I thank you for your letter of the 10th April, 1959, which related to the Julius Robinson Educational and Charitable Trust Fund Scholarships. I assume that the scholarship in which you are interested is that which is available to African Medical students. This scholarship is intended to foster the medical education of Africans in a Southern African environment. It is to be awarded to the most meritorious African commencing studies for the M.B., B.Ch. degree at the University and it may be held for the whole period of study for the degree, subject to satisfactory progress and it will have the value of £400 per annum. In selecting the scholar, evidence of qualities of character is taken into account, as well as intellectual ability as shown by the candidate's previous scholastic record. It is a condition of the award of the scholarship that the scholar will be obliged, upon graduating as a medical practitioner, to practise in South Africa or the Protectorates for a period of at least three years. The scholar for this year was chosen from among persons who had been accepted for admission to the Faculty of Medicine. As you know, admission to this Faculty is limited, and students are admitted on the basis of academic merit.
