In reply to your letter of the 20th instant, I have to state that the Germiston Hospital began training Native Probationer Nurses on the first of this month.

As the nurses are preparing for the certificate of the S.A. Medical Council, their training has to conform to the rules and regulations laid down by the Council, which rules and regulations at present are exactly the same for Non-European and European Trainees. There is, however, a doubt as to whether Non-European Nurses will be fit to graduate at the end of three and a half years, and a longer training period is being considered.

BASUTOLAND GOVERNMENT.

Botsabelo Leper Settlement
Maseru, Basutoland.
28th May, 1942

Sir,

I have the honour to inform you that vacancies have occurred for the appointment of two African women Nurses to the Leper Settlement at Botsabelo, near Maseru, Basutoland.

The salary is upon the scale of £60 with annual increments of £6 to a maximum of £96 per annum. In addition a grant of sustenance allowance of £12 per annum and of uniform allowance of £12 per annum is made. Free furnished quarters are provided.

Should you have any girls who would care to apply for these appointments I shall be glad if you will ask them to forward their applications, stating their qualifications. A knowledge of the Sesuto language is an asset which will count in making the appointments.

The vacancies are due to be filled on 1st July 1942.
