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## AMERICANS ROUTE JAPANESE TROOPS IN PHILIPPINES

THE WAR IN THE FAR EAST HAS BEEN INTENSIFIED. THE JAPANESE ARE ATTACKING NEARLY EVERY ISLAND IN THE PACIFIC WITHIN THEIR REACH. BUT IN THE PHILIPPINES THEY HAVE BEEN ROUTED WITH HEAVY LOSSES BY AMERICAN FORCES. A COMMUNIQUE ISSUED IN WASHINGTON STATES THAT ENEMY TANKS AND INFANTRY CONCENTRATIONS WERE SHATTERED AND DISPERSED WITH HEAVY LOSS. AND ENEMY ARTILLERY WAS COMPELLED TO WITHDRAW FROM ITS POSITIONS.

THE JAPANESE ARE SUFFERING REVERSSES IN CHINA. A MESSAGE FROM CHUNGKING STATES THAT IN THE CHANGSA BATTLE JAPAN LOST 45,000 MEN IN KILLED AND WOUNDED. AND THE CHINESE HAVE LAUNCHED A NEW OFFENSIVE IN EASTERN HONAN.

## CHINESE INFILCT HEAVY LOSSES

The fall of Kuala Lumpur, in Malaya, is confirmed. Stores and material were destroyed while free gifts were given to the Native population by the evacuating troops.

Following the acquisition of aerodromes near Singapore the Japanese are resorting to daylight raids. Over six of their planes were shot down.

The following is the text of a communiqué issued in Washington:

"In 24 hours' continuous artillery fighting, American and Philippine batteries proved definitely superior to those of the Japanese."

"Columns of enemy tanks and other armoured units, as well as infantry concentrations, were shattered and dispersed by our fire with heavy Japanese losses. Our counter-battery fire was particularly effective."

"Eleven hostile batteries were silenced. Enemy artillery units have now been withdrawn well to the rear of the positions they formerly occupied."

"Losses to American and Philippine troops were relatively slight."

## RUSSIANS STILL PURSUING THE RETREATING GERMANS

Staraya Russa, ten miles south of Lake Ilmen and almost due south of Leningrad, is in Soviet hands according to Stockholm reports quoted by the Vichy news agency.

A Soviet communiqué states that Kirov, in the Smolensk region, and Gorokhovo, near Mozhaisk, have been recaptured by the Russian Army.

In the Staritsa-Rzhev sector, north-west of Moscow, the Russians are reported to have made a further advance. There has been fierce fighting on the banks of the Volga to the east and west of Rzhev.

Other Stockholm reports state that the Russians have resumed the initiative on the Arctic front, where German attacks on fortifications on the Rybachy (fisherman's) peninsula have been repulsed.

### CRIMEA

"Russian Army units are pursuing the enemy, who is trying to entrench himself in the Crimea," says "Izvestia."

The newspaper adds: "Heavy losses are being inflicted on the German troops. Soviet aircraft are also active blowing up bridges, cutting off the retreating Fascists and bombing road concentrations, troops and ammunition and armament depots."

### China

With the Changsa battle drawing to a close the Chinese forces have started offensive operations in eastern Honan Province, concentrating their attacks in the area near the junction of the Lunhai and Tsienhsin-Pukow railways.

A Chinese military spokesman in Chunking said that the Japanese lost more than 45,000 killed and wounded in the Changsa battle. Japanese prisoners and large quantities of guns, equipment and supplies have not yet been counted.

Referring to the Changsa battle, the spokesman said that the Japanese relief column of 8,000 men effected a junction with the main body retreating south of the Milo River, but the combined force was surrounded and 80 per cent. of the effectiveness of the relief column was destroyed.

Only a small portion of the Japanese forces reached the northern bank of the river, where the Chinese are continuing their relentless pursuit.

### Nazi Soldiers Run Amock

The British United Press states that the news of the execution of 62 German soldiers who revolted against an order sending them back to Russia has filtered into unoccupied France.

The men belonged to three divisions billeted at Besancon. They were halfstarved and in rags, physically exhausted and mentally desperate. No sooner had they arrived at Besancon than they ran wild, drank all they could seize, defied the local authorities and sometimes their own military police and officers.

The real trouble began when their leave was cancelled, and they were told that they would be sent back to Russia. Rioting broke out, shots were fired and several men were wounded. Then the High Command stepped in ruthlessly. Hundreds of arrests were made and scores of soldiers were courtmartialled, the worst offenders being shot.

It is stated that this state of affairs is not exceptional among soldiers returned from Russia.

## SOUTH AFRICAN FORCES CAPTURE SOLLUM

A communiqué issued by British General Headquarters in the Middle East reports the capture of Sollum by a Transvaal Scottish regiment.

The communiqué also reports that the British columns have made considerable progress towards El Agheila.

The general line between El Agheila and Marada, along which the Germans appear to be preparing to make a stand, is roughly 60 miles in length.

Details of the assault on Sollum are not available, but reports indicate that it fell after fierce fighting. The South

### Hitler Thinks Of Safety First

It is learned in Zurich from an unquestionable source in Berlin that Hitler has moved his headquarters from Smolensk to some place "in Southern Russia" not named.

From the same source it is learned also that altogether 25 leading German generals have resigned in consequence of the dismissal of General von Brauchitsch. Among them is General von Kleist.

Berlin correspondents of Swedish newspapers report that a German military spokesman admitted numerous changes in the German High Command, but denied that there had been a "generals' crisis."

These correspondents also report that authoritative circles confirm that calling up to the German colours is now proceeding on a considerable scale. No secrets are made of this, and sometimes men are given extremely short notice. The Germans declare that important military actions are now being prepared.

### Joe Louis To Fight Hitler

Joe Louis, the World's heavy weight champion, who retained his title on Friday night January 9 by knocking out Buddy Baer in the first round, has decided to join the United States Army, says a message from Chicago. Joe Louis has left the ring in order to fight Hitler on the battlefield. He will be there when Hitler is dealt the knock-out blow.

The Board will be presided over by one of the most senior Magistrates of the Department of Justice and steps are being taken for the Chief Native Commissioner of the Witwatersrand to be appointed as a member of the Board."



## Under Hail Of Fire

The South African forces which played an important part in driving Facist Italy out of Somaliland, Abyssinia and Eritrea, are again distinguishing themselves in the Libyan campaign. Their heroic stand against Germans at Sidi Rezegh early in the campaign has won the admiration of the world and has given South Africa a place of honour in the history which is now being written in blood on the battlefields of Europe, Africa and Asia. Again at Bardia, the South African soldiers "added lustre to the name of South Africa" by storming and capturing the fortress.

We do not here propose to repeat singing the praises that have already been sung throughout the British Commonwealth of Nations. Suffice it to say we join in the chorus of those who say: "Well done South Africa!"

But the story of the South Africans' heroic stand at Sidi Rezegh and of their triumphal march into Bardia would not be complete without mentioning the role played by African soldiers as stretcher-bearers. These men shared with their white comrades in arms, not only the dangers of modern warfare with its destructive weapons but also the glory of upholding South Africa's prestige and reputation as a fighting nation.

"At Sidi Rezegh" says a statement from the Department of Defence, "they played an heroic part. Stretcher-bearers stuck to their posts when the enemy attacked. For hours on end, they carried wounded men from the battlefield to the dressing stations often under heavy fire. Many lives were saved by their devotion."

This high tribute cannot fail to impress the African people throughout the length and breadth of South Africa, and will go a long way to give impetus to the recruiting that is now going on. It has sent a thrill of hope throughout Bantustan, for it is a recognition of the African soldiers as part and parcel of the Union's Defence forces, and of the African people as an integral part of the South African nation.

At Bardia, our men showed the same bravery and courage as was displayed by their comrades at Sidi Rezegh. "The way the Natives went on without faltering was simply magnificent," said an officer to Sapa's war correspondent, who also reported that "a Native stretcher-bearer corporal, after receiving four wounds while bringing in the injured, continued to supervise the work of his section, and to help those who had been wounded, for 14 hours."

The same correspondent says: "In this battalion, as in others, I heard tributes paid to the Native stretcher-bearers." The correspondent was told of the heroism of African soldiers by a colonel who said: "I saw them go up under fire repeatedly to carry out the wounded. Never once did I see any of them hesitate. Even when the enemy found a gap through which the stretcher-bearers were reaching the regimental aid post the Natives carried on regardless of the shelling."

There can be no doubt that our men "Up North" have made history and have enhanced our position in the national life of South Africa. Their brave deeds have stirred the hearts of all men and women of goodwill, and shall always be remembered whenever men speak or read of Hitler's devastating war. Our men are participating magnificently in this tragic drama in human history. "Some have lost their lives, some are wounded, some are prisoners of war and some are posted missing," but they have covered themselves with glory. It is for those of our race who are physically fit to enlist so as to take their place on the battlefield. The war against Hitlerism and all that it stands for has yet to be won, and it cannot be easily won until the man-power of the allied nations has been effectively mobilised. More and more men are wanted and Africans should not miss the opportunity of breaking for ever colour barriers by joining the Defence Forces of this country.

## THE LATE SENATOR F.S. MALAN

(By Senator J. D. Rheinallt Jones)

The African people have lost a great friend and helper through the death of Senator the Rt. Hon. F.S. Malan. He was a true liberal because he believed that every man and woman, every people and nation, have rights which must be respected. He fought against every attempt to take away these rights.

Senator Malan's interest in the welfare of the African people was not just sentimental. There are many people who are interested in the African people because they are strange to them, something mysterious, picturesque or quaint; or for some odd sentimental reason. When they realise that Africans want to exercise their human rights, and are not satisfied with being objects of charity, these people lose their interest and complain that the "Natives are spoilt now-a-days." The true friend of the African people believes in them, not only as they used to be, but also as they are and as they can be in the future. He will fight for their rights as he would fight for his own. He will oppose oppression or injustice wherever he sees it applied—to Coloured and Indian or a White person, as much as to an African. Senator Malan was such a man.

I knew him for over thirty years. As Convener of the European-Bantu Conference, held in Bloemfontein in 1933, I asked him to come there to be chairman. He was a great success. He tactfully overcame language difficulties; he handled the large gathering with masterly skill, his closing address thrilled us all. It was the first time that he had heard Africans taking so full and free a part in discussions; and he was greatly impressed.

When the historic fight took place in 1936 over the Cape Native Franchise, Senator Malan proved how true a liberal he was. I spent many weeks in Cape Town on the matter and my advisers were Sir James Rose-Innes Senator Malan and Sir Clerkson Tregold. Sir James is still with us at 87, and I recently had a most encouraging letter from him. He and Senator Malan gave me advice on the legal and constitutional aspects and their advice I passed on to the Executive Committee of the All African Convention, which was then deliberating in Cape Town. On one occasion Sir James Rose-Innes answered an urgent call from the Committee and he met the Committee personally. Senator Malan also fought in the party census. I shall never forget the magnificent fight he put up for the Cape Native Franchise at the Joint sittings of both Parliament. Senator Malan (Afrikaans-speaking) and Mr. C. W. A. Coulter, M.P. (English-speaking) were the only two champions (Mr. Hofmeyr was ill in hospital), but they never wavered. Senator Malan on one occasion dominated the debate. I can see him now going, to and fro on the floor of the House—crying "Backward or Forward—I say Forward." It was a wonderful, historic picture.

When the Senators who represent the Africans first entered the Senate, Senator Malan introduced them. We found in him a friend and a father. We shall miss him greatly. I hope the African people will never forget his name.

Petrol Rationing

The coupons will be valid only for the month in which they are issued, and no hoarding will be possible. The coupons will be available from any post office, and the car licence must be produced.

Persons who are away from home when the petrol rationing comes into effect, will be supplied with supplementary coupons in order to allow them to return to their homes, by the most direct route.

If it is, how in perdition do you expect to have a voice that will reach the Big Bugs?

Can it be that you belong to that school of thought which believes that a mug is born every day who ministers to the whims of the wise? And that these mugs will do the work for you while you loaf about playing games and going to dances? We know our people quite well in spite of the fact that we do not move among them especially the man in the street sort of African. 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## MISS MINA SOGA AND MRS. SESEDI SPEAK AT W. N. TOWNSHIP

A large gathering of African residents in W. N. Township and Sophiatown was addressed by Miss Mina Soga General President of the African National Council of Women, and Mrs. Sesedi President of the same council on Wednesday night January 7.

Mr. L. J. Mfeka assisted by Mr. M. W. Somunzi presided. Notable personalities present were Mesdames A. B. H. Xuma, N. P. Hela, J. Masoleng, Misses B. B. Gopane of Kimberley and Matilda Somunzi of Keiskamahoek and many other ladies.

The aim of this gathering was to organise a branch of the African National Council of Women in the Western Township. Miss Soga, the first speaker very ably lead the gathering to the aims of their Council which are:

1. Unity among African women irrespective of race or creed; which unity, she said will enable them to speak with one word at one time and thereby be heard by the government.

2. To organise communion of thought and ideals which will enable them to better the home front economically, socially educationally, and in all spheres of life.

3. To organise mutual education for adult; interest themselves as national women in national affairs.

Miss Soga spoke very feelingly on the need of unity. Among African women. She says there are difficulties that naturally must be seen first by women and put right by them. "Our homes are in a deplorable state. The high cost of living particularly in urban areas has been the sole cause of unhappiness in our homes, and subsequently turned our children delinquent," said Miss Soga.

Mrs Sesedi commenting on Miss Soga's remarks said "the help is in our hands. We must come together and reason together. Before we throw the mud on the government as we usually do, let us first see if the fault is not in us. Let us come together and reason together, then we shall find the remedy. Away with racialism. Let us have capable leaders no matter what tribe they may be, as long as they are capable of doing what Africans want," emphatically stressed these ladies.

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



## How To Make Full Use Of Your Oven Heat

If you use a coal range, make a point of utilizing all the waste heat of the oven. Many dishes that need slow cooking may be cooked overnight, for instance, cereals of all kinds will not only be better in flavour, but also more easily digested if made the night before, then covered closely and put into the oven to finish. Dried fruits of all kinds, beans, peas and lentils, salt beef, soups etc., may be done the same way, having started them on the top of the stove.

In using electric or gas stoves, plan all meals so that full use of the oven may be made, and full advantage taken of the economy of cooking on retained heat. Complete meals may be cooked in the oven, but it is important to plan dishes and foods that require the same temperature.

## Oil As A Substitute For Butter In Cake-Making

Oil may be used as a substitute for butter in cake-making, giving a fine-grained, tender cake, by following one or two methods: at the last, just before the beaten whites of eggs are folded in; or (2) The oil is heated and half is creamed with the sugar, while the other half is added last and beaten into the batter. Much better results, however, are obtained if the number of eggs is doubled when this second method is used. With either method it is necessary to reduce the quantity of liquid and of baking powder one-quarter. Thus in a standard cake recipe which calls for  $\frac{1}{2}$  cup fat,  $1\frac{1}{2}$  cups sugar, 2 eggs, 1 cup milk, 3 cups flour, 4 teaspoons baking powder and 1 teaspoon flavouring, the amount of milk should be reduced to  $\frac{1}{2}$  cup and the baking powder to 3 teaspoons. It has also been found that a hot oven will produce a cake that will contain more moisture and will stay fresher longer than one baked in a moderate or slow oven.

## Save Cooking Time

A great deal of time and labour will be saved if the following method is adopted in the making of pancakes, fritters, or batters for coating fish, etc., instead of breaking the eggs into the flour and then gradually mixing in the milk, put milk into basin, break in the eggs, whisk for a few seconds until frothy, then gradually add the flour. Continue beating with rotary egg-beater until smooth, which will only take a few seconds and produce a lighter and far superior batter than the former method.

## Bantu Women Visit Military Camp

Sir,

Just a word of thanks to the men who make life pleasant for our men in the Army; namely the Y.M.C.A. We as mothers of the race thought it wise to peep in one of the Camps and see what is going on. Thanks to the European Staff who allowed us to visit one of the Camps.

On Sunday, January 4, we had the pleasure of visiting one of our Military Camps at Driefontein. We were the guests of Messrs. S. Ntombela and S. Msimang, who are both students of Jan Hofmeyr School of Social work, but who were, during the holidays, assisting the Y.M.C.A. men at that Camp.

The men who are doing the Y.M.C.A. work in this Camp are Messrs. More Mqabesiza, Rammala and Mqwetiso. Unfortunately, we were only introduced to and met Messrs. More and Mqabesiza as Messrs. Rammala and Mqwetiso had gone out for their week-end.

During our short stay at Camp, we looked at things from a Soldier's point of view. First we were shown what I would call a Dormitory; I do not know whether this term suits the Army. It was very interesting to see how and where our men sleep; which is very important in life, also to see the way our men keep their dormitories tidy. We understood that inspections are conducted every morning, to see to the tidiness of the place. We saw the laundry, the kitchen, the lavatories from afar: all looked very clean.

Then we saw the quarters of the Y.M.C.A. men, just messes. I must not forget to mention that at this juncture, it was amusing to see how these men go in and out of their "Digs" as they called them, Mr. ex. Msimang was kind enough to demonstrate.

From here we were treated to tea, and here again there was something to learn. We saw a new kind of Milk, powdered, called "Klim." The boys did not forget to remind us that the word Klim was the word Milk spelt the other way round. After tea we were shown round the Y.M.C.A. shop, and here again was another bag full of interesting things. You will undoubtedly be surprised to learn that the Y.M.C.A. men are entrusted with a very responsible job in his shop, that of running the shop on their own, and handling large sums of money. A soldier's needs are few and interesting. We saw such things as kit bags, which play the part of a complete Wardrobe. It was interesting to see how these

our specials—to our greatest surprise. The boys had to explain bags could be under lock and key, and the owner be quite at ease knowing that the keys are different, and that one key will not open any other lock except its own.



This, however, is a brief and hasty summary of all that one sees in a Military Camp. So you can see that after all things are not too bad for a soldier. Among other things the Y.M.C.A. provides writing material, and the writing of letters for the men free of charge. I must not forget to mention however that these are "Boys in Khaki" and that they have a language of their own; that they will talk in riddles, and when you are with them you are bound to hear such things as "How do you do," "As you were," "You are doing both" and etc.

On our way to the station an interesting episode took place, which sent peals of laughter from all of us. As it was drizzling and there were signs of an approaching storm, the boys were kind enough to borrow us their military coats. You can imagine how we looked in them. ### Louis Knocked Out Baer In 1st. Round

Joe Louis knocked out Buddy Baer in the first round of his twentieth fight in defence of his title on Friday, January 9, in aid of the Naval Relief Society. The contest lasted 2 min. 56 sec.

The Madison Square Garden was crowded to its flag-covered roof on Friday night, when Joe Louis carried his title into the ring for the twentieth time to defend it against the challenger, Buddy Baer.

Long before the fight was

scheduled to begin every spectator was in his seat, and among the early arrivals were three ex-heavy-weight champions—Lieutenant-Commander Gene Tunney, of the United States Naval Reserve, Jack Dempsey and James Braddock. Many British sailors and members of the Royal Air Force were scattered among the crowd, which included the Secretary of the Navy Colonel Frank Knox, and many leading figures of the political and social world.

All had come to view the unique spectacle of a world champion staking his crown "for not even a dime," but merely for the benefit of the Navy Relief Society, which will receive about two-thirds or more of the night's takings.


