Headline - Armed riot police patrol Harare as crisis deepens - with no improvement in the political and economic situations in the country a heavy presence of troops can be seen on the streets of the capital.

The authorities deem there be a need as the number of protests, from opposition supporters, those scavenging for food scraps and health and medical services as these provisions become hard to find. - GDN page 21 C 1 -

Thurs 15

Headline - *Toddler son of detained couple released from jail* - on the orders of Chief Justice G Chidyausika. The two year old Nigel Mutemagau, whose parents Collen M and Violet Mupfuranhehawe, are among a number of MDC supporters accused of a plot to kill Mugabe (qv 27/12), will now live with family relatives.

As to the continued detention of the accused the judge has ordered that all the defendants be examined in hospital after claims that they were tortured. - GDN page 20 C 5 -

Headline - *Tsvangaria to return home for meeting with Mugabe* - on 17/1. The leader of the MDC will be accompanied by the South African president, Kgalema Motlanthe, is host in recent times, and an attendee at his talks with Mugabe.

Headline - MP's fight to stop the deportation of activist - who comes down of the Movement for Democratic Change. Headline - *EU adds British based firms to Zimbabwe sanctions blacklist* - helped by evidence gathered with the help of the London bases Serious Fraud Office and the authorities in the United States.

One, who has been named, and had his London office and home raided in 2008 (qv 27/11), is the sometime backer - and friend of Mugabe - is John Brendemcamp who has been known to offer the Zimbabwe 'logistical and financial support' which has gone a long way to ensure retention of

power in the country.

In a second move, at the Brussels meeting of foreign ministers a 36 world wide firms, who work in the EU will no longer be contracted by European authorities if they continue to offer their services to the regime in Harare. Of these 18 were registered in Britain or off shore dependencies such as the Isle of Man or the Channel Islands. They also proscribed a further 27, to add to the 177 already 'banned' persons.

In a separate decision the Brussels called for an investigation into the diamond trade in the country. It is said that the authorities are sponsoring violence against those working the mines and the dealers. - GDN page 10 C 1 -

Headline - Zanu - PF threaten to rule alone without MDC - as the president prepares to name a new administration on 13/2. This leaves the opposition only a few days to decide whether to take part in a unity government. An announcement would be made on 30/1. - GDN page 21 C 2-

Fri 30

Headline - Food aid cut to starvation levels for millions ... as cash dries up for UN .. - to a level that is judged to be below the amount that is acknoleged to be below what will keep an adult alive.


From 2/09 the United Nations World Food Programme will cut the core maize ration, a Zimbabwe staple food, from 10kg to 5kg per month. This will mean that charities such as Oxfam, who are feeding 253, 000 in the countries Midlands province, will see more families selling what they can for money to buy food, parents missing meals in order for their children to continue eating or sending the children on berry and root foraging missions to fill empty bellies.

Much of the food shortage is down to the non fulfilment of an international appeal for aid by the WFP. As of now the world has donated \$200m which officials indicate is \$65m short of its targets set for 2008/9. The crisis encompasses, now, 4.5m nationals. By the end of 2/09 it is expected that a further 1.5m Zimbabweans will become reliant on these food hand outs. It is not as if the authorities have been able to import its target amount of maize of 800, 000 tonnes. The most likely estimate of overseas imports is only 200, 000 tonnes.

The latest figures from the cholera outbreak show that approximately 1000 people have died from the 58, 000 cases reported.

Headline - *Tsvangaria agrees to join unity government* - rather than face the criticism that he had put his own interests ahead of the country. The decision was made following a meeting of the MDC's national council who were under pressure after the recent meeting of the Southern African Development Community. The new prime minister will swear the oath of office on 11/2

and take up his duties 48 hours later.

An update on the cholera epidemic that is sweeping the country by the World Healths Organisation, said that 69 Zimbabwe national had died in the last 24 hours. This takes the number of deaths to 3, 161 since the outbreak began in 8/08. As of this time the number of cases recorded is in excess of 60, 000. - GDN page 20 C 3 -

Headline - *Mandela's 'elders' welcome coalition deal* - in a statement that was issued by Carter and Annan. The main message was a hope that the deal would ease the countries humanitarian crisis. There also added that the world would "give this agreement the best chance of success. **OBS page 40 C 5** -

Tues 10

Headline - Mugabe regime goes back on deal over activists - now that it seem that members of the regimes Joint Operations Command [JOC] took a special interest in the case. It was foreseen that, after negotiations between Zapu's Nicholas Gotche and the MDC, 16 detainees were to be released on 6/2. There was to be a second spate of releases, 8 in number on 11/2, after a quick appearance before a judge on that day.

The agreed plan, which was a condition - set by Morgan Tsangaria as a condition of his being sworn in as Zimbbwe's prime minister - did not happen. The eight were not presented to the court on the orders of Major General P Zimondi. Attached to the JOC, at the time of the presidential elections, he was responsible for the ensuing violence and fear spread throughout supporters of the MDC.

Eight of those being held are women, including Jestinaa Mkoko, a member of the Zimbabwe Peace Project (qv 13/12. - GDN page 15 C 5 -

Wed 11

Headline - Tsvangaria to be named Zimbabwe's prime minister - where the aim of this administration is to work with, not join with Mugabe in the running of the country.

The working arrangements between the two, Zanu and the MDC, are such that even though the security and police portfolios stay with there present cabinet bosses, the financial purse strings are now held by Tendai Biti a lawyer and party secretary general of the MDC. The down side of this arrangement is that the governor of the central bank is still Mugabe's man.

Even with fiscal arrangements as they are there were warnings, from the British representative in Harare, that the hoped for inflow of international aid would be forthcoming. In a notice, placed in the capitals newspapers, there is neither support or rejection of the new administration. It is however noted that given Mugabe's "resistance to change to date his failed economic policies and

his propensity to rail against the outside world, it is unlikely that any government involving Mugabe will inspire donor confidence and attract the support it badly needs." In essence there will be no change, social, economic or financial without international aid. - GDN page 23 C 1 -

Leader Comment, **Divide and rule**, would seem the only way, from the point of view of the Movement for Democratic Change, if the country is to be lifted out of the economic, financial and social catastrophe it is in at present.

Prime Minister Tsvangaria and the new finance minister T Biti have, at the very minimum two years to turn there policies into positive forces. As the UK's Harare notice states there will be little overseas aid offered for the stated reason. Therefore these next 24 months, after which there will be new elections, must achieve Zimbabwe's stabilisation. These aims can be achieved by careful lobbying of disaffected members of Zanu PF who can see that there futures are more secure in an administration that is not led by President Mugabe.

Headline - Tsvangaria finally in power - on paper at least - even as Mugabe's security forces hunt for Roy Bennet a newly appointed - MDC loyal - cabinet minister. He was not found this time.

In his speech after the swearing in ceremony the new prime minister could not help alluding to this date in 1990, the day Nelson Mandela walked out of prison as a free man. From that time on, for four more years there talks between politicians before the new administration finally began governing South Africa. Such will be the way forward in Zimbabwe he said.

However, as always, the state had ways of limiting Tsvangaria's message. Firstly the state controlled media blamed all the countries ills not on the present administration. Rather the plundering of the nation was blamed on the likes of Gordon Brown. Then just to add insult to injury as the prime minister began to speak, an agreed text, the television coverage was cut as dinner was being served.

There was some good news for teachers, soldiers, doctors and health workers they would continue to be paid in US dollars of South African rand until the six trillion inflation rate is brought under control. - GDN page 1 C 5 -

Headline - Tsvangaria sets out plans to restore rule of law and revive devastated economy - "and will pass legislation to restore peoples freedom", re - establish the rule of law after years of impunity in which the ruling Zanu PF murdered and terrorised its opponents, and allow a free press to operate. A priority is to lay the groundwork for a new election within the next two years. A second priority is to bring the current outbreak of cholera that is sweeping the nation under control.

"in the immediate days ahead we will focus on the cholera crisis." More than 3, 300 Zimbabweans have died of cholera and about 70, 000 have been infected. - ditto page 25 C 1 -

Headline - How did it come to this? - when at one time, only ten years ago, Zimbabwe was self sufficient in food.

Not only have the people to contend with the shortage of food, there are other consequences for the malnourished to contend with. With one in four of the population suffering with, or infected by the HIV virus, going without food makes the taking of prescribed anti retroviral drugs 'like digesting razor blades' according to one health worker who has contact with Juliana Tafirei aged 36, who lives Muzondo village in Masvingo province.

The Zimbabwe Red Cross feeds 260, 000 people who are carrying the HIV virus or who have the full blown disease. As a typical recipient of the charities help, Tambudsai Savera aged 42 living in the mainly agricultural Masvingo province as one of the agreed 1.3m population, receives 50kg of maize, 5kg of beans and a little cooking oil. This food, enough for herself and her four children, provides little more than 1, 000 calories per day.

At one time the family had and income from the vegetable stall. This has now stopped because of her poor health and the severe down turn in the economy. A small monthly income, £3.50/R50, is made from renting out the road side stall. - GDN G2 page 10 - 13 -

News item, As members of the joint Zanu PF MDC cabinet were being sworn into office security police announced that the hunted Roy Bennet (qv 12/2) had been detained on a charge of treason. Designated to be a deputy minister the MP was held at an airport outside Harare. - Today, Radio 4 7am -

Headline - Let's forget about Mugabe, says Zimbabwe's new PM - and concentrate on the future. As far as Tsvangaria is concerned the two main stumbling blocks is the presence of Gideon Gomo as the governor of the countries central bank and the Zapu loyalist attorney general Johannes Tomana remaining in there respective positions. On the one hand, Gomo, has failed to ensure a stable economy while the chief law officer in the country has locked up many of the MDC's supporters over the last few years.

The newly installed prime minister also feels that there are growing divisions at the higher levels of Zanu - PF. The most noted of which was the non attendance of police chief A Chihuri or the head of the armed forces C Chiwenga refuse to attend the ceremony. - GDN page 30 C 1 -

Headline - *Power sharing in Zimbabwe threatened by a five man cabal* - namely members of the Joint Operations Command. With the state intention of preserving the rule of Mugabe or at the very least moulding the post Mugabe era to one of non prosecutions for previous crimes committed, they are - as one African diplomat says - 'the real enemy of democracy.'

A full list of the JOC, who have powers that enable them a full range of powers from being able to vet the next days front page of the Herald newspaper to agreeing the monetary policy of the reserve bank, as well as Chihuri and Chiwenga (qv 14/2) include the intelligence chief Happyton Bonyongwe, air force head P Shiri and the head of the prison service P Zimondi.

Detailing the charges against Roy Bennet (qv 14/2). The deputy agricultural minister has now been charged with treason as it is said that he was mastermind behind a 2006 attempt to kill Mugabe. Headline - Zimbabwe politician faces terror charge - even it is not one of terrorism Roy Bennet MDC MP (qv) he will face a judge imminently. Lawyer for one, who according to Morgan Tsvangaria is a victim of "a malicious political vendetta," Trust Maanda says that the authorities were on a fishing expedition looking for a charge to fit the crime.

In the end they settled on a section of the Public Order and Security Act which makes it a crime to criticise the office of the president. In reality, according to the MDC leader who will not let the arrest of this man effect the party working in a coalition government, the arrest was organised by members of the JOC (qv 15/2).

Wed 18

Headline - Return to rule of law Tsvangaria tells cabinet - as the defence minister, E Mnangagwa, the state security minister, S Sekeramayi and the home affairs minister K Mohadi were given notice that legality before political loyalty was the only way forward in this a new era of Zimbabwean politics.

Overall the countries first joint cabinet meeting went, according to MDC sources, as fairly cordially but insubstantive. There was, from the president, a less than generous reaction over the Roy Bennet issue as Mugabe did not address it in a serious manner. GDN page 117 C 1 -

Headline - Tsvangaria fulfils pledge to pay soldiers and civil servants in US dollars - as was stated on the day of his swearing in ceremony 12/2. In all, despite the questionable concerns of foreign diplomats, the \$100m/£70m has been found with - as the finance minister T Biti says - by a little 'juggling' of the books. The 130, 000 public service workers are being asked to return to work on 23/2. - GDN page 26 C 1 -

Headline - *Harare horror told in Mugabe ballet* - a tale told firstly on the London stage (qv 30/11) is coming to the Carriageworks in Leeds on 17/3 as part of a nationwide tour. - **YEP page** 6 C 3 -

Sun 22

Headline - Mugabe demands cash and cattle for a surreal 85th birthday banquet - as the prime

minister worries about finding 'maybe £3.5bn/\$5bn' to ensure the countries survival.

In respect of the spending by the nation for Mugabe's birthday there are \$100 raffle tickets to sell. Diplomatic tickets, priced at \$100, for a banquet at the plush Rainbow Towers hotel in the capital Harare. The each of the nations districts must give 50 cattle and raise £1, 000/\$1, 500 US. This will be spent at a giant rally and feast in the town of Chinhoyi which is 50 miles west of the capital.

As to the more relevant search for investment a likely source has emerged with finance ministers of Southern African Development and the African Development Bank agreeing to meet within the next seven days [source YEP 21/2 p 4]. Aside from the financial concerns the cholera outbreak has, according to the South African president, been 'contained.' This said the United Nations indicates that 3, 888 people have died.

Cabinet agreements have been broken by Zanu PF. The Harare Accord agreed that the previous administration would give 31 ministerial posts to party supporters. To date Mugabe has appointed 61 loyalists. A further drain on the countries failing resources 'they will all need there Mercedes 4x4's, drivers, bodyguards and housing says John Makumbe political science professor of the University of Zimbabwe. - OBS page 33 C 3 -

Thurs 26

Headline - *Terrible toll* - the latest update from the World Health Organisation on the outbreak of cholera that is sweeping the country says there are 79, 813 suspected cases reported by Zimbabwe's Ministry of Health and Child Welfare. Of the reported cases 3, 731 have proved fatal. Therefore the fatality rate is 4.7%.

As to the area affected - all 10 of the countries have reported outbreaks. For ongoing treatment the Ministry of Health and Child Welfare have provided 365 treatment centres where only half of the deaths are occurring. - GDN page 20 C 2 -

Proved to be a productive farmer, there was always a good harvest from the land, the eyes of the presidents wife fell on the land.

Having served court papers Justice Hlatshawayo complaining how he was illegally deprived of ownership, after a visit from three high ranking cabinet members, security minister D Mutasa justice minister P Chinamasa and agricultural mechanisation minister J Made. - GDN page 23 C 5

News item, The prime minister of Zimbabwe Morgan Tsvangaria and his wife have been injured in a traffic accident outside Harare. The condition of the prime minister is not serious although his wife suffered severe injuries. - Radio 2 17. 00 -

Headline - *Tsvangaria survives as car crash kills his wife* - Susan of 31 years and the mother of his six children. In retrospect described as 'a quiet women' and deeply religious who had recently spoken out about women's rights and the scourge of the Aids virus. - **GDN page 19 C 5** -

Sun 8

Headline - *Mourning Tsvangaria flies out of Zimbabwe* - to neighbouring Botswana. There he will spend time adjusting to the death of forty nine year old wife Susan killed in an rta on 6/3. As party supporters flock to outside his Harare home, to show support for the prime ministers loss relatives begin to gather with the PM from their homes in Australia and South Africa.

As to any conspiracy theory over the casus of the accident, growing among some party members, a local union official was sent to the crash site to take photos of the overturned Land cruiser and check the vehicle's brakes for evidence of tampering. But at the end of the day I had to support my husband that is the role of a wife, a good wife at least."

Headline - Tsvangaria rules out foul play in fatal car crash - thus ending days of speculation, that the "accident" was an anything other than that. With these words the prime minister, still with his face swollen, arrived in Harare to prepare for the funeral of his wife. - GDN page 23 C 3 -

Headline - Mugabe says death of PM's wife an act of God - when he spoke at a memorial service, in Harare, attended by the prime minister and his children and other close relatives. Later a gathering of 15, 000 ordinary Zimbabweans heard the PM said "lets celebrate her existence as God's gift to me and to you."

During the presidents eulogy there was a call for an end to inter party violence between Zanu and the MDC as "this is what Susan would have wanted: for us to co - exist peacefully. He has lost a partner and we must all rally to support him." - GDN page 24 C 1 -

Fri 13

Headline - Pay up or Zimbabwe deal fails, warns Biti - who as minister of finance is desperate for the unity government to be able to keep its commitments to those people who elected it. This can be best done by the international community honouring agreements made to provide aid to ease the peoples situation.

With this aim in mind the Australian government have donated £4.7m, to be channelled through







aid agencies and Britains International Development Department, which the secretary general of the MDC, has promised to ensure is not misdirected away the finance ministry and into Zanu approved projects.

The whole issue of funding the joint administration was discussed at a conference, hosted by the Tanzanian president in Dar es Salaam recently. Attending were representatives of the International Monetary Fund with the aim of "resuming relations" despite Zimbabwe already owing the body £90m. Further assistance may come after a meeting in Washington, USA on 20/3 where countries will endeavour to ensure any donations do not fall into the hands of Mugabe and his cronies.

The MDC secretary general/finance minister has asked for £1.4bn/\$2bn over the next 10 months. The reply was firstly the governor of the central bank, Gideon Gono must be sacked, whose policies have been blamed for the countries hyper inflation. - GDN page 19 C 1 -

Headline - *Public rage over perks for new ministers* - as members of the unity government gather for a summit in the plush surroundings of the Victoria Falls.

The gathered ministers, were in this one time popular tourist destination, to discus ways of boosting the economy and especially encouraging the resumption of the influx of the overseas visitor, was somewhat disrupted when ministers appointed from the Movement for Democratic Change wing of the administration also arrived in state sponsored \$50,000 Mercedes vehicles.

In the publics perception accepting these, and other perks such as meeting in this setting is not what the MDC wing of the unity government were expected to condone, let alone participate in. However there was one member of the cabinet, MDC MP David Coultart minister for education, who has refused this type of transport. The reason being that this type of vehicle was not suitable for the rural roads of his constituency. -

As education of the children is the future for the country University students, who have been denied an education for approximately 12 months re opened in 3/09. Closed because of broken services only 68 of the registered 12, 000, students at the University of Harare had enrolled at the recent restart of classes. In times past the meat of the dead animal would be seized by hungry villagers for the pot. To do so now would people die. It has been found that the poachers are using tranquilliser darts that are, not only quiet, but are filled with a drug the residue of which leaves the carcass unreliable.

2.8m pupils are back at school as their teachers are beginning to be paid the promised \$00 - \$165 a month to work in crumbling classrooms.
