It was a trial of strength - the strength of the ideals the Institution stands for and the manner in which it teaches this lesson to the greatest number of our members gradually perhaps and even slowly at times, but definitely with success. It was a year of action and nothing succeeds like success.

STAFF:

The Office management and control of the Centre is the work of the Secretary and his Assistant who are in charge of the administrative machinery. They perform Office work and carry out the dictates of the Constitution together with many other duties that fall within the scope of their work.

MEMMBERSHIP:

For the year 1961, the membership strength of the Bantu Men's Social Centre was definitely on the upward trend and an increase was recorded. Up to and including the mouth of December, 1961, an amount of R381-35 cents was collected as membership dues which shows some improvement.

Even though the above figure is very encouraging I must point out to you that it is made up of members who have enlisted as new members. The number of renewals remains very low. May I again kindly appeal to all of you to enlist not only as new members but as older members that have been revived. In more ways than one the Centre depends upon the older membership for guidance and direction and we need it.

I am certain the programme we offer is good. If not, then it is your privilege, your duty and mine to get together and make constructive suggestions that will add bigger numbers to our list of new members.

The membership of the Bantu Men's Social Centre is divided into ve main categories:-

1. Life Membership..... Rlo.
2. Ordinary Membership... Rl per Amnum.
3. Country Membership.... RO-50. per Annum.
4. Junior Membership.... RO-25. per Annum.
5. Visiting Membership... RO-10. per Month.

Ordinary membership is open to persons residing within the magesterial area of Johannesburg and Country membership to those residing outside the magesterial area.

Junior membership is open to bona fide Scholars, and Visiting membership to Africans visiting Johannesburg for a short period.

ANNUAL FOUNDERS DAY.

On our Annual Founders Day Celebrations held on the 16th November, 1961, the Bantu Men's Social Centre had occasion to remember its history. It remembered its forbears, men who infused the idea of a Centre as a solution to some of the most dynamic problems of their days and were happy when at last the project of a Bantu Men's Social Centre was accepted. It was an occasion worthy of the programme that was presented.

It made us feel their presence that night and we were all elated. We remembered in particular the many setbacks that must come their way in the planning of such an Institution and, I am certain they must have rejoiced when at last the foundation was laid. From what we know and what we see before us, it must have been a nerve-wracking experience to even think of putting up such a building - a meeting place of giants as the aims and objects foretell.

For this day we had the pleasure of listening to Mr. G. M. Pitje, one of the giants from the other section who thrilled us with a story of how an African must have felt when coming to Johannesburg for the first time. The subject was "The Changing African Society " and what a romance it can become when told in the language of the Speaker. It was a dynamic narrative.

At the end of the programme we listened to the wonderful voices of the Ioninan Male Voice Choir under Mr. K. V. Mngoma who thrilled us with his interpretation of the music of the masters an occasion never to be forgotten.

The Bantu Men's Social Centre has not only provided a Centre of play, but has given us a meeting place of great characters. In Music, Drama, Dance and Song we find time to exchange views of importance with characters of note, a privilege we all appreciate and value.

We thank all those that have been responsible for the building of the Centre and appreciate the valuable patronage that they have extended to us right down the years and the guidance of leaders past and present who have and are still teaching us to face the future with such preparedness.

For the first time in the life of the Centre the Activities Committee has prepared an Annual Report to show the parts played by each section in the promotion of activities in the building. The activities Committee throughout plays a very important part in encouraging and guiding the functions of each section.

The Activities Committee is looking forward to a period where each of these sections shall be so developed as to be able to show the Executive what they are doing at some function during the year, if not on the Founders Day.

One of our junior sections practising "Judo" is still in existence though on the down grade. Their membership is very low and, it seems the enthusiasts are losing heart. The lack of a Judo Mat might be the cause but it is hoped that something should be done about it as the activity has a large following.

The Dancing section has a very bright future and is becoming a School to be feared in competitions for its continuous successes.

As the aims and objects of the Activities Committee are clearly shown in the tabulation of their brief historical background it is hoped to give each section such care in the immediate future that it shall have no reason for lagging behind the other sections.

PHYSICAL TRAINING AND BOXING

The Physical Thaining and Boxing classes fall under the hands of Mr. J. Maseko who has been at the helm of things for some time now. All is well though the lack of activity in this section is having a profound impact on the boys who are becoming despondent. That trainer is aware of this but can do nothing about it as Anateur Boxing tournaments are on the wane. The section will definitely build up again and the situation will be carefully studied with a hope to improving it.

BODY-BUILDING AND WEIGHT LIFTING.

This section under the leadership of Mr. Moses Matlhahanyane is doing very well and has a large following. Its members are regular with their monthly subscriptions and the Office does not have to follow them. Besides the shortage of heavy equipment like the Bench Press Forms etc., they are alright; but they will soon be needing this type of equipment to complete their requirements.

MEALS AND REFRESHMENTS.

The Restaurant run by Miss. S. Teyise has proved invaluable not only in assisting to provide Tea and Scones for our guests but also in the enlisting of new members into the club. The meals are delicious and it is difficult to find a meal with so many courses for so little money.

SOCIAL FUNCTIONS.

The Bantu Men's Social Centre has, for so many years, been the focal point where people from the different townships find time to meet their friends for different purposes. They hold Sports Committee meetings, Golf meetings, Fund Raising Shows, Wedding Receptions,

Welcoming Functions, Concerts and Dances, Boys' and Girls' Club meetings, Council of African Women meetings, Y.M.C.A. and meetings of various sects.
