On behalf of Miss Horrell who is away at the moment, I would like to acknowledge your letter of 28th April, 1955.

I have just spoken to Mr. Barow, the Registrar of the South African Pharmacy Board (Pretoria) who has given me the following information:-

- 1. The M.L. Sultan Technical College in Durban has received a large financial grant which will enable it to establish a pharmaceutical branch. They are at the moment awaiting the approval of the Minister of Education before embarking on a building.
 - This is an Indian college but it accepts African students whenever there are no facilities for them elsewhere.
- 2. Rhodes University is considering establishing a degree course in pharmacy. They too are awaiting the approval of the Minister of Education. If this is received, Fort Hare will probably be able to arrange a course in conjunction with Rhodes.

I have also spoken to the Pharmaceutical Society in Johannesburg. They have promised to send a syllabus direct to you.

We will let you know of any further developments. The position for the future seems fairly hopeful.

In Mr. Whyte's temporary absence, I am replying to your letter of 23rd May, 1955.

I am so sorry, but at present there are no facilities for Coloured youths to train as pharmacists. The S. A. Pharmacy Board is hoping to have classes started at Fort Hare and possibly at the M. L. Sultan Technical College in Durban; but at present nothing is decided, and I really would not advise your son to wait.

I don't quite agree with you that if he takes a teacher's course he may find it difficult to obtain a post. Coloured education is expanding continuously in the Cape, and there should be plenty of posts for teachers, particularly those with matriculation certificates.

If he is not interested in teaching, however, he might try for a clerical post, applying to

- a) The Commissioner for Coloured Affairs, Private Bag 176, Cape Town; or
- b) The Secretary for Social Welfare, Koedoe Building, Pretoria; or
- c) The Secretary for Health, Locarno House, Schoeman Street, Pretoria.

All three departments have a considerable number of posts for Coloured men, and there are opportunities of promotion. Posts in the Coloured Affairs Division are in Cape Town, but the other two departments mentioned have offices at various points throughout the country.

I do hope that your son will find something congenial to do.
