The banning of the newly-elected President of the South African Students Organisation, Mr Henry Isaacs should be regarded by the Black Community as a deliborate onelaught on Black leaders by the racist government of South Africa, with a view to cruching Black leadership in this country.

The fascist action taken on Henry Isaacs should not be viewed by Blacke as just an isolated incident and an action directed at students only. It should however be seen as a direct attempt of extinguishing and a dehumanisation of the Black Community as a whole.

B.P.C. calls on all Black leaders as well as all members of the Black Community to refuse to be intimidated by bannings and variuos assaults directed at all Blacks by the rascist, fascist government of South Africa. Such action against our people should on the other hand strengthen our determination to fight relentlessly for the liberation and the total emancipation of Blacks from perpetual slavery and oppression.

It should be clear to all those who are committed to the Black liberatory struggle, that there is no freedom which can be delivered to the oppressed on a silver-plate. This type of freedom is no freedom at all. In the real struggle for liberation Black people should be prepared to suffer human losses, and we should be prepared to suffer for our freedom which we hold dear.

The time has passed when Blacke should be afraid of going to prison for their convictions. In fact as has been said many times, South Africa is a big jail for Black people.

There are many lea ere who have suffered for the Black struggle and many more ware to suffer if the struggle is to be won.

B.P.C. calle on S.A.S.O. leaders and all members of the Black Student Organisation to show courage and dedication at these times of cowardly acts directed at them. They should regard the banning of their leaders as an honour and an indication that S.A.S.O. is still relevant to the cause of the Black man in South Africa.

B.P.C. pledges solidarity with Mr Henry Isaacs and S.A.S.O. as well as all the victime of raccism and oppression in South Africa.

We hope that the high state of brotherhood and solidarity shall be maintained until Azania shall be free.

As your representative(s)shall by now have reported the proceedings of the 6th GSC a number of resolutions were adopted of which one merits your special attention. The said resolution is Resolution 39/74 which hold:

'That this G.S.C. noting,

- (1) the close relationship existing between SASO and BPC
- (2) the fact that members of SASO are also card-carrying members of B.P.C.
- (3) that this dual membership creates a multitude of problems when it comes to the administration and imple-2/mentation of



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mentation of activities and schemes,

(4) that invariably active SASO members hold executive portfolios or are also very active in BPC

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- (5) that BPC could never really muster the community support and involvement it deserves due to this stiffling participation of SASO members.
- AND FURTHER NOTING

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- that the pat attribion between SASO and BPC was a direct result of the factors noted above
- (2) that it was perhaps unfortunate that SASO came before BPC to fill the vacuum created by the repressive measures launched against the Black Community by the white racist regime, thereby forcing SASO to spread her activities over a broad and diverse field.

THEREFORE RESOLVES TO

- to let members of SASO assist in the establishment and initiation of BPC branches
- (2) to prohibit people who are in the administration of SASO participating in the administration of BPC activities
- (3) to communicate the contents of this resolution to BPC'

Thus read the resolution that underwent a hot and trying deliberations. We sincerely hope and wish that this resolution will assist toward the flawless running of the Black Movement.

May I also state that you shall receive further communique from us.
