Chairman's Report.

T has been decided that the future Annual Reports be brought out in the middle of the year instead of at the beginning, so that it may be more up to date at the time of the Annual Meeting. This report, therefore, will cover a period of eighteen months.

Perhaps the most important event of recent months, so far as the Princess Alice Hospital is concerned, was the opening of the new Out-patients' Department on April 21st by the Mayoress of Johannesburg. This splendid block of buildings, comprising Doctor's Consulting Room, Waiting Room, Dispensary, and Verandah was the gift of Dr. and Mrs. H. R. Mullins in memory of their son Dick. We are indeed grateful to them for their generosity.

The Municipal Health Department drew our attention to the fact that in order to make the Hospital thoroughly efficient we would have to undertake extensive alterations, additions, and improvements to the main buildings. Although we had not the funds in hand, we felt that the work must go forward, and with the kind assistance of the Bishop we were able to borrow from the Diocese the sum of £500 at a nominal rate of interest. This sum is being repaid at the rate of £10 per month. We are grateful to Dr. B. C. Melle, and Mr. N. T. Cowin for acting as guarantors for this loan. It is satisfactory to feel that the Hospital buildings are now up to date and that the erection of a vacuum tank and the installation of a completely new drainage system has solved the problem of sewerage disposal until Sophiatown is connected with the main drainage.

Our Medical Superintendent, Dr. L. Chapman, resigned her position in January, and we thank her for the good work she put in during the time she was with us. Dr. V. Pietersen acted for a short time as locum at the Hospital and in April we were fortunate in securing the services of Dr. Janet Booker as Medical Superintendent and Dr. Marion Reid who assists her in the work. We are fortunate in not losing altogether the services of Dr. Pietersen as she has taken over the work at our clinic at Nancefield. For a few months this work was in the capable hands of Dr. Jean Rountree.

Our Matron, Miss Jean Urquhart-Smith, left in May 1936 and it would be hard to thank her for the admirable service which she gave us. She was succeeded by Miss C. M. Heddy who (laus Deo) is still with us. Miss Heddy has faced a very trying year with unfailing cheerfulness and determination and her efficient and painstaking work is reflected in every branch of the Hospital's activities. Sickness and changes in the Staff have meant that for long periods she has been the only European at the Hospital, and she has suffered much at the hands of builders, to say nothing of other trials that have come her way.

Sister Drew, and Sister Laing both served on the staff for short periods, and we thank them for their work. Sister Thomas came to us in July and we are already wondering how the Hospital ever got on without her.

Nurse Betty Dichabeng and Nurse M. Majambozi have left our service after years of fine work and devoted service.

Miss Willis very kindly took charge of the Hospital during Matron's leave, and, as well, put in yeoman service as a voluntary assistant at other times. Mrs. Crawford has for some time given her voluntary services once a week and has been of untold help to Matron and the Staff.

We regret to record the death in December last of Miss E. M. Bayes who gave us most valuable help in the capacity of Voluntary Masseuse. Her position has not yet been filled.

Mrs. John Chapman still serves us well as Secretary and Treasurer, and we thank her for all the work she puts in.

I would also thank members of the Executive and House Committees for their work and interest. Dr. Mullins, our Vice-Chairman has resigned on leaving for England. We will feel his loss more than we can say. We somehow felt so safe with him as our friend and adviser and there was never any question about his decisions being carried out. We would wish him and his family every happiness in England, and we hope, indeed that he will one day come back to us. Mrs. J. S. Brown, Mrs. Black, Mrs. R. C. J. Meyer and Miss D. Maud have left the Committee within the last eighteen months and we thank them for their services.

We thank Dr. B. G. Melle for his services as honarary consultant, and Dr. Mills who assisted us until he left the Sophiatown district.

The Staff of the Sophiatown Missions, and the Staff of "Ekutuleni" are our good friends and their services to us are unending. Members of the Toc H have also given much practical help.

Countless others have helped the work forward in one way and another and we wish them to know that their help and encouragement are very greatly valued.

Treasurer's Report.

HE Expenditure in the last eighteen months has been rather high but this is due to the increase in staff, the renewal of equipment, the various articles required to furnish or equip the new additions, etc. The Revenue showed a slight increase. Our Municipal Grant has been permanently increased to \pounds 100 per annum and the Union Native Affairs Department have made a Grant in accordance with our Staff. In 1936 the Grant was for \pounds 225, and in 1937 \pounds 235. These amounts have given us much help and we sincerely appreciate the Department's co-operation.

Our Street-collection realized $\pounds 298$ which was a little less than in the previous year. Unfortunately we were short of collectors, owing to the Empire Exhibition, and this was a great drawback.

The Parkview, Winstead and Crown Mines Sewing Parties have considerably assisted us by making sheets, pillow-cases, nightdresses, etc., and we thank them for their ever-ready sympathy and support.

The Out-Patients' fees (Sophiatown) show a decrease but this is in consequence of the large number of free cases seen by the Doctor. The Nancefield Clinic had four months without the usual routine and this caused a big falling off in the figures. In-Patients' fees have not improved, but we were rather unfortunate in having a whooping cough case develop in the Ward, which necessitated closing the children's section for almost a month. The changes in the Medical Staff were also responsible for the decrease as the Bantu are very conservative and it takes them a considerable time to become accustomed to new doctors. Now, however, they have learnt to love and trust our new officer, we have noticed a very marked improvement.

Our special thanks are due to the Union Native Affairs Department, the Johannesburg Municipality, the Mining and Business Houses, and the general public for their continued support. Despite the many appeals to their generosity they always come forward and give us the assistance we seek.

A very big 'Thank-you' must go to all who so kindly send gifts in kind to the Hospital. These are so very greatly appreciated and do much to help in the keeping down of the accounts.

The annual subscriptions are still very small and it would be wonderful if we could only boast of $\pounds 500$ annual subscribers of $\pounds I$, or 10/- each ! It is the small sums that do help us along with our financial burden. To act as guide to any who are interested, the following figures will illustrate our proposed Expenditure and Revenue for 12 months.
