Dear Dr. Phillips,

Thank you very much indeed for your letter which Miss Donaldson has put on my desk.

I have read your scheme with very considerable interest. As you know, the Federation of the Rhodesias is discussing a scheme with two different rolls requiring two different sets of qualifications. Tanganyika is working, I believe, on the basis that each man has three votes - European, African and Asian, which he must exercise for an European, an African and an Asian candidate, that is, ensuring that he takes an interest in all groups. The Institute has discussed, but never put forward, the idea of a qualified franchise on a common roll. together with forms of special representation for backward groups. I understand the United Party will seek some modification of our Constitution in order to ensure greater Non-European representation in Parliament. One basic approach the Institute has had is that we must have, in some form, a common roll. We would, I think, reject the idea of a communal roll, that is, group representation. It did not work in Ceylon; it has been rejected in India, though I do believe it is This, I think, would be our objection used in the Malay Federation. to your scheme. - it would tend to perpetuate group division in South Nevertheless, I am very grateful for your letter and I do hope that you will not let your thinking stop here. Democracy, as you know, has never been applied fully in a multi-racial state, if, indeed, it has been applied fully anywhere in the world.

South Africa's racial problems. Naturally I do not go into detail, because once the principle is accepted, the details follow as a m natter of course. I base my reasoning on the principle that habred of one section by another can only lead to further hatred; but with a little bit of good will no obstacle is unsurmountable. I realise that a plan such as this meets with instant and unthinking rejection, but as there does not seem to be any constructive solution entertained by any body in this country, I offer my solution in the hope that, if it is found acceptable, it will be advertised, so to speak, (but I seek no credit for it) and in time familiarity with the idea will overcome unthinking prejudice—objection on principle is, of course, a different story.

I further base my scheme on these principles, that the Non-european will never receive just treatment until he has the x vote, but that he will never be given the vote on the claim that his numbers are preponderant. My scheme is that the franchise should be accorded on a basis of literary only, but that there should be four voters' rolls -- Enligsh-speaking, Afrikaans-speaking, Coloured and Asiatic, and African. Any adult citizen (i.e. not foreign born) has to apply for registration on one of these rolls, according to his/her status. The number of representatives in Parliament should be equally divided among these four groups. Thus -- if there are to be 160 members of parliament, 40 should be elected by each voters' roll. If there are 12 1,000,000 registered African voters, each constituency should number as near to 25,000 as possible. Constituencies would be on a regional basis, voters somewhat far out voting by post. If there are 40,000 Coloured and Isiatic voters on that roll, the constituencies would number 1,000. Thus would the balance of power be preserved, should the political alignment be on a racial lines.

For the English-speaking section would return 40 members to Parliament, the Afrikaans-speaking 40, the Coloured and Asiatic 40, and the Africans 40. The Whites together would muster 80, the Non-whites 80.

I think I have said enough to indicate the broad principles involved. I might add that such a proposed constitution could be max made part of a proposal to meet the Nationaists in their desire to have a Republic. Of course, I am fully aware that they believe in a "White" Republic, but I am making the above suggestion as a possible alternative, a counter-blast, in fact. To put the alternatives as "Republic or No republic" is what they expect. I believe it would take the wind out of their sails to turn the alternative into "White Republic based on Injustice" or "Apartheid Republic based on Justice" If you think the scheme worth considering, kindly deal with it as you think fit; if you think it is too, too impracticable, consign it to the W.P.B.
