·February:

Father and Son Week was observed during this month by the Patterson Avenue Branch "Y". The Father and Son service was held at New Bethel Baptist Church, with the pastor Rev. Jerry Drayton delivering the sermon to the visitors and congregation. He gave a very impressive and inspirational service for the occasion. A large attendance was noted. Carlton L.
