Dear Sir,

This answer should have been written long ago, and I am truly ashamed, but we are understaffed just at present and I was stocktaking. Perhaps it is now too late to be of any value to you, but I shall answer anyway, hoping that this is not the case.

Your questions are a bit difficult to answer as we do not have set beds for natives and for others except in the case of a three bed Coloured ward. We have several semi-private rooms and one private which are often occupied by Indians, but with the exception of the beds mentioned above there is no bed that may not be occupied by a Native. Our statistics are not segregated as to race. As a result I can give you only estimates.

- a. Number of beds for native patients -- 25-28
- b. Average daily number of Native in-patients. 20 ?
- c. What fees if any are charged. 2/ per day.
£3-0-0 Major surgery £1-0-0 Minor surgery
- d. The number of out-patients dealt with - Question not understood. Does this mean away from the hospital, if so almost none.
- e. Number of attendances at out-patient clinics- (10 mos) 4500 ?
- f. No. Only clinic is on premises.
- g. No. district nurses not attached to hospital staff.
- h. Ambulance service only as furnished by the city, which is free to certain cases.

(d) The number of native outpatients dealt with during the year ended 30th June 1939 was 7698.


(e) Number of attendances at outpatient clinic 18730.

(f) The hospital does not conduct any out-patient clinics away from the institution.

(g) The hospital has no District Nurses attached to the Staff.

(h) Native patients suffering from venereal disease are sent to the Main Pass Office, Johannesburg, from where they are removed daily in this Hospital's ambulance free of charge. Cases of infectious diseases are conveyed by the Local Authorities' ambulances to this Hospital.


