untiring efforts we have never lacked essential supplies during this most difficult year.

The willing and efficient help of my assistants has contributed in great

measure to the health and happiness of all in this department.

# Lovedale Hospital Board

### REPORT FOR THE YEAR 1942.

Dr. W. C. J. Cooper reports:

As was only to be expected 1942 proved a rather difficult year in many ways and some of the activities of the hospitals had, unfortunately, to be curtailed. In February Dr. Guinness, the Medical Superintendent, was granted military leave, thus reducing the medical staff to three. Because of this, we were compelled to stop the clinics which Dr. Ryan had been conducting in the outlying villages. This step caused great regret to all as very valuable work was being done, but we are hoping it may be possible to reopen one clinic this year as the Medical Aids will take up much less of our time than previously. Due to the temporary shortage of qualified nursing staff the Midwifery Training School also had to be closed down during the year. This shortage is now largely passed and we are hoping, in this instance also, that it may soon be possible to reopen this branch of our work which is so greatly appreciated by nurses who wish to take their midwifery when they have finished their general nursing training.

# THE WORK OF THE VICTORIA AND MACVICAR HOSPITALS

The admission figures of the Victoria Hospital for the year show a slight decrease of thirty-seven compared with the previous year. This is accounted for by the fact that for more than six months the Maternity Department has been closed to all except abnormal cases. From January 1st 1943 we are again admitting normal cases to this Department.

There has been a fairly severe outbreak of Typhus in this district but by the end of the year this seemed to be well under control and new

cases are now less frequent.

Another relatively severe outbreak of Enteric Fever has been experienced, but this has now completely passed though we still get our

usual sporadic cases.

The Macvicar Hospital has been filled almost to capacity throughout the whole year. Unfortunately many of our cases still come far too late for any hope of cure, but happily this does not apply to all. Many of the patients are becoming more reconciled to the fairly prolonged period of hospitalisation which is essential for cure.

We would like to express our gratitude to the Cape Provincial Administration and to the Public Health Department for their continued help throughout the year and for the spirit of cooperation which exists

between them and the hospitals.

#### THE ORTHOPAEDIC WORK

Our Orthopaedic Wards have been filled to capacity for about three years, and we have children still on the waiting list who have been waiting two years for a vacant frame. The result to these unfortunate waiting children can well be imagined, and many parents do not even bother to bring their children as they know they cannot be admitted. The National Council for the Care of Cripples in South Africa is most anxious that this intolerable position should be rectified as early as possible, and have asked for plans and estimates of a new Orthopaedic Block to accommodate about one hundred children with facilities for further extensions should these prove necessary. Towards this new Hospital we have received two very generous donations, one of £2,000 from the Nuffield Trust and another of £3,000 from the Chamber of Mines. The Board is grateful for this assistance towards the heavy building expenditure which will be involved.

### THE TRAINING OF NURSES

With seventy-five probationer nurses and the period of training reduced from four to three and a half years, a great deal of work is thrown upon the nursing, and to a less extent upon the medical staff. to get this increased number of girls through their examinations in the shorter time. Our very successful results testify to the quality of the teaching our nurses have received, but most of the credit must certainly go to our Teaching Sister. In the past year thirty nurses have been successful in the Preliminary examination and twenty-seven have been successful in the final State examination.

In March we received word from the Public Health Department that they were prepared to proceed with the extensions to the Nurses' Home rendered necessary by the opening of the Macvicar Hospital. This generous action on the part of the Public Health Department in such difficult times was deeply appreciated by the Board. The building which is nearing completion reflects great credit upon Mr. Smith of the Lovedale Building Department both for its appearance and utility. These extensions will meet a need which has been very acute during the last

three years.

Under this heading also it might be appropriate to mention the opening of our new tennis courts which are giving much pleasure as well as greatly needed exercise and recreational facilities to the nurses.

#### MISSIONARY WORK

During the year the Rev. W. M. Macartney and the Rev. J. J. R. Jolobe were appointed chaplains to the hospitals. We wish to record our appreciation of the assistance they have rendered, in many ways, both to staff and to patients. Also we would again express our gratitude to the Lovedale Bible School for the help so willingly given by the Evangelists in the visiting of patients and by conducting services.

# The Library and Cultural Societies

### CUTHBERT MEMORIAL LIBRARY

Hon. Librarian: Mr. A. J. Raymer. Asst. Librarian: Mr. R. Senyama.

Mr. Raymer reports:

The growing shortage of publisher's stocks and the increased cost of our books, when available, have made more difficult the maintenance of good Library services this year. The number of books read by the students, however, constitutes a record, exceeding the previous record of 1940 by 80 books, a gratifying and significant fact in such a year. We are much indebted to the British Council for overseas periodicals regularly and freely received under their Library supply scheme. The wide selection of papers and journals, housed in new covers, has made available fairly complete information on current affairs, including illustrated brochures of America at war, received from the U.S. Consul's office. Dr. and Mrs. Wilkie, always good friends of the Library, presented us on leaving with 161 volumes, ranging from African sociology to science and fiction. We are most grateful for this catholic and solid addition to permanent "basic stock."

Student Section.

During the year a record total of 5445 books was read, exceeding the previous highest total by 83. Fiction accounted for 66% of the books taken out, Bantu Literature for 9%, while Travel and Biography claimed 4% each. An average of 170 books per week was read throughout the working year. Losses and damage have been remarkably small. Each student has, this year, had his own loan card in the files, and the recording system has proved valuable both for inspection and for teachers' general information. A satisfactory use has been made of the Library and discipline has been almost without exception good. Additions totalled 213, including 94 fiction titles, 107 non-fiction, and 12 pamphlets.

General Section.

The limitations of war conditions have been more marked here than in the Student Section. Nevertheless, 908 books were borrowed, of which fiction represented 56%, at an average rate of 22 books per week. 138 of the books donated by Dr. and Mrs. Wilkie have been added to stock. Apart from these, 59 new fiction titles were received, 30 non-fiction and 17 current pamphlets, totalling 106. Overseas orders have been considerably delayed but we hope to keep up the stock of new books from other sources in 1943, and believe that members will be indulgent of temporary shortages in the meantime. Finances remain sound.

Throughout the year Mr. Senyama's ready and conscientious services have maintained smooth and efficient running for which we are very grateful

to him.

### THE LITERARY SOCIETY

President: Mr. Quintin Whyte.

Mr. Whyte reports:

The programme, beside the usual debates, contained the Staff and Fort Hare Debates, Play-readings, a Mock Election, and a Concert on behalf of Native comforts. Members of the staff, Miss Bartlett and Miss Gordon, Mr. Makalima and Mr. Raymer, were good enough to undertake the production of one act plays, while a student member also produced one. Professor Darlow of Fort Hare and Mr. Matlhare gave interesting lectures and the Mock Election proved a novel feature which met with great success. The Concert raised over £5. The Society again was responsible for the "Emblem," which, eagerly contributed to, met with a ready sale.

The success of the year was largely due to the enthusiasm, co-operation, and hard work of the student-chairman and committee, together with other members of the Society who willingly worked behind the scenes. The committee's only regret was that the Training School did not take a proportionate share in the activities of the Society. Next year, however, should see a change, for the chairman and a majority of the officials and

committee are from that department.

# General

## THE STUDENTS' CHRISTIAN ASSOCIATION

President: Mr. D. A. Coghill.

Mr. Coghill reports:

Our most important innovation was the "project-programme" for the 2nd session suggested by Mr. Macartney on "The Christian Soldier." This produced an excellent series of addresses from Fort Hare and Lovedale speakers, including a few commendable students "efforts." We hope that it will be possible to publish a synopsis of these at some time.

Among the other activities of the S.C.A., the work of the Missionary Companies deserves special mention. Cooperation with Mr. Grant and his evangelists inspired our work with new enthusiasm and direction and

we look forward to joining with them again next year.

Special thanks are due to our Convenors and Committee Members, Miss Moore-Anderson, Mr. Macartney, Mr. Gilowey, Mr. White and Mr. Zulu and our pianist T. Matshikiza.

The General Secretaries, L. Mbelle and A. Mbali, with their assistants formed a very willing efficient Committee. Several innovations were thus

possible.

The Registers, for example, showed that all classes attended well except

perhaps the Industrial groups and Form I.

The two Bible Knowledge Competitions overwhelmed the President and Secretaries with papers to mark. The Senior Girls did very well in these tests; S. J. Balintaba being outstanding.

### WAYFARER-GUIDE REPORT

Captain: Miss M. E. Moore-Anderson.

Miss Moore-Anderson reports:

Steady work was done by the Wayfarer-Guides during 1942, and sixtyeight proficiency badges were gained. We are very grateful to all who

helped with the training and testing necessary.

Mrs. McNeillie, the Chief Commissioner for Girl Guides in South Africa paid us a visit accompanied by the Provincial Commissioner, Mrs. Neil Paterson. This visit is memorable for the revelation it brought to the Guiders of the charm and sympathetic understanding of our Chief Commissioner. We hope that Mrs. Paterson will visit Lovedale again before very long.

A joint service was held in Alice on Guide Sunday for the first time. European and African Guides, Wayfarer-Guides, Brownies and Sunbeams took part in this service together, and were addressed by our Principal.

Towards the end of the year Miss Wood took over the junior detachment following the resignation of Miss Moss. We are very grateful to Miss Wood and hope she will long be able to carry on this work of which she has already so much experience elsewhere.

### LOVEDALE COLPORTAGE COMMITTEE

Mr. A. D. McNab reports:

The Colportage Caravan obtained permission to work in the Divisional areas of Albany and Alexandria and in the Municipal areas of Grahamstown, Uitenhage and Somerset East. The latter area stands greatly in need of such services as Mr. Kidwell is able to perform, particularly among the Native peoples. Permission was refused to work in the New Brighton area of Port Elizabeth. Petrol rationing has greatly restricted the operations of the van but authority has been received from the Central Road Transportation Board at Pretoria to travel 400 miles per month.

Hawker's licences are a serious drain on the funds but the Receiver of Revenue has approved a refund of £58 10/- in respect of licences taken out in the period January, 1940 to June, 1942. This was done as an act of grace and may not be regarded as a precedent for the future. Hawker's

licences for this year have been taken out.

Bibles, Testaments and Hymn Books are becoming more difficult to obtain, but strangely enough, Scriptures alone to the value of £116 were purchased in 1942 as against only £39 in 1941, while 552 Bibles were sold in 1942 against 444 in 1941. The total sales of all books rose from £379

in 1941 to £394 in 1942.

The work of the van is not to be measured in terms of pounds, shillings and pence. Its influence in the outlying districts amongst all classes of the population, and not least among the African people, is very valuable, but it is feared that the work cannot be continued unless the van can be replaced by a much lighter, more economical and more comfortable vehicle.

The Committee places on record its very sincere thanks to Mr. Kidwell and his assistant Isaac for a year's work well done under most difficult

conditions.

The Secretary and Treasurer regrets he must ask to be relieved of the duties connected with this committee.

### LOVEDALE HEALTH AND SOCIAL SERVICE COMMITTEE: 1942

Mrs. Macquarrie, Honorary Secretary, reports:

As in former years during 1942 the Health and Social Service Committee continued to carry on the supplying of milk to necessitous children attending the Lovedale Practising School, the supervision of the District Nurse, the investigating of home conditions of T.B. patients in the Macvicar Hospital and inquiring into and helping needy cases in the district. The Committee was able also to provide the equipment for a girl who had been a patient in the Victoria Hospital for five years and to secure a bursary to enable her to become a boarder at the Girls' School.

The amount spent on milk for the Practising School was less than in 1941 but it is hoped that we shall be able to increase the amount next year. During the year ninety children received one half pint of milk

daily.

The District Nurse continued to visit the villages of Ntselamanzi, Gqumahashe, Dyamala and Gaga. As well as giving advice and treatment, she gave talks on general hygiene and the feeding and care of babies. Each Wednesday she held a prenatal clinic at a centre convenient for the whole district. This clinic was fairly well attended. At the end of July Miss de Klerk of the Public Health Department inspected the work of the District Nurse and made many helpful suggestions for bettering the service. She felt that an excellent beginning had been made and that we should do all we could to extend the service. At the request of the Local Council, from March 1943 the District Nurse is to be located in a village further removed from the hospitals and medical attention. The Village, in which the people themselves are to provide suitable accommodation, is to be Mabandla's, a thickly populated district where it is felt the services of a nurse will be a great benefit to the people. The District Nurse will then be under the direct control of the District Surgeon. In February Nurse Winifred Rawana was appointed District Nurse. She felt the cycling to cover the big district she served to be too much for her strength and left at the end of September. Since then, unfortunately, we have been unable to fill her place.

During the year £295 10s. 6d. was received from the Cape Silver Jubilee Fund for the dependents of T.B. patients in the Macvicar Hospital. This sum was much appreciated and made a great difference to the

peace of mind of many patients.

Donations amounted to £65 18s. 3d. and special efforts, concert, picture

show and sale of sweets increased our income by £27 5s.

Two cases of extreme need in the district were brought to our notice and we were able to help the families over a difficult period. It is hoped that members of our large committee and others will see that cases of need are brought before the committee as it is felt that more personal work could be done in the district.

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# Sports and Athletics

Athletic Union: Men's Section.

Mr. P. Gilowey reports:

The Annual Athletic House Competition was held on 21st March and resulted in a very successful meeting. Competition was keen and only a few points separated the first three houses when the last race had been The Juniors also did well. Livingstone House won both the Senior and the Junior competitions.

The Annual Inter-Institutional Athletic Sports took place on the 18th April on the Lovedale Sports Ground, Lovedale being the host. A good all-round team, captained by C. Mampunye, an athlete and a sportsman whom Lovedale is proud of, and under the care of Mr. T. Atkinson, won the Governor-General's Cup for the third year in succession. team gained an overwhelming majority winning no fewer than 42 points out of a possible 63.

In Soccer Football, the Juniors, ably supervised by Mr. Manyuka, were most enthusiastic and played several matches against Healdtown and St. Matthews. This group, becoming annually larger, deserves consideration when future official fixture lists are drawn up.

Mr. Coghill, convener of Soccer, reports that the Senior Soccer has become an inverted pyramid. At the top an excellent First Team, with a good captain in Tabata and a nucleus of experienced players; for the ordinary player we had nothing but a few inter-class matches, the house captains being unwilling or genuinely unable to organise House matches or even practices. Travelling difficulties, if nothing else, may force us to improve matters in 1943.

Mr. Myburgh, convener of Rugby Football, similarly reports no interest in House matches. The two senior and two junior team players were, however, very keen and maintained interest in the game until the end of the season. The captain, W. Siyo, needs a special word of thanks, for he proved himself a competent leader and a real sportsman.

Mr. Sopotela, convener of Cricket, reports a very successful year for the senior cricket team which won every match played. Lack of material and difficulties of travel may curtail cricket matches to a great extent in 1943.

Tennis remains popular among the students and the courts are seldom empty after school hours.

Travelling restrictions will probably affect all branches of sport to a

great extent in 1943.

In conclusion we wish to thank all those who so willingly devoted so much of their time to the various branches of sport; also to those who showed interest in attending matches. To Mr. MacGillivray we extend special thanks for the time he has spent keeping the sports grounds in such perfect condition as well as for entertaining visiting teams and arranging for the transport of our own teams.

Athletic Union: Girls' Section.

Owing to war conditions sports apparatus is becoming increasingly difficult to get and our sports trips have also been cut down, making it impossible to finish our Inter-Institution matches this year.

Rounders: A fair amount of promise has been noted this year, but interest could be stimulated next year by a few inter-class matches.

Tennikoits: At the beginning of the year the students were very keen and attendance at practises was good. However, in the 2nd Session interest flagged, and very little was done to keep the game alive. We hope next year will see greater interest.

Tennis: It is with regret that we have had to say goodbye to our tennis coach, Miss B Meyer, who is now on active service, but we were very pleased when Miss L. Noveve offered to carry on. The standard of play this year has been good, and they showed a good sporting spirit in the matches we saw played at Healdtown. Here they lost by a few points after many good games.

Athletics: The girls were very keen this year and turned out in quite good numbers to train. This year we carried away the Inter-Institution Cup, having won 10 points in all. Dodds House won both the Senior and Junior Athletic Cups. We hope this keenness will continue next year.

Netball: The matches this year were all good, clean games, and the

Lovedale teams did well, having lost only two matches.

The Inter-house matches were well played, and the spirit on the playing fields very fine. We noted with pleasure that the juniors have been particularly keen this year, and have played some good matches against Healdtown Junior teams.

It is with pleasure that we can say that we have netballs with which to play next year, and we hope that the girls will be just as keen as they

have been this year.
