AFRICAN NATIONAL CONGRESS: & On t morning of Sat. Sept 27, I chatted to Bob Sobukwe about t forthcoming ANC Congress.

He said tt there was a great deal of activity at present in connection with t forthcoming conference. Orlando has held 3 meetings at weekly intervals - these meetings had been called by t leadership, and their pubpose was to have a resolution passed confirming t expulsion of Leballo and Madzunya from t ANC. T resolution, had, however, been consistently refused. T last meeting was held this week, when t confirming resolution was diffeated by 32 to 27. Bob said that the number of people who attended these meetings was very good for a ker branch meeting, normal attendance being about 30 to 40.

At a meeting in Sophiston in on this past Thursday, Siwisa lost to chairmanship of t branch (or region?). Bob said the had heard little about t meeting up to now, except for t fact the Siwisa had been voted out of office. He said the Mautu had also lost office, and several other besides. He did not know who had been elected in their places. He had heard, however, the transferred when someone drew a gun and fired a shot into tair. Apparently, at this stage, there was a mass exodus and t meeting ended. At thime, voting was still continuing for a new committee. Bob said the understood that the deen tintention to beat up physically Siwisa and some of his followers. The fellow who pulled the gun had been among those intending to do t beating up.

Bob said tt t leadership had organized a set of "volunteers". This had been done by asking loyal branches to send 10 people to t conference, these people to ensure tt t conference was orderly and disciplined. x Bob said tt as far as he knew, xxxx volunteers had never been requested from branches such as Alexandra, Orlando or Mofolo. But even in areas like these, individual xxxx executive members were privately approached and were asked to ensure tt a few volunteers from t area came to t conference. - this x, of course, was done very quietly.

In reply to this, t Africanists xx had organized their own volunteers. Bob would not say how many there were, but he assured me tt in numbers, they would be "evenly matched" with t leadership volunteers. Earlier, he had said tt he thought tt t leadership would have at least 60 to 100 volunteers. He said tt Africanists had obtained in their volunteers from a wide varietys of sources. This included some "hussians." (PS Note t inverted commas!). When I expressed surprise at this, Bob said tt these people were also members of t Basutoland National I Congress, and many members of t Africanist group know were members and had close ties with t BNC - eg Leballo. In addition, he said, there was a substantial nu ber of Basutos in Newclare who had originally joined t ANC because of promises tt they would be assisted with t permit situation. They had not been given t promised support by t leadership, and were thereforex mighty disgruntled.

Because of t division of opinion in t branches, a number of branches would be sending two delegations to t conference. Among these branches were: Newclare, Springs, Western Native Township and Dube. Also, in a number of insyances (and as already reported), membership cards of t ANC had been refused to persons known to be sympathetic to t Africanists.

The Africanists anticipated tt both those who had been refused membership cards - and who intended going to t conference, and those "twin" delegations which were opposed to t leadership would be refused entry to t conference. So too would Madzunya and Leballo. In addition, t africanists felt tt in some areas, t leadership would allow one delegation to be elected, but if it was felt tt t delegation would support t africanists, then about 2 to 3 days before t conference, members of t delegation would be disqualified from attending t conference, probably on t grounds of if hence, i.e. tt they failed to pay their full subs during t year. Thus t were possession of a membership card would be held to be insufficient. They would also be rquired to have paid their l/ a month provinvial levy, the levy for Zeerust, Sekukuniland, etc. At t same time, t leadership would ensure tt their own peop were up to date with their various payments, and they would then be put in as t official delagtion for t branch. But these disqualified people would also be going to t conference.

Thus all these different groups would be determined to enter t conference hall. Their entry will be refused at t door, volunteers from one side or t other will attack someone, and a fight will start. Bob said flatly tt he was certain to there was going to be bloodshed. Hex was sure to there would be a deal of knifing, and he said he was also certain to there would be shooting - because he said to he knew to both sides were coming armed with firearms.

He said tt tofficial leadership was determined to have a showdown. On t Africanist sides, t view was tt for too long they had attempted constitutional means. These had failed, and they were now set on violence. "They did not intend to allow t leadership t chance to discussify qualify any delegations or members." The idea was to get inside t hall, and to move an immediate vote of no-confidence in t chairman, whosever he might be. They then intended to have a k "neutral" made t chairman - this "neutral" being Zek Mathopeng - and Bob described him as a "neutral" with a broad smile on his face. As soon as Zek was lected to t Chair (all this theory of course) he would immediately suspend t business of t conference, and would proceed forthwith with t elections, on t basis tt t conference was merely a continuation of t last one.

Bob said that he had missed t meeting of t Africanist group at which t decision had been taken in to go in despite everything, but had attended t subsequent meeting. He said he had spoken against t decision but was t only voice in a crowd of about 20 drawn from t Africanist areas, such as Newclare, Alex., Springs and Dube.

Bob said tt t africanist group had also decided to attempt to kidnep some of t top ALC leadership t night before t conference. These people would include Luthuli, Mandela and Tambo. The idea behind this was to ensure tt these people would not be able to run t conference from outside - i.e. that they would not be able to gather in Dan Thomas house - as they had done at the last conference in Orlando - and send messages across on t conducting of t meeting. Bob first told me about this scheme by saying: "some of our people are even thinking serio sly about kidnapping some of t leadership." He then went on talking, and it transpired that they were no longer thinking of it, but had in fact already been waking active plans. The scheme was to be put forward at a meeting on Sunday, Sept 28 - a combined meeting of t Legwate and Africanist groups. T purpose of raising it at this meeting was to get Legwate' and Co's, support for it.

I told Bob tt I thought t lead ship was going to win. He said that he agreed, and tt he also felt with me tt most people were beginning to realize this. But he said, t Africanists were regarding this as a last ditch stand. He said tt t one thing he was certain of was tt two "ANC's" would emerge from this conference n - whatever t actual result of t conference itself. Neither side would accept to ther's leadership. and would break away to start its own movement. He pointed out tt this was already t position in t Cape, where there were to all effects and purposs, two ARC's, with two national offices. He said tt he felt tt such a development in t Tvl. would not unduly displace t COD people. who did not at any costs, want to see t smargance of an independent, nationalistically-orientated ANC.

Comment: This was a most discouragin and depressing discussion. Not only because I felt sorry for Bob in his obvious disagreement with t plans of t africanists, but also because of my own reaction to their reported plans. As far as I can see, they regard thems\_elves as top level strategists about to sweep t entire ANC leadership from powers through t brilliance of their schemes. To me, however, teir strategy seems totally unrealistic and in no way designed to bring them success. Their appearent acceptance of violence is in itself sufficient to finish them. Whatever t merits of otherwise of t various warring sections of t AMC, one thing is certain: and tt is tt few of t wembers in t middle, so to speak will be convinced by violence and strong arm tactics and nothing will be attimed by violence. It just is not t type of political situation where violence will bring success - the only people who will benefit will be t leadership, because they are sufficiently astute and their propagands organs are sufficiently well-developed, for them to be able to turn t situation to their advnatge. The only others who will mentit benefit will be t govt., because I tend to agree with Bob tt whatever happens at t conference, there must inevitably be a split afterwards, with muchs two comparatvely weakened ANC groups warring against one another.

To ter return to t grand strategies of t Africanists: it all strikes me as being horribly puerile and immature. T stroming of t door, t attempt to instal a neutral chairman - Mathopeng! -, and t kidnapping ides - all in theory designed to win t day for hhem, but to my mind, every step inevitably to have t effect of driving t ordinary membership perhaps they know it as well - hence their seaperstion.
