AUGUST 9th In centres in Johannesburg and on the Reef women hold tea parties and prayer meetings, in view of ban on meetings and sell commemoration badges "women don't want passes!" In other centres in the Union badges were sold and meetings 14.7.58 arranged where possible. Not fully reported. OCTOBER 1958 Benoni 1,000 women meet at Nobadula Hall and resolve not to take passes. Pass unit at Wattribe is boycotted by women and on second day hundreds of women demonstrated at Superintendent's office. Pass unit has to move to Daveyton 2.10.58 p.1.

Brakpan

Women in Brakpan refused passes, but demestic servants living in town accepted.

On October 15th, issuing of passes in Johannesburg began. On October 21st first mass arrests took place when women demonstrated at pass office.
