EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE REPORT TO THE JOINT CONGRESS AND 3 TH SEPTEMBER, 1953.

1. Bannings

The Committee has to report the banning by Mr. Swart, as The Committee has to report the banking by Mr. Swart, as from the 28th August, of both Mr. C. G. Williams and Mr. Alan Lipman from membership of both the Conress and the Legion. Mr. Williams and Mr. Lipman are also prohibited from attending any gathering for a period of two years.

The Committee protested to the Minister by way of an open letter which received publicity.

2. Group Areas

Oral evidence, by a representative of the Legion and the Congress, supplementing the written evidence already submitted, was submitted to the Land Tenure Advisory Board in opposition to the application of the Group Areas Act to Nylstroom. 3. Western Areas Campaign.

Under the auspices of the Western Areas Protest Committee, Branches are assisting with the organising and work of

Petition forms were made available to members and others. Attempts were made to get a committee of prominent citizens to lead a campaign workake a deputation to the Minister. As you are aware, there came a spate of bannings, among them Cecil Williams. Hilda Watts, and a number of prominent Trade Unionists. This complicated the campaign and it petered out.

7. Banning of Trade Unionists and others.

The Committee offered its support to the S.A.T. & L.C. and the Building-Workers in their campaign against the banning of their officials. They were reluctant to accept such support officialy on the grounds that it might prejudice their task with the reactionary section of their workers. Unofficially they asked for assistance with the organising of tables, for petitions, demanding the lifting of the Ban on Huyser.

The Committee agreed to give this assistance subject only to the members engaged being allowed to make propaganda against all Bannings. The Committee was then requested to drop the

matter.

The Committee is collecting the Biographies of those who have been banned with a view to a publication.

8. Organisation.

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One more branch was formed in Johannesburg. The number now stands at 13 in Johannesburg and 1 in Benoni. Efforts to get branches established in Pretoria, Germiston and Vereeniging have not been successful so far. This is mainly due to the pressures created by lack of funds and personnel.

Cape Town.

There is no information available as to the progress made by the Democratic League in its organisation and recruiting programme.

Durban

There is no information available at the moment as to the progress made by the Branch.

Port Elizabeth

As a result of the visit of an organiser, a previsional committee has been established. The Committee will send delegates to conference. 43

- (f) that a rone oed form be made available to secretaries of branches to enable them to report after meetings of the branches.

10.Conference

- (b) It is proposed by the Committee that a special aceting of the Joint Congress Legion Committees should take place on Tuesday 6th October at the Legion office.

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(c) Progress Report on Arrangements todate.

Port Elizabeth has indicated that the committee is sending one and possibly two delegates.

Invitations to attend conference as delegates were sent to 80 interested individuals and to all members of the Legion and Congress. Replies are now coming in.

Fraternal delegates have been invited from 14 organisations.

Fund Raising

The committee submits attached herewith a report of Revenue and Expenditure, covering the period July and August. It will be seen that £1062.2.5 was received and £878.0.8. expended in this period.

It is anticipated that at least a similar sum £800 to £900 will be required to cover the period September and October. An estimated £360.0.0. has come in in September which means that at least £500 must be raised in October.

- a) Each member is asked to make himself or herself responsible for at least one pound per month.
- b) Branches are asked to immediately organise fund raising activity.

The Committee has discussed the question of reducing expenditure by way of retrenchment of staff etc. but decided that the present budget should be returned until after the new organisation is established.

The forced retrenchment of Mr. Williams and the possible forced retirement of other officials and employees in the near future as a factor that must be born in mind.
