VERSLAG VIR DIE JAAR GEËINDIG 30 JUNIE, 1940.

Die Carnegie Nie-Europese Biblioteek, Transvaal, is 'n inrigting wat leesstof vir alle Nie-Europese inwoners van die Transvaal verskaf. Daar geen Afrikaan of Gekleurde persoon boeke van enige Openbare Biblioteek vir Blankes in die Transvaal mag uitleen nie, is die Nie-Europese Biblioteek ongetwyfeld 'n baie noodsaaklike instelling. Sonder die hulp van hierdie Biblioteek kan baie min van die Transvaalse Nie-Blankes die genot van lees ondervind.

Die Biblioteek is in 1931 gestig, toe die Carnegie Korporasie van New York £1,000 aangebied het vir die aankoop van boeke vir die gebruik van Nie-Europese van die Transvaal, met die voorwaarde dat plaaslike outoriteite die finansiële verantwoordlikhede vir die instandhouding van die Biblioteek, asook die onkoste van vervoer, ens., sou onderneem.

Daar dit onmoontlik sou wees om ondersteuning van Munisipaliteite te verwag onmiddelik na die ontvangs van die Carnegie toelae, het die Witwatersrandse Raad van Onderwys besluit om £120 per jaar, vir die eerste paar jaar van die Biblioteek se ontstaan, vir die instandhouding daarvan, te betaal. Van Augustus, 1932, tot die einde van 1935, het die Biblioteek hierdie ondersteuning geniet.

Van begin af het die komitee besluit om die „Reisende Biblioteek Stelsel,” soos gebruik deur die Germistonse (Carnegie) Openbare Biblioteek, vir sy Skool- en Plattelandse-biblioteekskemas, te volg.

Onder die „Reisende Biblioteek Stelsel” kan 'n kleine voorraad boeke baie dienste doen. 'n Hoofkwartier-biblioteek koop die boeke, katalogiseer hulle, en stuur hulle in klompies van vyftig, of meer, na die verskillende sentrums van die stelsel.

Elke sentrum het sy eie betaalde of vrywillige Bibliotekaris wat die ontvangs van die boek erken, en wat die persone, woonagtig in die omgewing, aanmoedig om te lees. Lede betaal geen intekengeld nie. Die Bibliotekaris registreer die lenings van boeke. Van tyd tot tyd stuur hy verslae aan die Sentrale Biblioteek waarin hy aansoek doen vir sekere boeke

wat spesiaal deur die lede van die sentrum geëis word. Nadat die boeke klaar gelees is, versamel die Bibliotekaris hulle weer, en stuur hulle terug na die hoofkwartier. Daar word hulle omgeruil en 'n paar dae later ontvang die sentrum 'n nuwe stel boeke. Die kaste waarin die boeke vervoer word, kan soos boekrakke gebruik word.

In die laaste verslag van die Biblioteek word melding gemaak dat plaaslike outoriteite nie baie gewillig is om vir die instandhouding en ontwikkeling van die Biblioteek by te dra nie, alhoewel byna al die plaaslike outoriteite nou jaarliks hul inkomste met duisende ponde vermeerder deur bier aan die naturelle te verkoop; en alhoewel winste op die verkoop van bier slegs gebruik moet word vir die welvaart van die Naturelle Bevolking.

'n Aantal dorpe gebruik hierdie bron van inkomste vir die bevordering van baie edele werk, maar met twee uitsonderings, skyn dit dat die plaaslike outoriteite die versprei van die beskawing deur die lees van boeke van te min waarde beskou; en gevolglik geen toelaes vir die Biblioteek gee, of anders gee hulle sulke klein sommetjies dat baie min werk van durende waarde gedoen kan word. Die twee uitsonderings is Johannesburg en Germiston.

Johannesburg Openbare Biblioteek ontwikkel nou 'n voorbeeldige stel van Nie-Europese Biblioteke; terwyl Germistonse Stadsrad besluit het, onderworpe aan die goedkeuring van die Minister van Naturelle Sake, om omtrent £250 per jaar te spandeer aan 'n Biblioteek vir die Nie-Europese bevolking van Germiston.

Die Komitee van die Carnegie Nie-Europese Biblioteek verwag dat binnekort vooruitgaande dorpe soos Springs,

Benoni, e.a., ook bereid sal wees om derglike stelsel-skemas te ondersteun.

Daar is duisende van Naturelle, Kleuringe, en Indiers, in ons stadsgebiede wat kan, en wat wil lees. Min van hulle kan dit bekostig om boeke te koop, en self hulle wat kan, het meer leiding in die kies van boeke, as die gewone Europeaan, nodig. Dit is moeilik vir die Europeaan wat gewoond is om hulle boeke van kinds af te sien en te gebruik, om die hindernisse wat die leesgierige naturelle mee te kampe het. Die Europeaan mag sy boeke na 'n stille huis neem om te lees. Die Afrikaan kan dit nie doen nie. Sy huis het gewoonlik geen elektriese ligte nie; die enigste klein kamer is vol kinders wat speel of wat huiswerk doen. Op die enigste tafel skryf die moeder aan die een kant, en aan die ander probeer 'n aantal kinders te lees af hulle skoolwerk te doen.

Daar is geen stilte vir gekonsentreerde lees nie.

'n Stille goedverligte leeskamer wat studente in die aand sowel as in die middag kan besoek, is 'n nodige vereiste wat in elke stadsgebied behoort te wees.

ORGANISERENDE-BIBLIOTEKARIS.

Die Raad van Onderyws, Witwatersrand, het weer sy toelae van £120, hernu vir die doel om die salaris en reiskoste van die Organiserende-Bibliotekaris te help betaal. Die Komitee wens hierdie organisasie vir al die hulp aan die Biblioteek gegee sedert sy begin in 1931, te bedank. Sonder hierdie hulp sou die Biblioteek vandag nie bestaan het nie.

BESOEKE EN PRAATJIES.

Die Organiserende-Bibliotekaris het 71 besoeke aan sentrums afgelê. Die Organiseerder het op verskillende Publieke Vergaderings en Skool-byeenkomste gepraat.

LETTERKUNDIGE SOSIALE-FUNKSIES EN LESINGS.

Om die plaaslike bibliotekarisse in hulle pogings om groepe te organiseer te help, het die Organiseerder met Letterkundige-Sosiale-Funksies geëksperimenteer. BANTOE LETTERKUNDE.

Mnr. Vilakazi het die Organiserende Bibliotekaris byge-
staan met toesprake aan sentrums op die Rand, Pretoria en
Potchefstroom. Spesiale pogings is gedurende die afgelope
jaar aangewend deur praatjies oor Naturelle skrywers en
werke, om die Bantoe Letterkunde voor te stel en bekend te
maak. Hierdie praatjies is baie gewaardeer en as gevolg het
lesers meer belang in die inheemse literatuur gestel.

TONEEL-LESING.

As 'n hulpmetode tot die waardering van letterkunde het
die Organiserende-Bibliotekaris aan verskeie skoolsentrums-
raad gegee om tonele te eis. 'n Aantal onderwysers en
skoliere het tonele gelees, en is gretig om toneel-leeskringte te
stig. Mnr. Alfred Boshamene se groep (St. Andrew se Skool,
Payneville), het op 26 Junie, 1940, 'n toneelstuk opgevoer.

HUISVESTING VAN BOEKE.

Verskeie sentrums begin nou beïnvloed te wees deur die
Komitee se versoek vir die behoorlike huisvesting van biblio-
teek boeke, en vir die bestelling van betaalde bibliotekarisse.
Ongelukkig is hierdie werk gewoonlik in die hande van plaas-
like sports-organiseerders oorgehandig, wie se hele tyd aan
ander bedryghede bestee is.

Die Munisipaliteit van Vereeniging het 'n spesiale kamer
in die Stadsgebied vir die biblioteek-doeleindes op sy gesit.
Dit was op die 20 Junie, 1940, offisieël geopen. Die Biblio-
tekaresse van die Vereeniging Openbare Biblioteek, Mev.
van der Westhuizen, stuur vernietigde boeke aan hierdie
sentrum om die sirkulerende voorraad ontvang van Germiston
aan te vul.

REPORT FOR THE YEAR ENDING 30th JUNE, 1940.

The Carnegie Non-European Library, Transvaal, is an organisation which provides reading matter for all Non-Europeans living in the Transvaal. As no African or Coloured person may borrow books from any Transvaal public library to which Europeans are admitted, the Non-European Library is an absolute necessity. Without its aid few Transvaal Non-Europeans would be able to experience the pleasure of reading.

The Library was started in 1931 when the Carnegie Corporation of New York offered to purchase books to the value of £1,000 for the Non-Europeans of the Transvaal, provided that local authorities would accept the financial responsibility of maintaining the Library and defraying the cost of book distribution.

As some time would have elapsed from when the grant was paid until local authorities could be asked for their financial support, the Witwatersrand Council of Education kindly offered to subscribe £120 per annum towards the maintenance of the Library during the first years of its existence. The Library, therefore, was maintained by the Witwatersrand Council of Education from August, 1932, until the end of 1935.

The Committee decided to adopt the Travelling Library System as used by the Germiston (Carnegie) Public Library for European School and Rural Libraries.

Under the Travelling Library System a small stock of books can do a lot of work. The Headquarters Library purchases the books, catalogues them and sends them out in batches of fifty or more to various centres. Each centre has its own paid or voluntary librarian, who accepts delivery of the books and encourages people living in the vicinity to read them. No subscription is charged. The librarian registers loans and makes periodical reports to headquarters, requesting books required by members of his centre, or reporting any other matter which requires attention. When the books have been read, the librarian returns the collection to the headquarters library, and within a few days receives another set in exchange. The boxes in which the books are transported may be used as shelving.

In the last report of the Library, mention was made of the reluctance of certain local authorities to contribute towards the maintenance and development of this Library. Nearly all local authorities are now adding thousands of pounds annually to their revenue by selling beer to the natives, and profits on beer selling must be used solely for the benefit of the native population. A number of towns are at present using this source of revenue to further many admirable projects; but with only two exceptions, Local Authorities seem to consider the spread of civilization through reading, to be a matter of no importance, and consequently make no grants to this library, or else grant such small sums that very little work of lasting value can be done.

The two exceptions are Johannesburg and Germiston.

Johannesburg Public Library is developing an exemplary system of Non-European Libraries, while Germiston Town Council has agreed, subject to the approval of the Minister of Native Affairs, to spend about £250 per annum on a library for the Non-European population of Germiston.

The Committee of the (Carnegie) Non-European Library expects that within a short time other progressive towns such as Springs, Benoni, etc., will be prepared to finance similar schemes.

There are thousands of natives, coloured people and Indians in our locations, who can, and who want to read. Few of them can afford to buy books for themselves and even those who are more wealthy need more guidance in book selection than the average European. It is difficult for Europeans, accustomed to contact with books from cradle days onwards, to realise the difficulties facing the Non-European who loves reading. The European may take his Library books to a quiet home to read, but most Africans

cannot. The African's home, as a rule, does not possess electric light; the only small room available is filled with children playing games or doing whatever housework has been assigned to them by their mother, who may be ironing clothes on the same table occupied by two or three other persons trying to read books or do school homework. There is no quiet for reading.

A quiet well-lit reading room which students may visit in the evening as well as the afternoon, is a necessity which should exist in every location, and, of course, a Librarian with special aptitude and training should be in charge.

ORGANISER-LIBRARIAN.

The Council of Education, Witwatersrand, again generously renewed its grant of £120 in aid of paying the Librarian-Organiser's salary and travelling expenses. The Committee wish to thank this organisation for all the assistance it has given the Library since its commencement in 1931. Without this help, the Library would not be in existence to-day.

VISITS AND TALKS.

The Organiser-Librarian made 71 visits to centres, speaking at various public meetings and school gatherings.

LITERARY SOCIALS AND LECTURES.

To help local librarians in their efforts to organise groups, the Organiser-Librarian experimented with "Literary Socials." Speakers included Mr. B. W. Vilakazi, M.A. (Rand University); Mr. W. Nkomo, B.Sc. (Principal, Pretoria School); Mr. C. Mfata, B.A. (St. Peter's Secondary School); Mr. J. Gomba (Social Organiser, Pretoria); Mr. W. B. Ngakane (Principal Orlando Lads' Hostel); Mr. B. Kuzwayo (of Umteteli); Mr. Mevimbela (Chairman of Advisory Board, Eastern Native Township).

Speakers at a symposium organised by the Organiser-Librarian, which took place at the Bantu Men's Social Centre, were:—Messrs. J. R. Rathebe (Secretary, B.M.S.C.); Rev. S. S. Tema (Chairman of the Gamma Sigma Clubs); A. T. Habedi, B. A.; R.V. Selope Thema, M.R.C. (Editor of the Bantu World); D. M. Denalane; Mr. B. W. Vilakazi, M.A.

PLAY READING.

As an aid to literary appreciation, the Organiser-Librarian advised several school centres to introduce play-reading. Many teachers and scholars read plays and were eager to organise play-reading circles. Mr. Alfred Boshamane's group (St. Andrew's School, Payneville), staged a play on the 26th June, 1940.

BANTU LITERATURE.

Mr. Vilakazi aided the Organiser-Librarian by addressing many centres along the Reef and at Pretoria and Potchefstroom.

Special efforts were made during the past year to introduce and popularise Bantu literature by giving talks on African authors and their works. These talks were highly appreciated and successful and as a result readers have taken a deeper interest in vernacular literature.

HOUSING OF BOOKS.

Some centres are beginning to respond to the Committee's call for the proper housing of library books and for the appointment of paid librarians. Unfortunately, this work is usually given to local sports organisers, whose whole time is already occupied with other activities.

The Vereeniging Municipality has set aside a special room in the location for library purposes. It was officially opened on the 20th June, 1940. The Librarian of the Vereeniging Public Library, Mrs. van der Westhuizen, sends discarded books to this centre to supplement the circulating stock received from Germiston.

Special library rooms are now to be found at: Payneville (Springs), Vereeniging, Randfontein, Pietersburg Training College, and Wilberforce Institute.

New Centres were opened at

Alexandra Amalgamated High School, Kimberley, Geduld, Venterspost, Nigel Coloured School, Potchefstroom Amalgamated, Orlando (St. Mary's School, Mooki Coliege, D.R.C. School, A.B.M. School, Methodist School), Western Native Township (A.B.M. School and Salvation Army School).

THE PRESS.

"Umteteli wa Bantu" and "The Bantu World" published articles on the library. Some of these reports brought enquiries from as far afield as Basutoland.

"The Bantu World" and "The Forum" published articles by the organiser.

THANKS.

The Committee is grateful to the Council of Education, Witwatersrand, for its grant of £120, and to all other donors of money and literature.
