

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



Dear friend,

We sincerely regret the delay in sending any news of our activities in South Africa. This delay has been caused by the preseure of work we have had to deal with.

We must firstly congratulate the World Peace Council on its wonderful work in organising the Heksinki Assembly. We have received all the literature and documents relating to the assembly, and are cleased to inform you that the material was carefully distributed.

Some of the delegates to the Assembly returned to South Africa, extremely heartened and encouraged by the spirit and accomplishments ebtained at Helsinki, They have reported most comprehensivley on every aspect of Peace discussed, and are continuing to tour townships and suburbs in order to report back.

We have intensified the signature campaign which was commenced recently and have now fifty-thousand (50,000) signatures. The appeal (against the preparation of an Atomic war) has been issued to Trade Unions, political organisations, churches, sporting and cultural organisations, etc, etc. and has been well-received.

On June 25th, 26th, 1955, the historic CONGRESS OF
THE PEOPLE was held in Kliptown, Johannseburg. The Congress
was called by the African National Congress, South African
Indian Congress, South African Congress of Democrats, and the
South African Coloured People's Organisation, for the purposess
of adopting a "FREEDOM CHARTER". Three thousand delegates from

walks of life discussed and adopted every clause of the "Freedom Charter" in the most peaceful manner even in the face of police intimidation. Under the heading "There chall be Peace and Friendship"is the following clause;-

"South Africa shall strive to maintain WORLI peace and the settlement of all international disputes by negotiation -- not war".

The South African Peace Council held an open-air exhibition at the Congress of the People. Many hundreds of people came into the Peace pavillion and signed the apr al against the preparation of an atomic war. Over two tho cand (2,000) leaflets issued by the South African Peace Council were sold, and a resolution proposed by a speaker in support of the Helsinki Assembly, and the Appeal was unanimously adspted.

We regret to advise that towards the closing of the Congress over three hundred (3,00) police, armed with sten-guns surrounded the assembly, searched and photographed the delegates, and slashed the place exhibition to pieces as well as confiscating the literature sold to the delegates. The petition forms were also seized, therefore, we were unable to send any copies to you.

In the Transvasl we are experiencing severe difficulties as segard public meetings. Due to the rigid and shame ul colour-ber laws existing in South Africa, public halls are denied to the S.A.P.C., therefore, we have been compelled to concentrate on house meetings. We have found, however, that these meetings prove to be successful which are held regularly in the townships and the suburbs.

On Sunday, 14th August, 1955 the Transv al Peace Council succeeded in holding a public meeting after booking the hall under a private name. A report on the Helsinki Assembly and the Geneva Conference was given, and a recolution pledging ourselves to fight for the maintenance of World Peace was unanimously adopted.

We also have to report that "Peace Tables" arranged in many suburbs and busy centres where the petitions were signed and well-received. The Regional Councils are insisting that peace publications are forwarded to them from time to time. We appeal to you to increase the supply of material sent to us in order to cater knexxx for the emands of the material regularly due to lack of finance.

We particularly to mention an appreciation of Pref. Burhop's pamphlet"Mankind must Choose"./3

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If you have any more copies of the above pamphlet, please forward them immediately to us as these will be of great value.

Our future campaigns will be reported to you in due course.

Be assured that the fight for peace on the southern tip of the continent of Africa will be intensified .

Within the last few weeks we have seen the possibilities of world peace growing and then once again decreasing. It is today clear that there are forces who are not favourable to the cause of peace, who wish to keep the big Powers from meeting, and to prolong the Korean War.

It is now up to all people who ardently desire peace and an end to the terrible threat of war to make their wishes known in a clear and unequivicel manner. In every country individuals and organisations are demanding of their government that they super negotiations between the Big Powers to settle their differences.

The Transvaal, Natal and Cape Town Peace Councils have launched a nation-wide campaign to urge our government to support negotiations and bring the Korean war to an end. We are running a national ballot to give South Africans an opportunity of stating their opinion on this vital question.

We urge your organisation most earnestly to endorse the enclosed resolution on peace, or to pass a similar resolution, to send a copy to the Prime Minister, and to return the endorsed resolution to the Secretary, Tvl. Peace Council, Box 10528, so that we may judge the success of this campaign.

We also enclose 10 ballot forms, and ask you to get these filled in and returned to us. We also ask you and your members to take those forms to the members of your organisation, to factories, offices, and door-to-door among neighbours. We will gladly send more ballot forms to you.

Please do not put this letter on one side and forget it. The fight for peace is too urgent, too important to every single one of us, for this to be put aside. Use your position in your organisation to bring world peace one step nearer.

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Inspite of an earlier request we have not received reports on the progress being made with regard to the signature campaign, from either Cape Town, Natal or Port Elizabeth. We unders and from reports in New Age that appfoximately 3000 signatures have so fambles callested in Natal and ever 3000 have been callested in the Transvael. The only centra which have subsitted a full report is the Transvael, and the details of their activities may assist others in the collection of signatures. The Transvael Peace Council collected approximately 300 signatures at a Congress of the People Conference, 100 at the Transvael maximum Indian outh Congress Conference, 400 at the african National Congress Youth League Conference and in addition have collected signatures at tables in the streets in Town and in one or two suburbs. Many signatures have also been obtained at factories and in Airican Townships. The Tansvael Peace Council has further written letters and encl sed collect of the A peal to brout 500 organizations in the Transval.

These activities together with an intensified he se to house collection can result in the collection of a vest number of cignstures. It must be remembered that the signature is not a short can done which can be given up after a we as collection but must be carried on intensively over many we as in order to ac leve our object of clecting 100,000 signatures. The World Peace Assembly opens in Helsinki in about 1 days time and we would like to be able to report to the Assembly the collection of at least 25,000 signatures.

It is therefore essential that all Provi cial feace Council intensify collection afforts and that they utilize every possible opportunity of collecting signatures. P oplewho are busy organizing in regard to Congress of the People should be used to collect signature Petition forms should be passed a ound at every me ting if rade Unions the Congress and other organizations. Signature collectors should collect signatures outside factory gates, schools, sport gatherings, ciantal actions etc.

Please inform immediately in detail f yar activities in re and to signature collecting. So far the b.m.P.C. considers that it would shortly be necessary to print further patitions for and it has decided that the Natal Peace Council should make itself responsible for the collection of the necessary funds.

In conformity with the proposed fund raising nace at the recent so ting of the S.A.P.C. we feel that the Natal Peace Council should direct its attention to the raising of funds for the shedfic purpose of printing further appeal forms. This must be done wickly as we would like to receive the required £20 by the 25t Jan.

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
Congress of the People. The secretariat has decided to send an observer to the Congress of the People and we hope that our observer will be given an opportunity to address the gathering. In addition it is proposed to set up a Peace stall at the site of the Congress which will include the Peace exhibition. Leaflets will be distributed and delegates will be asked to sign the peace petitions. In addition it is hoped to make contact with people from many parts of the country and if possible to ask the Provincial Peace Councils to inform us of the names of delegates from their provinces who could usefully be contacted.

World Peace Assembly. We hope that you will effectively display the Assembly posters which was recently sent to you.

NEWS FRO THE CENTRES. We would like to mention that the Natal Peace Council has recently considerably increased its activity and has set itself the target of collecting 25,000 signatures. May Day meetings there endorsed the Appeal as well as well as meetings of Trade Unions. A very good resolution on Peace was passed at the Natal Indian Congress Conference, and an excellent conference was held by the Natal Peace Council. We have already mentioned the activity of the Transveal Peace Council but are unable to say anything about the Cape because we have received no news from them.
