an understanding of colonial situation generally — and SA in particular.

national question — without a bourgeoisie? — and with an allegedly 'revolutionary' white working class — corrupted by IC Act.

axis of national revolution — an independent republic, of workers-peasant.

but: what of the 'bourgeois democrats' rev, 2 stages etc.

Delude clarifies party, but users in age of intense strife —

expulsions, splits, disillusionment = decline.

But opens up new work amongst blacks — build of TVs, radicalisation
of ANC, etc. Anti-pass campaigns — confrontation.

11. 1949 decisive black parliamentary vote — thus creating conditions for

new vigour of nat. lib organisations — Xuma constitution,
memberships etc, and decline of chiefs' influence.

1907. Botha took office in Tol. - Asiatic Land Amendment Act

(1891 - Pretoria Convention ~~banned~~ allowed 'any person other than a native' to reside. Hence when OFS banned Indians in 1885. - but denied them the right to own land outside segregated locations.)

1100 Indians served with Gandhi's ~~Coys~~ Ambulance Corps vs Boer.

1907. Caste Law - laid basis of a pass system as for Africans - register - unregistered could be deported without appeal.

Migration laws used to bar them from TVL - prohibited from trade on goldfields -

Passive resistance - refusal to register - went to jail.

Sants = Gandhi deal if migrant registered voluntarily.

Sants refused. Indians banal document, 1908 - began crossing border illegally.

APD - urged Tol colonials to passive resistance against segregated townships - people did not follow.

1913: after mines strike.

140,000 Natal Indians - against restricted migration, provincial barriers, licensing discrimination, & £3 tax on non-renewal of indenture.

Gandhi called for strike - police clashed with miners & killed 25 injured
STRIKE CALLED OFF.
 G led 3 groups of workers across borders - pressure from Indian govt - 1914 Indian Relief Act abolished tax, recognised as valid customary marriages.

1936 : Tol. Asocietie Land Tenure Act, & 1939 Asocietie Land + Treaty Act

Naidoo started campaign - 6000 pledge resistance - Gandhi intervened, was approached by India + Britain would intervene to produce an honourable settlement. - Naidoo called off campaign

1946. Asocietie Land Tenure Act. prohibited land transfers except in 'excepted areas.' - Passive resistance councils setup in Natal + Tol. 2000 resisters / ^{including} 300 women - went to jail for occupying white land Naidoo + Nanda jailed twice. - By July 48, campaign called off. Nat Govt in power. - African leaders supported campaign especially Xoma (post-min strike period) - 1947 Xoma Naidoo had to work together for full franchise rights + equality with whites

To defiance (in passing mass boycott campaign Alex 1940/45. Squatters 1944/5.)

ANC conference Dec 47 - Kotane & Lembede - urged struggle for full citizen rights - boycott of elections to NRC & Parliament!

CP Conference followed - but note clash of views - need for an active campaign - 'should class party lead behind national organisations?' - (white liberals prospered as a result.) need for single minded actions in boycott - not passive!

Dec 48 ANC Conf. - Youth League alleged 'sabotage' by some NRC comrades & leaders. - wavering, agreed to reaffirm boycott by 'work for election of anti-collaboration candidates on a boycott ticket.'

CP conference - Samorens end of P 582!

● 1950 Suppression Act. - May Day strike - dissidence ('1st actual political strike') - led to joint call for protest vs. Suppression Act - June 26th. - unashamedly nationalistic basis.

Programme of Action adopted - Lodge P 27.

1951 - Platten Commiittee proposed campaign of venturing to reject laws - Defiance Campaign! - June 26 1952 start! - more than 8000 jailed - end = 'riots'.

1. Scope: Not attempting history of events in our growth. Only dealing with how our ideas developed, & why.
Purpose: to allow past to explain the present. But also to show ideology as developing. NOT FIXED!
Sometimes ideology can only be demonstrated in organised activity - not in declarations.
 2. Beginnings: Today it seems that national liberation ideology has always been with us. — ANC always the leading force, alliance with CP in actions + ideas constant.
Where in fact to begin? Could, as e.g. F.W. de Klerk, start with early churches, or revolts as in 'Kaffir wars', rebellions etc. But am concerned not with resistance forces, but with citizen rights = hence with SA state!
Will start with direct political ideology + organisation leading up to and evidenced in period of 20th century.
Boer war etc. as prelude to Union.

3. The Republics / Colonies: describe citizenship positions prior to

U.S.: especially, as only direct black participation in state:

c) Cape Colony: Constitution of 1853 (British) gave first representative government. totally colour-blind. - property qualification only - but colour-blind in form, not content - passed Masters-Servants Act. Black vote grew slowly to 4.7% mark.
