advantageous that he should be elected by the body over which he is to preside, in the expectation that his personal qualities and experience equip him to carry out these duties. The mayor's function in the council is analogous to that of the Speaker in Parliament, and the tradition of impartiality is firmly established.

Furthermore the mayor is the ceremonial head of the town, the patron of its charities, and to some extent the embodiment of the citizens' social conscience. It is appropriate that the holder of this office should be chosen by the elected councillors. The present system, whereby no mayor holds a long term of office, is a guarantee that no vested interest in such an office can grow up.

An appointed mayor would, in all probability, not be expected to be merely a ceremonial head and impartial chairman but a vehicle of policy. His responsibility (as in the case of appointed commissioners) would be to those by whom he was appointed, and not to the council of the citizens. Deadlock would be inevitable; for the system of an executive officer not responsible to the law-making body is well-known to be almost impossible to operate, except where there is complete homogeneity of outlook, such as in a small rural or village community.

In Germany, where the burgomaster system has been long established, the office of burgomaster tended to become a political appointment, even during the period of the Weimar Republic. Further, that the system was no less immune to corruption than other systems, was evidenced in the famous Boehss affair, in which the guilt of the Oberburgomeister of Berlin was proved in court, as well as in other cases.

The Committee considers that the institution of a system of appointed mayors or burgomasters in the Transvaal is completely undesirable and will not provide the solution to the present defects in local government.
