meeting broke up early,

Now why did that cell meetint break up egrly?--
Because other people entered.
Jow was Accused No, 16 at this meeting at the cell20 It was at his house?----Yes, he was there.

And did he tell you why these other people were entering and he wanted to have the room?---He said they were members of the Executive.

And what pere they going to do?--No, he didn't say what they were going to do,

But they canc in?---Yes.
And when they came in, your meeting broke up?---Yes.
Now who were those members of the Executive that you saw come in? Are any of theil here emong the accused? 30 Accused No. 1, Accused No 3, John Nrost was already there.

Did he stay on for this Erecutive Neeting?--Yes.

Are those the only ones you can remember?--I also remember that Robext Ramasodi was thers.

Is that the man who is a witness outside here?--

Yes.
Now do you remember going to a meeting once with Kenneth? Which was attenaed by No, 6 Aecused?--Yes.

Now was this meeting in the dark or during the day? ---In the night.

Do you remember where it was?--Behind the cemetery.
And do you remember anything about this meeting 10 d in pasticular?--We took the oath.

Now how did you take this ath - tell me about it Nathan?--No. 6 said we are now taking the oath. We must raise our right hands and then he started reading the oath to us.

Now you told us it was dark, how did he read?-Someone struok a match for him.

Tes?--Then he started reading.
What was he reading from?--From a piece of paper.
Yes, and do you remember what the nature of this 20 oath was?--I remember some words.

What do you remember about it?--Not allowed to divulge any secret of the organisation. If I do so, I accept the penalty of death.

Rather grim isn't it? As that all you remember?-That is what I remember about it.

Now did you have to say this with your hand up?-Yes.
MR. HARWOOD: NO further questions. GROSS-EXANTNATION BY AGCUSED NO. I:

You said you attended a meeting which was held at Jimm's place? $--I$ attended the meeting.

Now you seid something about cell division?---Yes. Was Kenneth there with you?.....Kenneth was not with me, but he was in the house.

He was in that meeting?---Kerneth was not with me, but he was in the house.

So it is proper to conclude that you heard the same things, becagse the same people spoke. You heard the same thinge, as you were listening, both of you, to the same things? --I can't say that he heard the same things I heard.

What I mean iss, when e person adresses that mee- 10
ting, you will hear what he is saying, as he will hegr what he is saying, because you are in the same meeting?-I can't say he will hear what the speaker is gaying.

Anyway, after the cells were divided, was there any election of cell Leaders? Will you tell us something in that connection?--No, I don't romember.

You don't remember people being elected as cell lea-dors?--No, I can't remember.

But if I tell you that Kemeth Molatedi said that one or a few people wors elacted as cell leaders, what would you 20 sey?--No, I will sey no, that I didn't hear them saying that. I would sey that he heard it if he satd so, and I would say that I didn't hearilt.

Was my name ever mentioned in that meating? - -No, I don't remember your mame being mentioned.

Would you say that I was not elocted as a cell leader there? - Yes, I can say so, because I didn't see you being electea.

So you would say I was not elected as cell leader?I can say so, becanse I did not see that you ware elected 30 there,

It is strange, beceuse both of you attended the same
meeting, where there were cell divisions, and one of you says that I Was elected as the cell leader, and you say you don't nemember that, or you don't know or you would say that I was not elected:---It can be so, because some of us were talking to each other in the cormer.

You spoke about a meeting held behind the railway line, did you? - Veg, I spoke about the\%.

Acd then you said something about volunteers?--Yes.
Who called out for these volunteers?--Nkosi, No. 4

## Accused,

You sre quite sure?--Yes, I'm quite sure.
Very, very sure? $-\cdots$ Yes, I'm very sure.
Do you know that Kenneth was asked the same thing whether he was very sure about what he was saying and he said yes, but now if I told you that he didn't say that John asked for volunteers, but I, Accused No. I did, what will you say? ---I would say no, because I know John is the one who asked for volunteers.

Now for your information, Kenneth said I did and not John, and that means either you are telling a lie or Kemeth20 not is!--I'm sure that I'm/telling a lie.

Just as much as he was sure that he was not telling a. Lie! Then you come to the time when you went up to the mountain for bombs- you gaid I told you to follow me, is that true?
BY THT COURT TO ACOUSED NO. I: No, he sald you told him to go to a certain place, and you would meet them thered CROSS-EXAMINATION BI ACCUSED NO, I (CONTTNUID):

So did I go before you, or did I follow you up?-We parted at the same time. 30
We all went together until we were at Skumweberg?-No.

Will you shortly tell the Court about what happened there?--We came to a xtreet, then I went straight up the iinountein and No. 1 Accused took a different street. Then we went up the mountain and we met him on the other side.

You arrived there as you said, and I showed you a fin of $a$ boub, is that true?...- Yes, thet's true.

What did I tell you you nust do now? --Then you said we must collect bombs.

I didn't tell you anything sbout how you would know that it was a bomb here or there isn't? $-\cdots$.-No, you just saidlo that we'll see tails sticking out,

So you collected these bombs, and how many did you collect?---About 11.

If I said you did not collect about 11 but about 8 , what will you say?--I say we collected about 11 , but I don't say that's what you say, I say that's what I say.

And what would you say ip I said that Kenneth said we collected about 8?--Then that is what Xomneth said. I can't say anything sout that, BY THE COURT: Kenneth said 9 and not 8.

So whom are to be believed, you or Kenneth?--I don't know who you muet believe. Each one was collecting and burying the bonks there, and each one wes counting for hingelf.

Did I, et eny stage, tell you something about these bombs? --NO.

I did not tell you what they were going to be used for?-No, you didn't tell me what was going to be done with them.

Not even how they were going to be used, whether 30 we were going to get cannons... ?--We.

So your friend Kenneth with whom you were at the

Skurweberg, said I did!--Xou might have said it to him, because we were all over and not in the same place.

How we corle to the stage of the return from the mowtain now - you said something about a report that had to be given to me, after you had collecten the bombs on a Sunday? --Yes, I said so.

Would you repeat that shortly to the Court please? -No, 16 said that he was going to report to you, Accused No, 2, what we have done.

So it was No, 16 who was supposed to come and re- 10 port to ne?--I dontt know who was suppesed to, He said he was going to report to you.

Is that what he said? He is going to report to me? ---Yes.

But then I was telling you, Konneth and the rest... No. 16 was telling you, Kenneth and the rest of the people? - -No, I ban't say he wes telling all of us,

What do fou mean - he told you slone? --Hu just said it.

When you were all present?---Yes, we were all praaent. So you must all have heard what he was telling you? --I can't say that they have all heard.

But one thingshows that you and Kemeth heard him, because Kenneth gave a report on that too?--I cannot tell you what Kenneth heapd, but I heard.

That is not what Kenneth said, he says that No. 16 said that you people will go to No. l's place to report what you have done for that day, not that he was coming to tell me about what you had done that very day, So you heve heard him say that, Kemeth has heard him say that, but you 30 are giving two different things,--I did not hear him say that. I heard him say that he was going to report.

There's great difference then on a report given by one man to two or more people at the same time. We come to this meeting which you say took place at.....
(Discussion about the above question between Court and Mr. Harwood. The Court also reminds Mr. Harwood that this witness has to be warned on resuming tomorrow morning).

AT THIS STAGE THE COURT ADJOURNS UNIIL $13 / 6 / 63$.

ON RESUMING ON THE 13TH JUNE, 1963.
NATHAN MOLOPE, still under oath
COURT WARNS WITNESS in terms Section 254 of the Act. GROSS-EXAMINATION BY ACCUSED NO. I (CONTINUIED):

You again told the court about a meeting that was held at the graveyard?--Ies.

You told the Court that John Nkosi was the person who spoke there, is it true?---Yes, BY THE COURT: That's no. 4 is it?---Yes. GROSS- EXAMINATION BY ACOUSED NO. I (CONTITUED):

Then you said something about using of as you called them exploders?--Yes.

Who did you say said so?---You NNo. 1 Accused.
You said I gave a reason why exploders sholian't be used, is that correct?--Yes,

Then what was the substitute when we were not supposed to use exploders, as you call them?---You said we must find a piece of iron underneath old motorcars.

I sald so?m-nes.
You say Kenneth Molatedi was present at this meeting? --Yes.

There was not a time when you were absent from the meeting for a while?--No.

There is nothing that you might have been told by Kenneth Molatedi that you might have heard very well at that meeting?---No.

But then how do you account for this - according to Kenneth Molatedi it is not I who said that $\begin{gathered}\text { \% } \\ \text { N }\end{gathered}$ piece of iron, but John Nkosi who said sot--No, you spoke about exploders.

Does it not appear strange to you that one should say I and the other would say John did? Whilst you were listening ?--No, it is not surprising.

Is it not that you came together and attempted to
create a meeting that never existed and tried to compile evidence about ft? $-\cdots N_{0}$, I'm fust telling the Court shat you said at the meeting.

But he was griving the same report too:---I don't understand.

He was giving the same report too, as you are now! Kenneth?--Yes, but I heard you say that.

Very strange, you went on to tell the Court about arrangements that wore made conceming the killing the S.B.'s as they are called?-m-Yes, I did.

Now divided the groups?-.-nkosi, No. 4 Accused. According to my notes here, it is not John Nkosi but Jeff Masemulua Does that perhaps help you to refresh your memory?--Yes, John Niosi divided us.

Are you sure?----Yes, I'm sure.
But Kenneth said it's Jeffg and you were both present at that meetingl-m-Kenneth was on your side, and I was in John Nkosi's side. So Kenneth might have heard such things from you.

Do you want to tell the Court that because you were20 on John Nikosi's side, all thet I seld was said by Nkosi, according to you?--Tres, I heard what John Mrosi said.

That isn't an answer to my question. This is Jeff Masemula, that is John Mkosi. You are on the sỉe of Nkosi, Kenneth is with Mesemula. Do you want to tell the Court that what Jeff Masemule said, w111 be heard as being said by John Nkosi by yovi?--No, I'm just telling the Court, What John asid to me, not what Renneth said. BY THE COURI TO WITMESS: What do you mean when you say that No. 4 was on your sido? $=-A p t e r$ the division, I was fn the 30 group of John Nkosi.

There were $s i x$ of you in that group?---Yes.

And Accused No, 4 was with your section?---Yes. The other six, Kenneth wes one of them?---Yes, that is so.

And Accused No. I was another you say?---Yes, he was with the group thet Kenneth was. GROSS-EXAMTNATION BY ACCUSED NO. I (CONTTNUED):

I am not speaking about after the division, you... BY THE COURT TO AGGUSED NO. I; Look, you asked him why is there this difference. He then seid to you because you were on the side of Kenneth and he was on the side of Accused No. 4. So it may be that Acoused No, 4 said something to him, and you said aomething to Kenneth. Now that is the point. Was that what you had said?---Yes, My Iord. I'm speaking about the division of this...

Just a moment. You kow my note and the note of my assessor, says No. 4 who said "you have now foined the P.A.C. You've taken the oath, You've work to do." The work that Kenneth then said they had to do was to kill the S.B.'s Rolty and Harry were the two names mentioned. And as far as I can make out, it was No. 4 who then said there would be 20 12 Disciples, and he named the 22 disciples. This statement about the weapons and so forth, apparently came from No. 4, not from you, --It is true, that it is John Nkosi, according to Kenneth's evidence, it is John Nkosi who said those words, but when after questioned about the division of the people, Kenneth said it was Jeff. He was asked that question, he did not give it of his own in his evidence, (Turther discussion). BY THE COURT TO WITNESS: Now who do you say divided you up into groups?---No. 4. GROSS-EXAMTNATION BY ACCUSED NO. I (CONTTNUED):

After the meeting, ¿id you go away with Kenneth?-No.

You welked away alone?--We walked together from the mesting for some distance, and then we seperated.

Now ever since that tine did you meet with Kenneth and have the occasion of discuseing what had beon discussed behind the cometery? --No.

Up to the time when you were arrested?--Yes, until up to the time when I was arrested.

And you spoke sbout a meeting, that you've alleged took place at No, $16^{\prime}$ 's place? Do you remember the meeting that broke up early?-m-Yes,

It was a cell meeting, was It? - It was a cell meeting.

You say the meeting broke up eaxly? Were you given any resson?--Yes.

By whom? - - Nito. 16.
What did he Bay?--After the people came in, he said these are now the members of the Executive weeting, and said this meeting is nor finished.

How long wes your meeting on, when that announcement was made?--It wasn't a long while. 20

Could it be one hour or half-an-hour?--No, not even halli-an-hour. Sey 2.5 minutes.

So when he announced that, you movad out of the room?---Yes.

When you walked out of the room, there was nobody yet who entered, whom you could heve seid to be one of the Frecutive members?..-No, I went out with the group, I did not notice anybody that I could have thoucht was on executive member.

In other kords, you did not aea a single person? 30 Whom you could regard as an Ereoutive rember?--No, I dian't notice.

Ws.s Philip Mogaswa present st that meeting?---Yes. Is $i t$ possible perhaps that he could have seen someone enter whom you corld not have seen? --mhode that I saw were alreedy insida.

Who sre these? $-\cdots$ No, 3 , and you No, 1 and Ramasodi.
You went out with Philip Mogeswa and the other group together?---1 can't say that Philip went out with me. Tell me, when these three people entered the room, not one of you had already gone out of that room?--No, $\begin{array}{ll}\text { others were already going out. } & 10\end{array}$

You cannot remember if this Phitip Mogeswa, was one of the fingt on one of the last?-..-He mint have been one of the fixist who went out.

Thon the three entered, wss Philiz Nognswa already out?-...I can't say.

Now this Plilig Mogeswa with whon you ettended that meeting, says that NO. I and Mr. Rawssodi were standing outside near a window, and $N 0,3$ was already in, so that in it aelf expleins that the three of us did not get into that room at one time, ns you are putting it nowl--No, I don't 20 gay that you people came in at the same time, but you did come inside the house.

Were you at that meeting surely? Was there ever such a a meeting?--Yes, I was there.

I put it to you that there has never been auch a meeting, nor hes there been any annouroement by No. I6 that an Executive Meeting was ebout to take IIsce! It probably is a ereation of your om mind!

ACUUSED NO. I: No Purther quastions, CROSS-EXAMINATION EY ACCUSBD NC, 2:

When did you hear about P.A. . for the first time? ---This year.

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$$

You say on one occasion I came there with Accused No. 16 ?---Yes.

Was that the first occasion that you heard about P.A.C.?--Yes, that is the first time I heard about it.

And you say that I was at that meeting on that Sunday? ---Yes.

And was that the first time you saw me? --Yes.
Would you say that all the people that were at that meeting thet dey, did you see all the people? The other people who were at that meeting that day, would you say those people all saw me?--They could have seen you. 11

Molatedi, did you see him there?--Yes, I saw him,
Would you say, from what you saw, could you say whether he saw me?---No, I could not say whether he saw you or not.

ACCUSED NO. 2: NO further questions. CROSS-EXAMINATION BY ACCUSED NO. 3:

You were present at the meeting at the railway lines?--Yes, I was present.

When was It held? What day of the week?--I 20 can't tell when it was held.

Before that meeting took place, did you know me?--No.

So you only started seeing me for the first time that evening at that meeting?--Yes,
about
And you said something/you should not be surprised that we should be meeting at such places, am I right? --Yes.

Did I perhaps tell you the reason why you should not be surprised?-No.

I just made a statement for your information?p-Yes. Now I went on further again and said wo must get
ready for an attack or something like that?---Yes.
I didn't gey whom we were going to attack?--You said the whites of the Republic.

Did I mention when we were going to attack these whites?--you only sadd the time is already near.

And I went on further to sey you must have your weapons ready?---Yes.

Did I explain what type of weapons?--No, you did n ot explain whet type of weapons.

Did I explain why the weapons should have been ready for?--NO, you did not explain.

I just made statementa?--Yes.
I put it to you, that I never uttered such words!I say you did, and you know that you did.

What was the purpose of the meeting, did I tell you? ---I don't remember you saying what the purpose of the meetin พล.

I'll refresh your mind - the purpose of the meeting was to come and assess our organisation's strength in Atteridgeville! And our chiof aim that evening was to see that20 membership fees should be paid, end I even requested you that you should see thet from that day up to the Wednesday, you should all have paid in your subscription fees! That is what I said at that meeting, and nothing about whites, and I never spoke about weapons. And again about the meeting at No. 16's place....

BY THF COURT TO WITNESS: Well, first of all about the other meeting?--I say that I heard you speak about these weapons.

CROSS-EXAMINATION BY ACCUSED NO. 3 (CONT:INUED):
You didn't hear me speak about a membership drive and membership fees and such things? $-\mathbb{N o}$, I don't remember.

That'a deliberate Iie on your part! Again that meeting that took place at Mo. 16 .. when Mo. 1 asked a question here, you beid that jou wre not sure - comect me if I' Wil wsone - you हald thet you ere not sure whether I came in first, and No, I and Ramasodi stayed behind. Is that correct?---No, I am sure that you came in pirst.

And No, 3 and Ramasodi did not follow behind?-mNo, not simultaneously.

What I mean is this - some time elapsed, a few minutes or ao elapsed before they came in?---Yes.

But according to what you tsld the Court yesterday, you said "people came into the roon"? --Wes, that I was referring to when you came in.

Is that people?--Tes.
And you were told that these people were members of the Executive?.--Yes.

And these people were 1,3 and Pamasodi? - Yes.
So, it ism't that $I$ came 10. finst and after some time $I$ and Ramasodi came in?-- 102 all came in eventually.

That's what I'II saytng - you say we all came in. 20 You are now not saying what you said to Acoused No. I:-I didn't say that you did not come inside the house, and I didn't say that you came simultareously. You walked in and the others ones came aftor, brot not immodiataly after you. Bventually all three of you were inside the house.

So when you told the corret that people oame in, you meant I came in, I was the people that came in:-mono, I was not particularly mentioning you, I satd all of you came in.

Well the Court will say what thay thiric about what 30 you are saying.

ACCUSED NO. 3: No further questions.

## CROSS-EXAMINATION BY AUCUSED NO. 4:

Do you remember a meeting when you said that INo, 4 and $\mathbb{N o}$, 16 were at that meeting.... BY THE COURT; You will have to speak up, I can't hear you. GROSS-EXAMTNATION BY ACCUSED NO, 4 (CONTINUED):

You said to this Court there was a meeting where No. 4 and No, 16 were?---Yes.

And Jumbo were present at that meeting?--Yes.
And in this meeting Jumbo talked about the one man, one vote?-Yes.

And then you later explained to the Court all about one man, one vote?-mes.

What do you understand about one man, one vote?--I understand by thet that everyone is given the privilege to vote.

That's what you understand?-...What is what you said. Not No. 4, Jumbo,

Did he really have to say such things?---But he said it.

And then you spoke again abcut a meeting where 10,20 4 talked about Chaka?---Yes.

Do I really have to conduct histroy lessons at mee-tings?--No, you just said so, I don't lmow why. You have to know why you said it!

What Standard have you done at school?--Std. 8.
Stç. 8. I'm sure you've heard ebout Chara for a very long time?---Yes.

And so was it really necessary for me to repeat what you were taught?--ND you it was necessary.

You again spoke about a meeting behind the reilway 30 lines, is that so?-m...Yes.

At this meeting, you say that I asked for volunteers?
---Yes.
Are you sure about that?---Yes, I'm sure.
Sure?---Yes, I'm sure.
Wes Kenneth et that meeting?---Yes, he was.
I'm sure Kenneth couldn't have made such a mistake, of saying that No, I asked for volunteors? ---That I can't tell.

But he was at that meetingl----Yes, he was at the meeting.

You again talked about No, 4 saying aomething of a duty of aome people going to kill other people?---Yes,

Do you think really it is a duty for somebody to kill?--Yes, as we are members, you said so to us,

And as you say you were in the group of No. 4, isn't it?--Yee.

And so if this No, 4 says to people that they should go and kill, isn't it?--Yes.

And so this No, 4 later on what happened to him?-What do you mean whet happened to him afterwards?

Did he go to kill these people?-No.
Oh so, this $1 N O$. 4. tells people to go and kill people and then he runs away:--We were still to meet you.

But you nevar met this No. 4 ? -mNo
After people were arrested, you say that I came to you and said that you should take a. certain somebody who accompenied te to the bombs, is that correct?---Yes.

And then later on I came and said that I wanted
you to take me to the bombs?---Yes.
But why do you think I should just bxing somebody and then tell you to go and show him the bombs? Why couldn't I send... ?--No, I can't tell why you had that done.

And then you telled about my carrying bombs in a
suitcase, is that so?---Yes.
Is it perhaps one of these suitcases?---No, BY MR. HARWOOD: My Lord let us just make it quite clear these suitcases have nothing to do with this case at all. BY THE COURT TO ACCUSED NO, 4: Do you understand? These suitcases have nothing to do with the case. -- But perhaps it looks like one of them. WITNESS: Yes, they are of this type but theas are bigger, and that one was a little old. CROSS-EXAMINATION BY ACCUSED NO. 4 (CONTINUED):

The colour?-Also the same colour, but a bit darker. What do you mean by that?

BY THE COURT: It is clear - darker is darker! CROSS-EXAMINATION BY ACCUSED NO, 4 (CONTTINUEED):
--Just what I said!
And then later on you said thet when the Prosecutor asked you this question thet the people at this meeting agreed with what wes seid?---Yes, and I said yes.

Now if you go to Saulsvilie Station in the morning, and start talking about low wages and something like that, 20 do you think we'll agree with you?---Thet is a public place, and ve were told come and meet, and we were sure we were going to listen to what was being said there. Saulsville Station, you'll just go there and you'll just shout, you'll just talk!

But I say would the people agree with you, with what you are saying?--I can't say because the people there wouldn't have come specially for that. They would be on their way.

You are trying to evade the question! I say would they agree with what is being said? $-\infty$ Well, I can't tell whether they will agree or not!

ACCUSED NO. 4: No further questions.
ACCUSED NO. 5: No questions.
CROSS-EXMMINATION BY ACCUSTED NC. -6:
Have you ever attonded any other meeting except your cell meeting...I mean have you ever a.ttended any meeting of the other cells?--I attended a meeting at your place. I attended your meeting, I was not supposed, and my aim was not to attend your meeting. We came to the place where we, our cell. was attending a meeting and so our people didn't come. You came to our place then somehow something 10 forced to attend our meeting there, because our people didn't come, and your people came. (Answer not interpreted).

As it was not your cell meeting, why didn't you leave?
--I juet wanted to hear what was going on, what was going to be said by you at that meeting.

The time when you orme at that spot, was there any other person there, I mean except of your celli--No, While you were aitting at that place did you hear anybody whistling?--I remember hearine somebody whistling. Who wes that somebody who was whistling?---I'I
afraid I don't remember who was whistling.
I mean was he whistling to you, or just to somebody passing?---I don't know. I can't say.

So by that, I conclude that you never returned that whistle? You never replied to the whistle?--Yes, I did not reply.

Then at this meeting, what happened?---You said that we muat take an oath.

I said that you muat take an oath? ---Yes.
And then?-And you read the oath. 30

And then?--You said we must raise our right hands. And then?--And then somebody lit a matoh to you, so that you can see what you are resding.

And thon?--Then ofcourse, you satd that we must say the words after you.

I read the oath and then you followed me?--Whilst you were reading, we followed you.

You raised the left arm? - The right,
Do you think it ia nomal for mybody of any cell to ettend meatings whioh are not hid cell's?-..-There I can't tell.

After that, was there anybody who apoke? $-\infty$ No, I don't remember.

Just recollected what happened! Tell me was there aflybody who spoke? .-...I say I don't remember.

You don't remember?..$- N^{\prime}$.
What would you say if I can tell you that your friend Konnoth said somebody spoke? If I can tell you that, what would you sey?--I would say Kemneth gaid you wore speaking, but I lidn't say you were speaking.

It's one of the most unusual things thet happened that you attonded a meating which was not of your cell: And as I have sald before, I put it to you that you never 20 attended that maeting, and that at that meeting, the thing that happened was that I read the oath to you, you never raised your amm, never aid you follow y you are putting a story in your mind, putting yoursele in a meeting, whereby you were neven there! You were never at that meeting! And I put it to you that you dian't take any oath, as you were not at that meating, and you dian't follow me, ns you were not at that meeting, but I just read the oath!
ACCUSED NO, 6: No further questions. ACCUSED NO. 7: No questions.
CROSS-RXAMTNATION BY ACCUSEID NO, 8:
Were you at the meeting at the golf courss?---Yes.

And was Kenneth there also?--Yas.
What did you hear No. 3 Accueed say? --He said we must not be surpmised to meet at such places, and he said that the time was near, we must get our weapors ready Did he sperik about weapons?-Nes, I told you now. And did he taik ebout fighting the whites?---Yes. Kemnath was questiongd by No. 3 Accused, and he asid did you hear we talking about weepons? and Kenneth said no, you did not speak about weapons, and ho asked Kennath "atid you hear me talking about pughtyng the whites"? And Kenneth said "No, you did not talk sbout that". MR. HARTOOD: What Kermeth motumlly did sny in his evidence My Lord, was that he could not remember.

BI THE COURT TO AOCUSSD NO. B: The Proseoutor points out that what Konneth said was not that Accraed No. 3 did not say these things, but that he could not remember whether Accuaed No. 3 said these things. CROSS-EKAMINATION EY ACCUSED NO. 8 (CONTTNTJW):

Were you at the meeting behind the cemetery?---Yes. Did jou go with Kanneth to that meeting?---No, 20 Yanneth ame with Philbert.

Did Kenneth come vith Philbext?-w-res. Acoused No. 12.
What dia you aay they spoke at that meeting? --John

When you got to that plaee, did you know what was going to be eaid at that meating?--NO.

Do you know whether it was a cell meeting or not?No.

I put it to you that thexe was no such meeting!--You say so. 30

How many people were at that meeting? $-m$ I oan't say exactly how meny wexe there.

There was no such a meeting! --- There was! I can tell jou the names of people who were there. ACCUSED NO. 8: No further questions. ACCUSED NO. 9: No questions. CROSS-EXAUINATION BI ACCUSED NO. ?O:

You say there was a meeting at No. $16^{\prime \prime}$ s house that ended quite goon?...- Yes, BY THE COURT: Yes, before time. I t ended before it was supposed to. It was eut short!---No, the meeting was not held for a long time, because when those people entered, 10 we were ordered to leave.

GROSS-EXAMINATION EY ACCUSED NO. 10 (CONTINUED):
And you say No, 16 said there was going to be an Executive lieeting?--No, he did not say there was going to be an Executive Meeting held. He only said these are the mexbers of the Brecutive Meeting.

Did he talk about all the paople who were inside?--I think so.

Did he speak to all the peopie who were inside when he said so?---I can't tell whether he spoke to everybody, 20 but I heard him say that.

But when he spoke, all the people were inside?--I can't say all the people were inside.

When he said that, did you understand that the meeting was finished?--He told us that and ordeged us out.

So that when he said that, all the people were in-side!---That I can't say, because when Kenneth came back and these people got inside, some might have gone out, but I dian't notice that. Some might have gone out, so I cen't tell you that we were all inside.

So I say, that when ke said that, he was not speaking to the meeting. He wasn't speaking to everybody, because
the meeting was finished!--I don't say the people were -Iready out, I gaid some people misht have already gone out. Then he apoke there, the people जers ingide.

But was the zeeting finished? -monc.
So the people who were out couldn't have been many, just about one or two?---I think so.

So probably the other people who were there did not hear it?--That I can't tell.

So Mark Shinners, No, 16 only said "you must go out now there is going to be an Recutive Meeting", he didn't 10 show you the people. He just said "now go out, there's groing to be an Executive Meeting", is that what happened?--Yes.

So you deduced that then No, 16 aadd that and these people came in, that these people mere the Sxecutive people, and he was not shown the people. So it shows that this thing wie sort of planned and you did not hoar everything? --I only told what I heard at that meeting.

There was never auch 2 meoting and this is just planned, and now you're making the Court understard that 20 you just heard certain things whinh were saic, whioh I'll call just scraps here and there, snd that is what you're telling the Court now - that you hesrd thet, but I put it to you that there was no such meeting at sll!---You said that this was just planned and the othen could not have heard, so you don't take into account that other people who were at the meeting souid have heard, and now you're saying it was just planned. (IItnags poraonally: Ho, 10 you say that the sort of plan which we wight heve done, some might not have haaxd correctly, but thet showe that the wit- 30 ness might hove heard the right thing which I heaxa.) BY THE COURT TO WTHNPSS: The queation is not what was said,
but what had happened, is that correct?---I don't follow the question.

OROSS-EXAMTNATION BY ACCUSEBE $1 \mathbb{N O} .10$ (CONTTNUED):
I say it is not what was said, it/what happened and that is why, because if it happened.... BY THE GOURT: Look, you must ask the question - that is what the witness is there for! Now do you Wish to ask him a question?---I don't wish to ask a question, but I wanted to make it clear to the Court.

Well you'll get an opportumity to make a statement. 10 AGUUSED NO. 20; NO furthar questions. ACCUSED NOS, $11,12,13,14,15$; 植o questions. ACCUSED 1TO. 16 (GROSS-EXAMIINARION):

Bisto you say I was your cell leader?---Yes.
Was I put there as a cell leader, or was I elected?
.--I just lonew you as the cell leader, I was told that you are a cell leader.

Now do you remember that during the days when Jumbo was still around, we were sort of struggling with our cell, is that so?--What do you mean by struggle? What kind 20 of struggle?

I mean to get on with our cell meetings?---I don't understand.

What I want to put is that there was no response, I mean people did not come to cell meetings, is that so?--, ........ Some ceme

But I mean the response was very poor?--We did not have many members

Would you agree with me that on certain occasions, on thesc days of holding cell meetings, we had to go axound checking on some members?--Yes, I know,

So you would agree with me that when I say that most
of the cell meetings did not actually function, but very fer of them did have a ...?--Wes.

How do you remember at the time when you were told there would be a meeting about... but the venus of the meeting Will not be disolosed te youp--W0, I dontw remember.

Don't jou zemember the tinie whan jou wase told we Would gatber at a partioular spot, and then from there we'll move to a second meeting?--Wo, I don't remember that.

Now you socid to the Count that Tadime Pathlane and No, 4 addressed the meeting, is that sop--I didn't say 10 Perlime addresged the meeting, but in said he said something in the meeting.

So would jou say that he did not address the meeting? ---I oan't say he addressed the meeting. I only sald that he just said something.

Ind math about No. 4?-No, 4 addreseed the meeting. He opered the metting.

What makes you say that Mv. 4 addresadd the meeting? -... What do you mean*...

BY THP COUPT TO ACOUSKI NO. 16: That do Fru mean! He Eays20 he addressed the mocting: You can ask him about how he addressed the meeting and the like, but you can't ask him "what do you mean the addreseed the meeting"?

CROSS-EXAMINATION BY ACCUSSD NO. 26 (CONTTNUED):
How did he address the meeting?-my speaking to us. But didn't Padire Fathlane speak? I mean...

GY THE COURT TO ACCUSED: Oh you know what the differance is between addressing a meeting and just saying something at a neeting

CROSS-ELAMTINATION BY ACCUSBD NO. 16 (CONTINOED)):
Now you know that the previous witness Philip?---Yes. Did you ever see hin more than once at our cell
meetinga? - - Yes,
How many times did you see him?-I remember only two meetings where I saw him,

Could you tell me at which meetings were those?-The meeting at your home where these people came there, where it was said that there was members of the Executive, and then the same meeting that you are talking about now where Nkosi sddressed the meeting.

When was it?---I don't remember when it was.
AT THIS STAGE THE COURT ADJOURNV FOR TEA.
OIN RESUMING AT 11.40 A.M. NATHAN MOLOPE, still under oath CROSS-EXAMINATION BY ACCUSER NO. 16 (CONTINUED):

Whioh of the meetings took place first - the cell meetings or the meeting beyond the railway line? $\rightarrow$-Which meeting took place first the one behind the railway line of the cell meefing? Now which cell meoting are you taling about?---The cell meeting was first.

When did the meeting beyond the railway line take place?---I don't know the date. 20

But would you deny it if I say it was the last meeting which I attended before I was arrested? BX THE GOURT TO ACGUSED NO, 16: Which was the last meeting you attended, do you say?--The meating beyond the railway line.
CROSS-EXXAMINATION BY ACCUSED INO. 16 (CONTINUED):
--No, you attended a meeting after that behind the graveyard

- that is the 12 disciple meeting.

I put it to you that the meeting beyond the railway line was the last meeting I attended, and that you say 30 that the cell meetings took place before the meeting beyond the railway line!---Yes.

What I remeraber is that the only meeting that took place at my hone pras before the one baymat the relilway line! ---Yes, thet's what I say.

But you said to the Cruxit that on one of the...at one of the meetings, you sa No. 3, and then later you said to the Court that it was beyond the railway line, for the first time that you sew No, $3 ?-\mathrm{m}-\mathrm{I}$ said that I saw him for the first time at the meeting beyond the reilway line.

And not at this meeting that you are saying took plece at ny home? when hat ves the second tjrme I saw him. 10

But don't yourbsy the cell meeting took place at my home mad then aftervards the meetine heyond the railway line?--I asked you which meeting you were referring to, and then you said the cell meuting.

Then what in it? - - said that the cell mseting took place before the meeting at the railway line. That's why I spid you muat tell me whet partioular meating you are talking about.

So you agree with me when I say that the cell meeting took place before the meeting beyond the railway line?20 ---Some of tnem. Thet's thy I'm askjing you which meeting you're referring to.

Now you say that you saw No, 3 at one of our cell mentings which as you allege, took place. I mean in my opinion I would any thet they took place before the meating at the railway line, Then in the right sense, bed you seen him at my home on thet particular day, you could have seen
 line? -- I an him for the second time at your home.

No, I put it to you that No. 3 never came to my home 30 well there was a cell meeting. I don't remember such a meeting - --men I'il say that you know very well that he came.

And you said that they were members of the Exeoutive, and you know that you said 1t:

I put it to you that I never said such a thing, and that No. 3 never came to my homel As you make it olear that you saw No. 3 at the meeting eirst beyond the railmay line?---I saw him for the first time there, yes.

If you aearch your memory very weil, you whll remomber that there wna no manl meetinge after the meeting beyond the railway Iine? $\ldots-$ That one did take place.

You bay that....Did jou gay that on the ifirst ocea-10 sion when tre were to go for bombs, where did we meet? Were We to meet haur No. $\therefore$ 's school or at the school?---Do you mean the eirst timo?

The efret time, yes?---We were to meet at No. I's school.

I don't know whether you axe makins a mistake there, but if nt ail you ane mistrion, I will commeot you that it was near the school not at the school? siae the school. We ware tola to meet in the B ohool. Not o utaide the yard, or outgide the school.

Now on the second occasion can you deny the fact that When you retumed from the mouncain, there was sort of excitement? $=$ What type of exoitgment?

I mean we wece talking too wuch and very hsppy ?--That talk meant the same.

Had them I'Ti trying to remind you of how we were talking, and I mean thare Fas that atuosqhate on us belng exeited? - You may have been excited, I wasn't excited.

And that duxing our atay there, there were many idle things that were saic. I mean that you would say something 30 that you know was very possible to perform yourgele?---What are those idle things that you talk about?

I mean there were mehy things, because I think you could not stay silent. Is that what you sre trying to say -that you were silent all the time?--Now what do you mean by silent again? Fe might have talked generally.

What I want to put to you is that we could have talked, I mean oonversations and some jokes, as we went about? - -- Yea, wall it dopends what kind of convergetion you mean.

But I mean there weref---Yes, we must talk to each other! Te are people. 10

So would you seree with me if I say that if I did say that I would make a report No. 1 , it could have been one of the idle thinge that I could have said, if at all I did say so?---You said that on the retum, and I heard it from you.

Now did you say did we hide the bombs or take them? ---Ve hıd them away.

Could a perton just see them lying there, or were they obacured irom viem?--wile hid them awny, so you would not see them. At the second hide-out it was just a hole, 20 and we were told to cover them with grass. If wa hand't covered them with graos, a pereon could have seen them, and the N1sst hide-out was thia smal Dossles, and ve rere forced to put them under the bossies. That's why I $^{1}$ m asking you now which of the three you are referring to?

Do you mean that even if someone had his eyes on that partioular spot, where the bombs were, he would not sae the bomba?--Now which partioulax spot sre you talking ebout?

Any of the spots:-w-We covered them with grass, but30 it was ensy to see them if at all you ceme to them. Now make an example with one particular one of the hide-outs, then

I'll explain.
BY THE COURT TO ACCUSED NO. 16:
I don't want to interfere with your cross-examination but what is the reason for all these questions? There is a statement that these were put under grass. Some of them were apperently visible, you could see something. We have the photographs here, Now what are you investigating?---I just wanted to make it olear that the bombs were not hidden but they were just put together.-

They were not hidden?--No, I mean in my opinion. 10 We just put them together at a spot, but not hidden.

Well, you can put that to him! He has said differently - he has said that in one place there was merely a...in one place they were put under some small bushes, and in another case they were put in a hole and grass was put over them, is that correct? (Witness says yes). BY THE COURT TO WIMVESS: And the third one?-- The third one was a sort of a hole in the mountain there, and we put them in this hole. CROSS-EXAMLNATION BZ ACCUSED NO. 16 (CONTINUED):

Well, I put it to you that we never hid the bombe, but we just collected them and put them there, we never hid them?--Well, then why wouldn't we bave collected them rad put them in an exposed place? Why did we have to go straight to a partiouler hole or to a particular bossie.

Now you say you saw me at the graveyard meeting, and it was said ....NNo, 4 said that the Special Branch people should be killed?---Yes,

Now whose names were mentioned, that had to be killed?--Rolty's name was menticned. Harry was mentioned 30 and Matchini was mentioned, and Kumalo was mentioned there.

Wes it at this very meeting when ... where Kenneth
was?---Yes, he was there.
And I teke it that he could have heard all the names being read out? - --That I can't say.

Now if my memory serves me well, I heard you say that the people wre divided in this fashion that those who stayed in the vioinity of that area, came to be in one group?--Yes, that is correct.

Now in which group was I,--You were in No. I's group.

And what did you say that group had to do?--That group had to kill Harry.

Do I live in the vioinity of Harry?--No.
Now how could they place me in a group of people... ?--They could have run short of one, and they were forced to get you into that group.

I put it to you that had I been there, I would have been in a group in which you were, because we don't stay very far from each other, and that someone that stays near Harry's place could have been selected into that groupl--But you were there yourself, at that meeting!

And I put it... ? - Now what do you mean if you say if you could have been there? And you know that you were taken as one of those who had to kill Harryd Because they ran short of one, so they were forced to select from us, the two sections of the 12 disciples.

Were any plans made at this meeting?--No there was no paper used whatsoever. There were no plans.

Do you think at all that when one was taking such a misaion, he wouldn't set up a sort of a plan or a scheme, as to how to go about that affair of making sure that you 30 kill these people?--How could you have made a plan there when it was night. You couldn't make a plan in the night!

Well, I put it to you that there was never such a meeting, and even if I tried to search my memory, I can't remember of a meeting where we decided to kill anybody: ACCUSED NO. 16: No further questions. RE-EXAMINATION BY MR. HARWOOD:

Were you in the same cell as Accused No. 16?--Tes.
Do you recollect whether, after the various trips that you had with No. 16 to go and collect bombs, whether there were any meetings?---Yes, there was a meeting.

There was certainly one cell meeting thet you sttended?--No, just a group meeting of the 12 disoiples,

After the collection of the bombs?-- Yes.
So the group meeting of the 12 disciples was the only meeting that you attended after the occasions that you went With Accused No, 16 to collect bombs?---Yes. MR. HARWOOD: NO further questions, BY MR. DE VILIIERS TO WITNESS: In the answer to No. 4, you said that he came with someone else and asked you to show them where the bombs were?--To show that person where the bombs were.

Is thet correct?--Xes.
Now did you have to show No. 4 where the bombs were, or did you have to show that other person where the bombs were?---On a different occasion, afterwards, No. 4 came to me and said $I$ must also go and show him where it was.

Now did No, 4 know where these bombs were? Do you know whether he knew where these boinbs were?---He didn't know.

BY THE COURI TO WIMNESS: How many times did you go to show people where the bombs were? People who removed the bombs? 30 --Inree times.

I want to draw Your Lordship's attention to Proclametion No, 91 and Proclamation No, 92, both of the 10th of May, 1963, which are publieed in Governrent Gazette Fo 0.499 of the loth of May. IVhase two proclamations are signed by the order of the Stete President. 10 (Expleins). I would siso Iike to dxaw your Lordship's attention to Proclamation 119 of the 8th of April 1960, which is mentioned in those two proealsmations. (Explains). And I would like to draw Your Loxdehip's attention to Proclamation Tio. 67 of 2962 , Thich for the poriod under revien of this indiatment renewed the requirements of Proclanation No, 279 of 7960, (Kxplaina), BY THE COURT: Well, I muat explain to the accused then, that the effect of what the Proseouton has said is that by proclamation, the organiantion known as the Pan Africanist 20 Congress, has been declared um unlawtul organisation in 1960 , and it has, frow time to time, declaced unlarful and at the time when these acte are alleged to have taken place, thet is from January to karch, that organiaation the P.A.C. was an unlawful organiaation and there are two Iurther proclawations which say that Pogo and "Dunce Association" are the same as P.A.C. Do you follow that? - Yea, Any questions you wish to ask about that?--No questionh by the stocusad,

BY THE COURT: The Court is informed by the Public Proseonton that you are an accomplice of the accused in the offencer With whioh they ave charged. Also that you have consented to give evidence, and I must now in terms of the law, tell you that if you do give evidence, and if you raply fully to all the questions which are put to you to the Court's eatisfaction, then you will be absolutely free from all liability for prosecution for these offonces for which the acoused are boing tried. ---I understand.
(Discusaion about corroboration betwean Court and kr . Harwood).

EZCMCITATION BY MR. HARWOOD:
Now you are 16 years of age, and you are still at scholar ot the Hoffmeyer High School st Atterfdgeville? Yes.

Fow whet did Jimm have to say at this mesting?We went into the house, we sat in the sittring foom, and when wo vere ail in, he stood up, lifted his right hand with the open psilm and said "Iswelethu". After that he sald "this is the vear is which we are going to get out Ireedom".

And did any of you make a reply to this "Iswelethu"
business?--Yes.
That roply did you give?--He said "Be Afrika" after he said "Iawelethu".

How what did he say further, this Jimray?-He said "You, the young people, it is up to you to get our country back".

Now did anyone else speak?--Not that I remember.
Fow was there any discussion there that day about cells? --Tres,

Noy tho spoke about the ceils, do you remember?--10 Jimmy.

And did anyone else speak about cella?---No. (1)
Now do you recollect if Accused Mo. 2 spoke at all at this meeting?---Yes.

What did he say?--At the time when Jimmy spoke about the cells in the lower portion of the cowraship.

What wes the cell that he was prepared to take?-That is the cell of Muzimadale.

Has it aot another name?---ijo, I just know it by the name of Muzimadala.

Wel. is that 01d Atterdig?ville?---That is the old Atteridgeville.

Now as the result of this meeting and various other discussions which you had with certain acholar iriends of 30 yours, did you decide to become a member of the Pan Africanist Congress?--Yes.

Now who opened that meeting?---Accused No. 1.
What did he have to say?--He lifted his hand and
said "Iswelethu".
Tes, and fou sil said "Be Afrike"?-m-ne replied
"Ee Afrika".
Then what did he say?--He ssid there was a person coming who was going to address us, frors Besutolend,

Yes, and had this person arrived yet?-miNo.

That did No. 2 say, do you remember?---He also said we muat get more people.

Anl anythine eleo?--MO.
Now you kno. 7 Kenneth Molatedi? ?--Nes, I know him.
Do you romember if Kenneth pras at this mesting, you had just spoken about?--- Yes, he mar.

And do you remenber if he mas at the other meeting at. . . do you remember if he wes at these other meetings that you spoke aboutn... Not the meotinge that I attended. I did not see him.

But you did soe him at this one?-mes,
Now you don't know all the people who were at these meatings do you?--nNo, I con't know who they sll were.

Is that now the meeting I'm trlkine prout?-m- Yea.
Ind who opened that meetine? --..-Acousesed No, 7.
What did he have to say?--He arid "today we have come to chcose the cell leader".

And what happened then?--Then he wrote down the names of four people.

Who did?--Acelused No. 7 .
Whes he also at this meeting, is that right?--Yes, the meeting was at the house of Accused No. 7.

Yes, but he was also at this meeting?---Yes.
And Accused No, 7 then, you say, wrote down the names of four people?--Yes.

What were those four names, do you remember?---Vishi Kwakwe, Michael Mahole, and Dikgeng Accused No. 6, and he himself.

So he wrote down the names then of Vishi Kwakwa, and Accused No. 10, and Accused No. 7 and Accused No. 6?p-F Yea.

And was No, 10 also at this meeting?---Yes.
Tell me, who else of the accused were at this meeting, if you can recollect?--Nos, 14 and 15 , were s.lso at that meeting.

And do you remember if Kenneth was at that meeting? --Yes, he wes also there.

Now after these names were written down, did you vote? --Yes. 20

Who was chosen cell leader?--Dikgang, Accused No, 6.
And who was chosen as No, 2?---Vishi Kwakwe,

Do youremember if Kenneth went to that one or don't you?e--Yes.

Now a little while after that meeting, did Accused No. 6 come to you again?---Yes.

And did he tell you there was going to be another meeting?--Yes.

Dia your go to it?---Yes.
And did Accused No. 6 speak at it?---Yes.
Did he open $1 t ?--Y e s$.
What did he have to say?---He said those who did not have pangas, could come, he would supply them with some which he had.

And did he discuss anything else apart from indicating that he would supply them with pangas?---He said before we attack, we will ask the womenfolk who are working for europeans in the houses to put poison in their food.

Was that going to be before the great day of the start of the fight?---Yes.

Now did he say anything at all apart from this question of poisoning the food of the Europeans?---No.

Now how was this poisoning to be done? Was it domestic servants working for the Europeans who were going 30 to do this? $-=-$ Yes, and then they had to pdt the poison in the food where they were employed.

On a certain day at a certain time?--Yes.
Who was going to advise them of this time, did he say?--He did not say.

Now was there any talk at all about the Special Branch thet night, that you can remember?---Yes, I remember.

What happoned about thet and who spoke?---Acoused No. 6 epoke.

Yes?--He said there was some of the Special Branch members who were attending school and we must try and kill them.

BY THE COURT TO WITNESS: Attending school?---Yes, he said they were scholars attending school. EXAMINATION BY MR. HARWOOD (CONTINUED):

Nowwho do you regard as being members of the Special Branch. Just Policemen or any other people?--Police. BY THE COURT TO WIMNESS: If they are Police, how oan they be at school?---Those who were scholars, they were Police informers and informed the Police. EXAMINATION BY MR. HARWOOD (CONTINUED):

Now you don't mean... You mean that you don't only 20 Include the Police but informers who are youngsters at school?---Yes, not the Police only but the informers also.

Now do you recollect anything else happening at that meeting? -- - NO, that's $: 11$.

Now do you remember if Kenneth was at that meeting?

BY THE COURT TO WIMNESS: Where was that meeting hela?--At the sports grounds.

What did he have to say about what hombs?---He showed us methods to make the bombs.

How did he suggest you should make bombs?---One of them is that you must take a big bottle.

Yes?--And fill it half up with sand and then put petrol in.

Yes?---And then put matches in and then close it, and then shake it and then throw it.

I see, Did he have any other iebas about any other types of bombs?---Yes.

Whet other bombs did he suggest to you?--Another bottle again - you fill it half with petrol and then fill it up with benzine.

Yes?--And then take a cloth which is a long one, and put it into the bottle and wet it with petrol, and then put it underneath a motorcar and set a light to it. You must set the light to the rag and then it will burn the car.

And did he have any other bright ideas?---There was one with a bottle, you put sand in, petrol and then you shake it and then you throw it.

And did he say what would happen to these things that you threw?--When it strikes the person, if you throw it
at people, it will knock him over.
And pas there any suggestion as to what would happen? ---He'll be dead.

What was the petrol for, just to make it more diffi-cult?---Yes.

BY THE COURT TO WITNESS: But why put petrol in, why didn't you put water in?-Well, that is what he told us to do, end shake it.

Was this thing going to burn or not?---Yes, the way he said it, it will burn and then just when it burns then 10 you must throw its

BKAMINATION BY MR. HARWOOD (CONTINUED):
Now was that all that happened at that meetint?-Yes.

Now do you remember another meeting after this one, at which No, 6 opore?---Yes,

Did he have cnything to say about bottles?---Yes.
What did he say?--He said we must try and get as many bottles ae possible.

Yea?--TT make that type of bomb that he explained. 20
Was there anything else said by Accused No. 6 at that time?--Not that I can remember now.

Did anyone have any weapons at this meeting?-Accused No. 6 had a panga.

Whet did he do with this panga?--When he opened the meeting, he held it up in his hand.

Yes?--When he said "Iswelethu".
Now why did he hold it up in his hondr--Well, to indicate to us that when we come to the meetings we must have our weapons.

What sort of a panga was it that he had?--It was about this length that I show now. Approximately 12-13", and
it was in the form of an axe.
Now dia you see anyone else there with a weapon
that night?--Yes.
Who?--mAcoused No. 11.
What did he have? $--\mathrm{A}_{\mathrm{A}}$ shapp instrument, about $24^{\prime \prime}$.
Was it a knife?---Yes, in the form a knife My Lord.
Now who of the accused were at this meeting, apart from Accused No, 6 and Accused No, 11 who had these weapons? $\rightarrow$ Accused No. 13 was there and No. 14 and NO. 15.

Is that all?--Yes.
Now. . . . .
BY THE COURT TO WITNESS: Where was this meeting held?---On the aports grounds.

EKAMINATION BY MR. HARWOOD (CONTTINUED):
Now can you tell me, was anything aaid by Accused No. 6 about weapons? --w-Yes.

What did he say?---He said we must twy by all means to get weapona, so that we must be ready at any time.

Was there any talk of ammunition?--And ammunition?
$\begin{array}{ll}\text { Yes? }--N \text { No. } & 20\end{array}$
Was there any talk of anything which might be used in a war? - No.

Now was there any discussion that you can recollect, at this meeting about Hak's Garage? -- Yes.

Who had anything to say about that?--Accused No. 6.
Now where is Haak's Garage?--Somewhere in town here.
Right opposite the Police headquarters?---He said in town.

Now what did he say about Haak's Garage in town?-He said we'll set fire to Hak's Garage, and as the people 30 rush there to arowd around the fire, then we'll rush them and kill them.

Was there anything else said by No, 6 at that meeting? $=-\mathrm{NO}_{0}$.

Now do you know Accused No, 5?-Yes,
He was your history teacher wasn't he? He left in January/Pebruary 1963?---Yes.

And were you interested in his history lessons?---Yes.
Did he influence you in eny why?--(Interpepter has difficulty with question).

Well then just ask him what did Accused No. 5 teach him in history that he can rememberi-me said for instance, that the white people came here and chased the black people away foom their land.

Yes?-And they oame here possessing nothing and now they have taken the property of the Bantu people.

And the land as well?---Yes.
And whet did he suggest should be done about this?
Did he say?--That we must now fight for our land.
Was this in the class at school?---Yes.
Now how did you feel about this when Accused No. 5
taught you these thingz?--I was pleased to hear it.
Did you think it was a good idea?---Yes, the way
he said it, I thought it wes a good idee.
Now what did you think was a good idea - that the whites had taken the land and the property of the blacks, or that the blacke should fight to get them beck?--The fight that we'll put up and get our land back.

That you thought was a good idea?-Yes.
Then tell me, did the other members of the class also think it was a good idea?--I don't know. I can only say how I felt. 30

Do you know Evelt Ramatsue?--Yes.
Was he in your history class at that time?--Yes.

How did Fregotso introduce this subject about the land? Wes it when he told you about the causes of the Great Trek or the causes of the French Revolution, what brought him to this?--He was explainigg us as to how the Whites came to be in this country.

Now at these earlier meetings that you attended, apart from what Accused No, 5 might have taught you at school were they all Pan Africanist Congress meetings?--Yes,

Were they all introduced by this salute and reply,?--Yes.

And can you tell me, what in your opinion, was the feeling of the various people who attended these meetings?--

Did they agree with what the various speakers had to say, or did they disagree with them?--They were in agreement with them,

Now how did they show that they were in agreement?--By the way they replied "Ee Afrika",

And apart from that, was there any discussion by you people, during the meetings, any exchange of opinion when a speaker made a certain point?--Yes,

Now what sort of remenics - let me put it to you this way, did these expressions of opinion lead you to believe that the general body of persons who were at these meetings, agreed with what the speakers said?--Yes.

Do you knowe that axe?--It is similar to the one thet Dikgang, No. 6 had when he wes eddressing the meeting.

Axe handed in as EXHIBIT 12. MR. HARWOOD: No further questions, CROSS-EXAMINATION BY ACCUSED NO. II

You say you were present at the meeting which was
held at Jimmy's place?---Yes.

Were you on time or did you perhaps come late?--I was there on time.

You remember very clearly what was said and done there?---No, I don't remember everything.

At any rate you remember about the division of cells? ---Yes.

Were these cells given leaders, or were leaters chosen for these cells?-Mo, there was only said that they would be divided.

No cell leaders were chosen?-mTreept that Jimmy 10 spoke to NO. 2 accused that he would take care of the one down there.

Which one do you mean?---Musimadala,
You are quite sure about that?---Yes.
There can't be any mistake? $-\cdots$ mhat is what $I$ heard. I'm sure.

And then you spoke about yet another meeting which took place at Accused No. I's place?--Yes.

Did you tell the Court who opened that meeting?---Wes.
Who did you say did open that meeting?---Acoused 20 No. 1.

About that also you are very sure? -- Yes.
Will you briefly tell the court what I did or said on opening the meeting, and after having opened?-You stood up, lifted your hand and said "Iswelethu", and then you said "gentlemen, we have met here because there is another gentleman that will come from Besutoland to address us".

Do you lmow who the second speaker was?=--No, I cannot say who that was.

But there was a time when I stopped speaking?---Yes. 30
And you say you don't remember who spoke after me?-You spoke for a long time. I don't remember who spoke after
you.
Now do you know these people - Philip Mogaswa?---Yes.
Nethen Molope?--Yes.
Kenneth Molatedi?---Yes.
Were they also present at that meeting?--The one that I saw was Kenneth.

Now then, if I'm not mistaken, not one of them ever mentioned the fact that I spoke at that meeting! Neither did I open the meetingl What do you say about that? Do you think you are wrong?--Well, from what I know and I was 10 there, I saw you.

Remember you said I spoke for a very long time?-Well, not a very long time.

But it was a long time?--Yes, it was a fairly long time.

Now there is a very grest contradiction there specially when we consider the fect thet I was not mentioned as having opened the meeting, nor delivered a speech!---I was present when you opened the meeting.

And you are very sure that I spoke and opened the 20 meeting?---Yes. ACCUSED NO, I: No further questions. CROSS-EXAMINATION BY ACCUSED NO, 2:

You said you saw me at Jimmy's place at that meeting?---Yes.

Did you come on time at that meeting?--Yes.
And you stayed there until the meeting was finished? ---Yes.

Kenneth Moletedi, was he at that meeting?---Yes, he was.

Nathan Molope?---Yes, he was.
And you said that I volunteered that I would be the
leader of the cell Musimadala?--Yes.
Now when I volunteered, did whisper to Jimmy when I said so, or did I speak loudly? ---Jimy spoke to you with his hand in his mouth, and afterwards Jimmy told us that you volunteered to be the leader of the cell.

Jimmy came to me and he spoke to me as you show with your hand?-...-Yes,

You did not hear what I spid?--No.
So Jimmy then seid that I volunteered to be the cell leader there?--After he spoke to you, then Jimmy said to 10 us you have now agreed to be the cell leader of down there.

That could be that I did not volunteer but that I agreed that I would be?---I don't know whether you volunteered, but he spoke to you.

And then did he say that I volunteered?---No, he just pointed at you and he said "he will be the cell leader down there...dom below".

And when Jimm said that, did all the people hear him?---He spoke, I don't know whether everybody heard him, but I heard him,

And at the time when he was whispering to me, do you think the other people that were there, also noticed that?-I don't know, some of them were talking to each other.

Was I sitting on the floor, on a chair, on a table, or was I standing st the time?-You were sitting on the table and Jimmy was standing fairly near you.

And when I was sitting there on the table, everybody could see me?--Yes.

Would you say that Kenneth would or could have seen me?--Yes, if he hadn't been perhaps occupied talking to 30 someone else, then he could have seen you.
....through the whole meeting. (Interp. forgot to
interpret question). $---\mathbb{N o}$, I wouldn't say through the whole meeting, but whilst you were talking, we amongst each other could talk to each other.

And when I was sitting on the table was he then talking to other people?---I don't know, some people were takin to each other.

Do you know Nathan Molope?--I do.
He was also at the meeting? ---Yes.
Didn't he go out before the meeting was finished?-I did not take notice of that. 10

Whet Nathan Molope said that No. I was supposed to be the leader of that Musimadala?--No, the way I heard it, was when he pointed you.

And Kenneth Molatedi, never saw me at that meeting?-I saw you.

Do you know me for a long time? --No.
And the meeting at the house of Accused No. I, were you present there through the whole meeting? ---Yes.

And I was there? ---Yes,
And when Accused No, 1 opened the meeting, was I there? --I did not notice you then.

When did you notice me? --At the time when we were sining there, I noticed you.

When you were singing?---Yes.
Did I stand up and talk? --No, not whilst we were singing. You had not said anything.

Then I was waiting until you had finished singing? --No, I don't know whether you waited until we finished, but you did talk.

Was that after you had finished singing? --Yes, 30
Did I speak after Accused No. l? --No, before him.
Accused No. I was the first who spoke, then another spoke and
then you, you were the third to speak.
Who was the chairman of that meeting?---They didn't say who the chairman was.

There wes no one who invited me or told me to speak?
$-\infty \mathbb{N o}$, not that I know of.
I'm surprised, because I never heard No. I Accused speak?--I heard him.

I did not hear No. 3 speak either? speak.

And I did not hear No. 6 speak?--I heard him , and 10 you were presentd

I did not say that I was not present, I said I didn't hear thems-mI heard them.

And when they spole was I present?--Yes, you were.
Don't you remember of anybody who came in late? $=-$ No, not that I saw.

You didn't see mepcome in late? - No.
I put it to you that at that meeting I came late, and When I spoke I hadn't heard anybody speak before me and nobody spoke after me, except the person who closed the mee- 20 tingl---I say that I heard you spoke.

Yes, but I say that I spoke after everybody, and when the others spoke, I wasn't thered---I saw you. When No. 3 spoke, you were there.

When No. 3 spoike?---Yes No. 3.
And No. 1 ? --- And No. 1 .
Are you sure?---Yes, I'm sure.
ACCUSED NO, 2: No further questions. CROSS-EXAMINATION BY ACCUSED NO. 3 :

Mashiloane, before this meeting at No. I's place, 30 did you know me? - No, I didn't know you.

So you saw me for the first time at Accused No. IIs
place?---Yes, that is so.
Tell me, whet do you understand by an opening of a meeting? - That means that that is the person who spoke first at the meeting.

I don't understand yous--I say the person who opens the meeting, is the one who speaks first.

I hear you there, but my question is not who is the first speaker! What do you understand by the opening of a meeting? At what stage is a meeting opened?---It is the person who opens the meeting, that speaks.

I see you've got some dipficulty there. Now according to what you say, you say Accused No. 1 opened the meeting? - - Yes.

And he said that the speak we're waiting on had not arrived?--Yes.

And you say he went on further to say something for some time?--Yes.

That wes something independet of the coming of the visitor?---Yee.

Would you perhaps say by way of indication, what 20 aspects his speech touched?e--About getting the whites out.

Are you sure you're telling the court the truth?-Yes, I'm telling the truth.

If I'm not wrong, Philip Mogaswa, said that Accused No. I only made an announcement that the expected guest has not arrived, and in the meantime whilst we were waiting, go on singing, and there was a song that the accused had written on a piece of paper, which you sant while you were waiting for the guest.
BY THE COURT TO ACCUSED NO. 3: Is this Philip who made that 30 statement?--If I'm not wrong My Lordship, it was Philip. CROSS-EXAMTNATION BY ACCUSED NO. 3 (CONTINUED):
--No, I say I was there when he spoke.
I don't know - you say something and Philip Mogaswa says something else. Now I'll really tell you - what happened is this - that Accused No. I had told you that our visitor has not arrived yet and asked you to go on singing, and after you had sung for some time, it was found out that we will wait the whole night and this visitor will not come. Then we decided to go on with the meeting, and I formally opened the meetingl
BY THE COURT TO WITNESS: What do you say to that?--NO, 10 I say Accused No. I spoke first, and therefore, I say he opened the meeting.
CROSS-EXAMINATION BY ACCUSED NO. 3 (CONTINUED):
That is your opinion!---Yes, that is what I saw. After declaring the meeting opened, I tendered an apology, because of the disappointment we met that evening? An-that our expected guest did not come, and for your information, that guest was not from Basutoland You said you listened to my speech?--Yes.

Would you recount to the Court what I said. BY THE COURT: Let's first of all get this. The accused says that he apologised because the guest had not come, and this guest was in any event, not from Basutoland. Now what do you say to that? - -No, No. I Accused when he opened the meeting, he said to us that we are waiting for a person who comes from Basutoland.

CROSS-EXXAMINATION BY ACCUSED NO. 3 (CONTINUED):
No. I Accused will say under oath that he never expected anybody from Basutoland!---I heard him say it. Now could you just tell us briefly, what I said 30 that evening?--You spoke about the recruiting of people, and you said that we must obtain and keep ready pangas. That'
about all I could say.
That's about all you can remember?--Yes.
Now I put it to you that you are deliberately misinterpreting what I said that eveningl--No, that is what I heard you say.

Before I prove to the Court that th's a misinterpretation, I would like you to tell me how long were you a member of the P,A.C. by then?---You mean at the time of the meeting at Accused No. I.

Yes?--It was just shortly after I joined, it wasn't a long time.

Could you give us a rough eatimation, it doesn't have to be exact?--About three weeks.

Did you realise then that organisation had not long been started? $-\infty$ No, I didn't reslise that.

Didn't you hage some discussions with your fellow friends?--No, I had not had discussions.

According to you, you were about three weeks a member of the organ, then?--Yes.

Do you recall upon what day this meeting took pla- 20 ce?--It was on a Saturday, but I don't know the date.

The month?--- No , not the month either.
Well I'll give you some information there - that meeting took place roundabout the 17 th or 18 th of February! the as you had said earlier, you were at a meeting at Jimm's place, and up to then we had not had any word from our head office....
BY THE COURT: Do you know about that?---No, I know nothing about it.

CROSS-EXAMINATION BY ACCUSED NO 3 (CONTINUED):
5 And we did not have any instruction from them, and= because of these facts, we were mainly concerned about getting new members to join in the organisationd Sil I agree
with you when you say I appealed to you to recruit more of your schoolmates. There you are definitely correct. BY THE COURT TO WITNBSS: Do you say that is so?--Yes. GROSS-ETXAMINATION BY ACCUSED NO. 3 (CONTINUED):

But I'm efraid to sey I disagree with you when you say I spoke on arms snd esght: So I put it to you that you didn't hear me spesking about any resurrection or any fight! --No, I heard you speak about that. ACCUSFED NO, 3: No further questions. CROSS-EKAMINATION BY ACCUSED NO. 4:

Mashiloane, how long have you known me?--I saw you for the first time at the meeting that was at Jimmy's place. Did you know my name before you were arrested?No.

Did you know my name before you were arrested?--Yes, by the time I was arrested, I knew your name.

You knew my name very well?--Yes.
But then how could you say to the police or some other person, somebody with a black blazer addressing a meeting?--Yes, well this black blazer, I saw you wearing 20 at the first meeting at Jimmy's place.

And then at the meeting at No, I? $-\cdots \mathrm{NO}_{\mathrm{N}}$, I did not notice what you were wearing there.

But now the Prosecutor Just aaked you somebody with a black blazer spoke at this meeting, and you said yes. BY THE COURT TO ACCUSED NO. 4: Yes, that is quite correct, and then he said was it No, 4 and he said yes. That's the way the question was put, it doesm't mean that this person didn't know your name, -- But My Lord, I have the feeling that he never lnew my name.

Pardon?--I feel that he never knew my name.
You think he never knew your name?--Yes.

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
