Secondly, he thinks I was chosen to represent Southern Africa, not South Africa. However, my argument is not altogether based on the fact that I wasn't asked to the Ecumenical Conference. It was an indication to me that I am not intimately enough connected with inter-church activities in South Africa. I do not see much point in remaining on a committee in a representative capacity if I am not really representative, but Jack persists that he is leaving the matter in abeyance for the time being. In any case, his letter is a little more optimistic about South African interests in the AACC.

Arthur, do you think you can excuse me from writing the article. At the moment I am trying to concentrate on one thing only, and that is the Hofmeyr book. If you persist, however, you must let me know immediately.
