





In the opening of the meeting Prof. Z.K. Mathews opened the conference and stated that Craddock has been lucky to have the meeting in its place. though it is a small town, but anyhow they had decided to meet at this place. He called upon the Rev. Ca. to address the meeting after Rev. Calata has read a piece from the Bible and a prayer after that.

Professor Mathews then thanked Rev. Calata for the opening sermon he had conducted and he then called upon the Rev. Ca. to address the meeting which he did. Thereafter Mrs. Butler said some few words and she stated that though it has been like this and she had been called upon say some few words she would only say that they the europeans realise what the position is but they have not forgotten to pray for them.

The President then wanted all the reports from all the branches to be delivered and only one of the reports had been read, one of Korsten which was as follows that they had observed the Mandela plan and there had been one of the members who when selling papers was brutally assaulted by the police.

At this time the President said that after 2.30pm. he would like that all the delegates should be on one side and fill up all the forms next the wall and as also the e-ater- centre form so that all the visitors and members who are not delegates should be at the back as to enable him to tell them to leave the hall as he knew that some of them were not interested in the A.N.C. but they after their purpose then it would be necessary for those people to leave the place as they are to discuss some matters.

At about 1.15pm. they went for lunch. 2.30pm. we not allowed to enter but Sgt. Tshesi went in without being noticed. 3.30pm. he was then ordered to leave the hall together with those who were not

delegates at about that we observed the place for the arrival of Dr. Njonwe who did not turn up.

Sunday 16-8-56.

At about 10am. the meeting was opened and they still continued with the reports from other branches.

11am. we were then ordered to leave the hall as the instructions came from Mr. Z.K. Mathews at the platform who was the Chairman.

At 2.30pm I went into the hall at there after some few criminals a Sergeant at Arms came to me and ordered to leave the Hall.
