Dear Dr. Xuma,

The question you ask in your letter of 25th January is easy to answer in one way and difficult in another.

The average cost per annum for books we reckon at from £5 to £6.

The number of students genuinely unable to purchase books to this amount is very difficult to estimate. I suppose if they became aware that it would be possible to get help very few would admit that they were able to meet the cost. In one department I pay half the cost of approved textbooks but even then, some do not buy them! We have of course been somewhat handicapped during the war like all others *in obtaining textbooks* but now I think we must insist that if a man is to be in a class he must provide himself with the necessary text-books.

There are genuine cases of inability and these we endeavour to help in one or two ways.

I am sorry not to give you a better estimate but there it is.

Our enrolment in 1946 will be 320 students an increase of 40 on last year's.

Dear Sir,

The Reef Advisory Boards and other organisations' Conference which was held at the Bantu Men's Social Centre, Johannesburg, last Sunday, January 27th, was very well attended. The most important item on the Agenda was the transfer of the Pass Regulations from the Central Government to the Local authorities. A full debate on the intentions of the Government and Local Authorities revealed the worse form of oppression contemplated. The Municipalities Conference which is to be held in Cape town in March will meet the Government in order to complete the transfer. On April the 1st, registration will be carried out by the Municipalities unless we stop it. The Municipalities insist that women be medically examined and carry passes, that all Africans including Exempted Africans, Teachers, Ministers, Business-men etc. must be registered. The Conference unanimously resolved that an urgent Conference be summoned for SUNDAY, 17th FEBRUARY, 1946 at 10 a.m., in the Bantu Men's Social Centre, Eloff Street Extension, Johannesburg, of all Transvaal Advisory Boards, African National Congress (Transvaal Section), Democratic Party, All African Convention, Communist Party, Trade Unions, Ministers' Associations, Daughters of Africa Association, Teachers' Association, Business-men Association and all other bodies interested in African welfare.

Please attend and accept the challenge to African manhood.

If possible, write and inform the Secretary of the number of delegates you intend to send. We are sending extra copies, which please distribute to other interested and affected organisations.


