## "I WOULD LIKE TO LIVE AND DIE AS A ZULU" REGINA BROOKS

"I HAVE ALWAYS CONSIDERED MYSELF A ZULU," REGINA BROOKS TOLD A JOHANNESBURG MAGISTRATE ON MONDAY.

"IF I AM GIVEN THE CHOICE, I WILL LIVE AS ONE, AND DIE AS ONE."

BROOKS, WHO IS 22 YEARS OLD, STOOD TRIAL WITH POLICE SERGEANT RICHARD KUMALO, 30, ON A CHARGE OF IMMORALITY.

ALL DAY LONG, CROWDS OF AFRICANS HUNG ABOUT THE COURTS WAITING TO CATCH A GLIMPSE OF HER.

STREAMS OF EUROPEANS PASSED THROUGH THE OPPOSITE COURT STOEOP, TO SEE HER AND HER BABY, TANDI.

Many Africans sent messages to Brooks, begging her to come out and show herself.

Twice she went on to the Main Street balcony to show herself to the crowd there. They shouted and clapped.

At lunch-time, crowds of Africans and Coloureds streamed to the courts from the factories.

They swamped the court passages.

A crowd gathered about Brooks and walked with her to a house in Main Street, Ferreirstown.

They hung about outside, while she had lunch inside with a coloured family.

In the morning session, Tandi slept in a shawl on her mother's back, while Brooks gave evidence.

In the afternoon, Tandi was awake in her mother's arms. Tandi spotted a glass of water on the Prosecutor's table and called out:

"Mama, mama, amanzi, tafuleni."

Brooks gave all her evidence in Zulu, through an interpreter. She said:

"I am 22 years old. My father is dead. My mother is still alive. I have brothers and sisters.

"I left my parents when I was seven years old. I went to live with the Viljoen's on their farm.

"Viljoen has one child with my sister. The child is a girl, aged 13 years. My sister is Mrs. Viljoen. She also has two coloured children.

"Mr. and Mrs. Viljoen and the one white child and the two coloured children stayed on the farm.

"When I was ten I went to a European farm school.

"I stayed there till I was 13. I did not play with the white children. They treated me with contempt and sometimes they hit me.

"The children beat me because they said my sister had coloured children.

"Their parents told them not to play with us.

"The black people gave me the name of Linda Malinga.

"I regard it as my own name."

Continuing her evidence, Regina Brooks said:

"As a Zulu, I took part in the brewing of kaffir beer.

"I made amacansi (mats) and I also took part in the Zulu tribal dances.

"I took part in grinding the corn in the Zulu way.

"At times I slept in Viljoen's house. At other times I slept with the black girls in their rooms on the farm.

"I attended the Zulu ceremonies.

"I also attended their weddings.

"It was at one of these weddings that I met Richard Kumalo.

"I regard myself as a muntu. The Zulus on the farm regard me as one of themselves.

"If I was to be given a choice, I would like to live and die as a Zulu.

"I have never been to a European bioscope. I once went into a European cafe, but I didn't have meals there.

"I have never entered a

## SOCCER PUZZLE

Representatives of the S.A. Non-European Soccer Federation met the European body last Sunday to discuss access to the World Organisation. Only delegates from the two bodies attended the meeting at the Rand Stadium, Johannesburg.

For some time the Non-European Federation has wanted to affiliate with the Europeans to gain access to the world organisation. The Europeans did not consider the application until recently when the Non-Europeans sent their application to the world organisation which referred the matter back to South Africa. The World Football Federation wants the two bodies to discuss the matter on equal footing. The world organisation will not tolerate discrimination in sport, and will not recognise two bodies from one country.

## HORROR IN PRETORIA HOME

A terrified Indian girl of about 11 looked on as her mother was butchered to death last Wednesday night at Highlands, Pretoria.

Mrs. Miesie Anderson was found after a butcher's knife had been thrust into her chest.

In what neighbours believe to have been an act of a mad man her assailant drove a blunt piece of iron into the stab wound.

The iron was extracted from the body at hospital the next day.

Mrs. Anderson was the mother of seven children. Her eldest daughter helplessly watched the horrifying attack. The girl was told to keep quiet and not to move. The attack was made at about 11 p.m. She died about 3 a.m.

Her daughter told neighbours the grim news later in the morning.

## REWARD OFFERED IN SEARCH FOR AXE-KILLER

The search for Natal's notorious "Axe-killer" continues but still no trace can be found of the madman who has claimed 13 victims during the past twelve months.

The latest move in the intensified search has been the offer of a £50 reward by the Natal police for information which will lead to the capture of the killer.

This is the first time that police in Natal have resorted to the offering of a reward for an African criminal, but they feel that this may make their extremely difficult task a little easier. The killer refrains from appearing in public places but keeps to the rough terrain of the countryside which is plentiful in hiding places.

## MOKONE - NHLAPO CLASH UNLIKELY THIS YEAR

A move is being made by promoter Mr. Seaman Chetty of Durban to match Elijah Mokone, S.A. featherweight champion with Enoch Nhlapo, Transvaal champion in a title fight.

Mr. Chetty intends to put on this fight in Johannesburg at the Wembley Stadium. His plans are to promote in conjunction with Mr. Bethuel Mnguni of the Rainbow Sporting Club of Germiston, on December 28.

Neither boxer has signed up for this fight. Mokone's camp reached a gentleman's agreement with Seaman Chetty a short while ago.

Mokone is prepared to fight Nhlapo, the only tough opposition now left for him in the feather division. This would be the fight of the year. But Nhlapo is not yet interested. He would like to have two more fights before fighting Mokone. But if his manager insists he'll take on the fight. "I'm not scared of Mokone," he said. "I'll give him the run of his life."

The fighting school boy is sitting for his matriculation examination. After the examination he may have to choose between his education and his newly acquired career, boxing.

In any case it does not seem the fight will be possible this year. Firstly Nhlapo's training time is short. Secondly, Richard Samuels had intimated that they wanted to fight the school-boy early next year and thirdly, he would like Mokone to defend his S.A. lightweight title against Young Roberts, the Cape Coloured champion on December 21. Therefore Mokone would not be in a position to fight Nhlapo a week later.

The Cape Town bout will be promoted by Tiger Shaik. He has not yet agreed on the Mokone camp terms.

## All Anglican schools in S. Transvaal will close in April

The Bishop of Johannesburg, the Rt. Rev. R. Ambrose Reeves told the Bantu World that on April 1st, 1955, the Anglican Church will close all its schools in the Southern Transvaal rather than co-operate with the Government in implementing the Bantu Education Act. The loss of buildings and contents to the Church will be £45,000.

Apart from the 23 mission schools to be closed, there will be 16 farm schools and 9 mine schools which will be automatically lost to the Church in terms of the Act, and of the Native Affairs Department circular of August this year. These were all built with Church funds.

This crucial decision will involve about 200 African teachers and 10,000 children. The Church is not prepared to apply for permission to retain control of its schools for the

time being. This would mean receiving a government grant limited to 75 per cent of teachers' salaries, and involving the Diocese in a yearly expenditure of £50,000.

The Church could rent or sell the schools. It is going to do neither. It will have no part in a system of education which it believes is contrary to the principles which ought to be the foundation of all education.

The four schools on Church freehold property will be turned into parish halls for clubs, Sunday Schools etc. These are the Elexandra, Evaton, Lawley lands and Sophiatown schools.

Asked what the reaction of the Government was to this decision, the Bishop replied that there was no indication of it yet, though Dr. Eisselen had been written to about a week before.

"African people are not being abandoned?" Bishop R. Reeves said. "It has been tragic to come to this decision," he continued. "We shall take every step possible to find other ways and means of discharging our responsibility to our African members. We are making other ways and means of serving the African children."

## Who wants Board at Lady Selborne?

WHO HAS ASKED THAT AN ADVISORY BOARD BE SET UP IN LADY SELBORNE? REGULATIONS FOR SUCH A BOARD WERE GAZETTED RECENTLY.

Mr. Brent, manager of the Pretoria Non-European Affairs Department, told a Bantu World reporter that leaders in Lady Selborne have for many years been asking for an Advisory Board.

But two recent meetings of residents emphatically rejected a proposal by the authorities to set up an Advisory Board.

The residents decided to form a village committee to look after their interests.

According to the gazetted regulations, the first Advisory Board election was to take place next month.

But the regulations were only gazetted after the nomination date. The election will therefore not take place this year.

## CONGRESS AND ECONOMICS

LAST WEEK WE RECOMMENDED THE ESTABLISHMENT OF A COMMITTEE OF EDUCATION BY THE AFRICAN NATIONAL CONGRESS. WE WISH TODAY TO RECOMMEND THE APPOINTMENT OF A COMMERCE AND ECONOMICS COMMITTEE.

We have more than once pointed out how much the African enriches others, and yet how poor he himself remains. In his speech, on part of which we commented, Mr. de Wet Nel, of the Native Affairs Commission, said the Africans in South Africa earned over £40 million in 1953.

Money is earned to be spent. Where is all this money spent? The African deserves the lion's share of the income he accumulates. Many of his people should make a living out of this wealth, by trading among their own people and by being afforded employment.

The committee suggested would make it its chief duty to help develop our commercial activities. It would encourage the formation of African chambers of commerce, co-operative buying and other concerns.

The inculcation of thrift and appreciation of the value and power of money would fall within the realm of duties devolving on the committee on commercial and economic affairs. The committee would take leave out of the economic books of other racial groups, and make the African not only read them but would say to him, "Go, and do thou likewise."

The Negro Americans, "our brethren 'neath the western skies," have a great deal to teach us. The proposed committee would make itself the channel through which they would teach us. They have their own banks and insurance association handling globular sums of money.

The committee would consider anything whatsoever, which directly or indirectly contributed to the filling of the tummy and to the covering of the body as not irrelevant to the programme of its functions.

Let us have this committee called into being at the next conference of our national organisation.

## EVATON BUS BOYCOTT

WE LEARN THAT THE LOCAL TRANSPORTATION BOARD HAS ALLOWED THE EVATON PASSENGER SERVICE TO RAISE ITS BUS FARES. THE MONTHLY TICKET IS TO COST FIFTY-FIVE INSTEAD OF FORTY-FIVE SHILLINGS, THE WEEKLY TICKET EIGHTEEN INSTEAD OF FIFTEEN SHILLINGS, AND THE SINGLE FARE IS TO BE HALF-A-CROWN INSTEAD OF TWO SHILLINGS, FROM 2 P.M. ON SATURDAYS TO SUNDAYS AS WELL AS ON PUBLIC HOLIDAYS.

The bus company concerned does not seem to have announced when the new fares will come into force. The Kliptown bus boycott is at present occupying the attention of the company. The Evaton People's Transport Council which is in close touch with the Kliptown boycott promoters, will ask the Evaton people to boycott the buses, on the day the new fares come into force.

No doubt, the Evaton people will be informed as to what to do when the appropriate time comes. It is necessary to remember that the Evaton buses do not carry workers only. They carry non-workers, school-children and visitors. Whatever is to be done must not be concealed from all these people.

The implications of a boycott must also be made clear to the people. They must realise that they will have to endure hardship and to make sacrifice of money, convenience, and in some cases even jobs before they achieve their objective.

The only reliable alternative transport between Evaton and Johannesburg will be the train. The railway monthly ticket is fifty-eight shillings and sixpence, the weekly is a pound, the single is four shillings and sixpence, and the return ticket five shillings and eleven pence.

The times of the trains also need to be noted. As there cannot be adequate transport for the close on two thousand workers from the village to the station, it will be necessary for them to walk in most cases.

We have called attention to all this, just in case efforts to convey these facts to all concerned prove ineffective, and people go into the boycott with insufficient appreciation of its implications. Any increase of bus fares we deplore. People are too poor to pay more.

## REEF AND COUNTRY

**Burgheersdorp.**—A tornado damaged 29 houses in the location here. Among the buildings that were most damaged were the Dutch Reformed, Ethiopian and A.M.E. Churches. Fortunately there were no casualties. The mayor has appealed for donations to help make good damage, which is estimated at well over a thousand pounds. It is gratifying to see how generously the European public is responding to the mayor's appeal to help the Africans.

**Mbabane.**—On November 6, the Rev. A. M. Kubedi of the A.M.E. Church in Swaziland, performed the opening ceremony of Mr. Dladla's business, called the Brown Dladla Bakery. It is the first of its kind in Msunduzi Township.

**Evaton.**—The Evaton public wish Nurse L. C. Gow speedy recovery from the illness that has sent her to Coronation. Paramount Chief Cyprian of the Zulus was on a short visit here last week.

The third Evaton scout troop of St. Luke's has been on the move recently. Among the places it visited was Krugersdorp where it attended the high school speech day. Scoutmaster Lakaje and helpers led the troop. At No. 533 Mgadi Street, in this township, a memorial service in honour of the late Mr. Joseph Mohlamme will be held on December 5, 1954, commencing at 1 p.m. His widow, Mrs. Susan Mohlamme, is responsible for arranging this service.—S. M.

What some writers consider worth publishing does not, in all conscience, deserve it. Don't nurse us for doing our duty. The interests of the vast majority of our readers are our sole concern.

All who like to write to newspapers must read this book, and do what it tells them to do, and avoid what it tells them not to do.

The subsequent life of Joseph Williams's widow forms the third and last part of the book, which to read is to add precious gems to one's knowledge of missionary history as well as African history.

### Higher rents remain big issue at Atteridgeville

WHEN WILL HIGHER RENTS FOR ATTERIDGEVILLE COME? AS FAR AS THE LOCAL ADVISORY BOARD KNOWS, THESE RENTS WILL NOT BE INTRODUCED UNTIL THE SELLING PRICES FOR THE HOUSES HAVE BEEN FIXED.

But Mr. Brent, manager of the Pretoria Non-European Affairs Department, told a Bantu World reporter that the new rents are due to be enforced on December 1st.

Mr. Brent said that the board had asked for a postponement. The superintendent is reported to have called a meeting at which he informed the people about the higher rents.

Kgudu-Moroho spokesmen have intensified their bitter attacks on the party now in office.

They allege that the board has failed to bring "these impossible rentals" to the attention of the people.

They say the people are anxious to know the board's attitude.

A spokesman of the board told our reporter that it was fighting for a lower selling price for houses. This was being considered by the Minister of Native Affairs, Dr. Verwoerd.

He added that the people would choose between buying their own houses or paying the higher rents.

That was why the board had asked that rents should not be introduced until the prices for the houses are fixed.

Mr. J. Mogaale, president of Kgudu-Moroho, has indicated that the party may test the rents in court.

According to Mr. Brent, the sale of the houses is expected to be carried from January next year.

The economic rents will affect 331 families in Atteridgeville, who earn more than £15 a month.

Two of these families earn up to £80 a month; two between £60 and £70; four up to £60, 13 up to £50; 42 up to £40; 125 up to £30; and 143 between £15 and £20.

Early in the day the schools took part in athletic sports. A little before 2 o'clock the children marched to the Methodist school, led by a band of scouts.

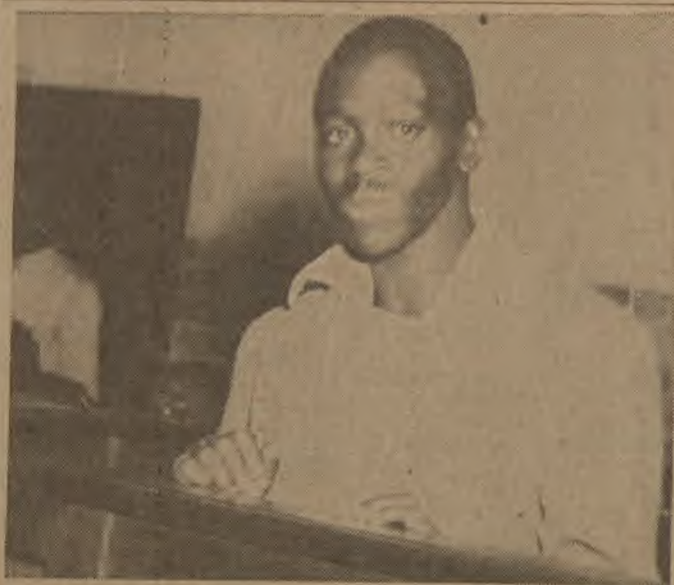
In his brief address, the Rev. E. E. Mahabane, Superintendent of the Schools said:

Some of the thugs assaulted the girl while others were busy on the engine. They used the headlights of their own car for light.

Two men in the neighbourhood saw what was happening. They quickly called others.

These brave men armed themselves but in the excitement omitted to plan the ambush.

The thugs managed to escape in their car.

When the police came, the car had long disappeared into White City Jabavu.

A man was found murdered in the neighbourhood on the same night.

### Gertrude Theledi Brings Charge Against Her Father

GETRUDE THELEDI IS A WELL-KNOWN RESIDENT OF LADY SELBORNE, PRETORIA. LAST THURSDAY SHE TOOK HER 50-YEAR-OLD FATHER TO COURT. HER FACE WAS FULL OF OLD SCARS.

Gertrude alleged that her father had assaulted her.

Her father, Ishmael Theledi, told the Magistrate: "Gertrude is a drunk."

He said that Gertrude was about 30 years old and unmarried.

"I am tired of providing for her, your worship," he said.

"She is a tsotsi. She gambles, drinks and smokes. She spends all her time with men in shebens. She is drunk all the time."

"Each time she brings a man home, it is a new man, and they are both dead drunk."

"My family and I have only one room to live in. Yet Gertrude brings her friends and wants me to provide a sleeping place for them."

"I have younger children to provide for. Gertrude is the cause of strife between my wife and myself."

"She often gets her own way out, because her mother sometimes sides with her."

"She exasperates me. I told her many times to get married and quit."

"When I told her this the other day, she insulted me and threatened to stab me."

Gertrude showed the magistrate a small cut on her finger. She said her father stabbed, kicked and beat her. Her father admitted that he

beat her, but denied kicking her.

He said that he wrenched a knife from her. She got the cut on the finger while they grappled for the knife.

Mr. A. van der Brink, the magistrate, told the father that his daughter was big and he had no right to beat her.

"You should not have taken the law into your hands," said the magistrate.

Theledi paid a £2 fine.

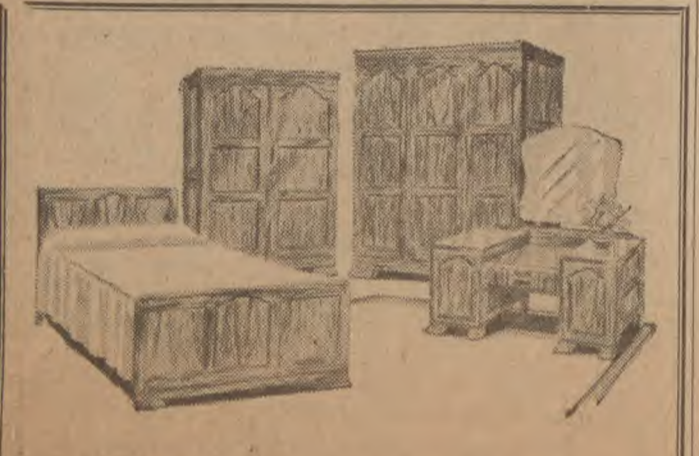

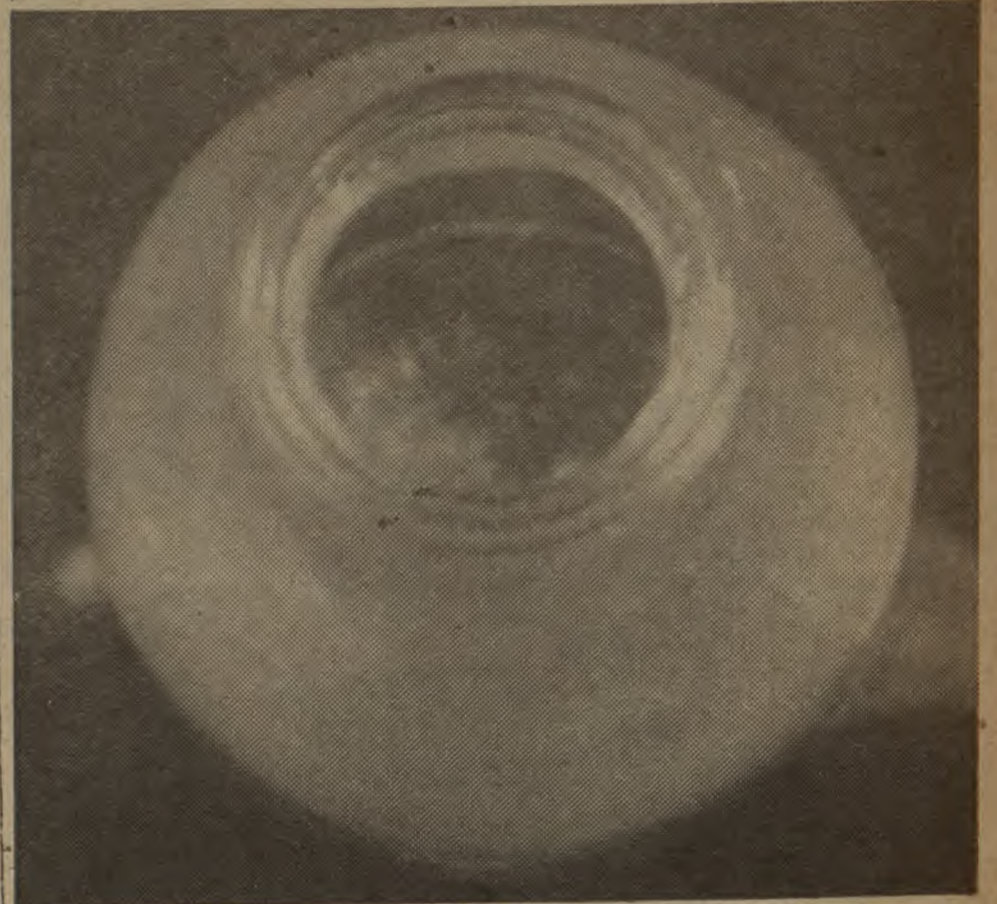

### Home Hints

Yellow soap, turpentine, and candle grease make a good floor polish. Grate half-a-bar of yellow soap and put into a moderate oven to dissolve. Melt 3 candles in a cup of turpentine. Mix this with the soap and stir well for 2 minutes. Pour into a tin to set.

Yellow soap and whitening mixed to a thick paste will stop a leak temporarily, until the plumber arrives.

On a windy day add a little salt to your starch to prevent its being blown out of the clothes as they dry. Salt added to the starch will also help when ironing. The iron will not stick.

### Look after your skin

The first step towards beauty is a clean, healthy skin. Here is a treatment that will help to give your face that lovely smooth, fresh look:

Clean the face well with a good toilet soap and water, lather the soap and massage well into the skin with a very soft tooth brush (kept specially for this purpose) or a man's shaving brush. Rinse first with very hot water, then with very cold. Your face will feel fresh and invigorated.

To keep the skin firm and prevent wrinkles, use an astringent after washing the face. Milk is a cheap and effective astringent. Soak a piece of cotton wool in cold milk and pat gently on to the skin. When it dries you will feel your skin tightening. Leave for a few minutes and rinse in warm water.

This treatment should be done when you wake up in the morning and before you go to bed at night.

To keep your skin soft and smooth, apply a good skin food to your face and neck, last thing at night, so that it can go to work while you sleep. There are many brands of skin food in the chemist shop, but you can also use liquid paraffin or olive oil as they are so pure and gentle on the skin. Put a little oil on the finger tips and apply to the skin in little upward strokes—remember always massage your face upwards, not downwards to avoid sagging skin and ugly wrinkles.

If you follow this treatment every day, not only will you but your friends will wonder at the secret of your new skin beauty.—E. G.

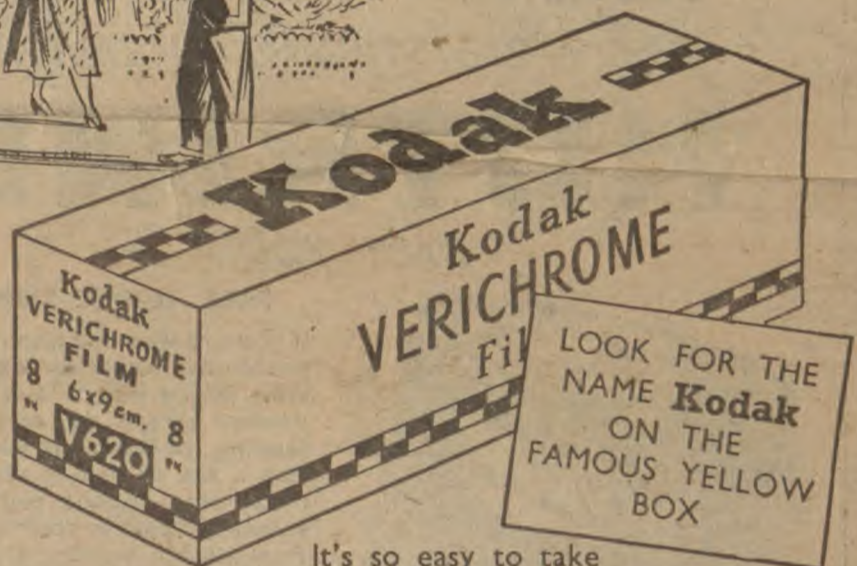

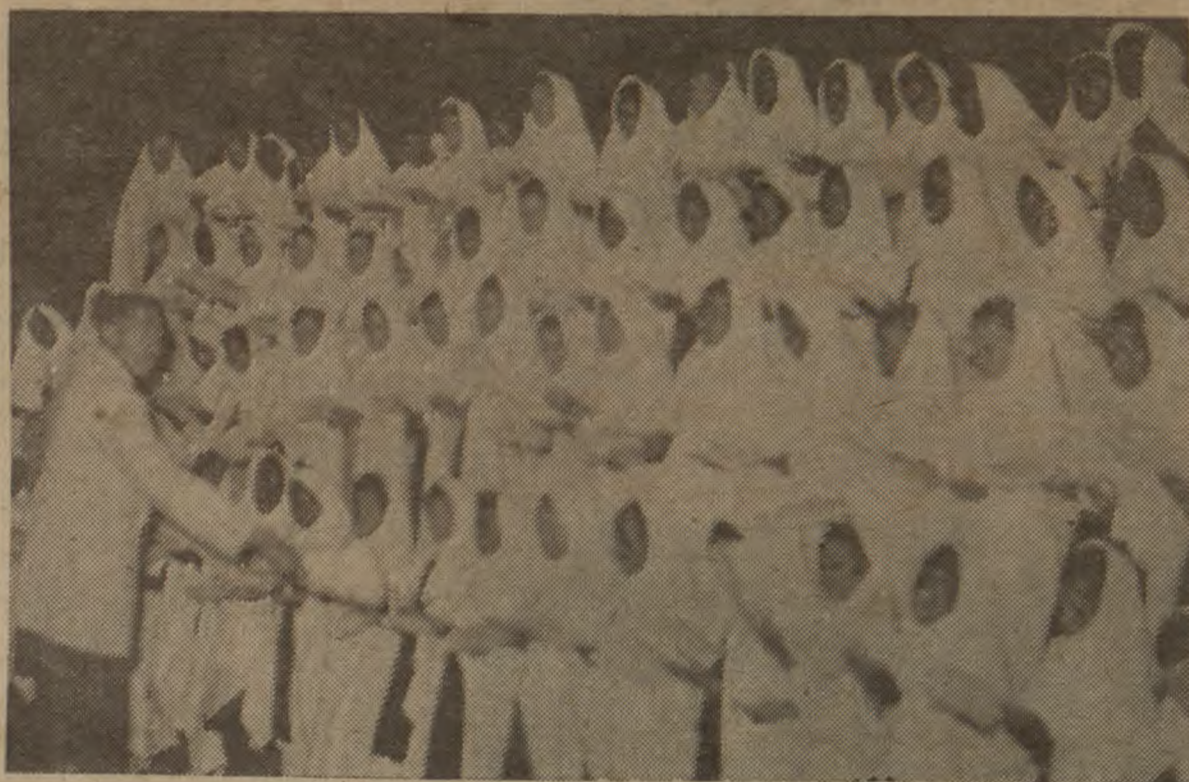

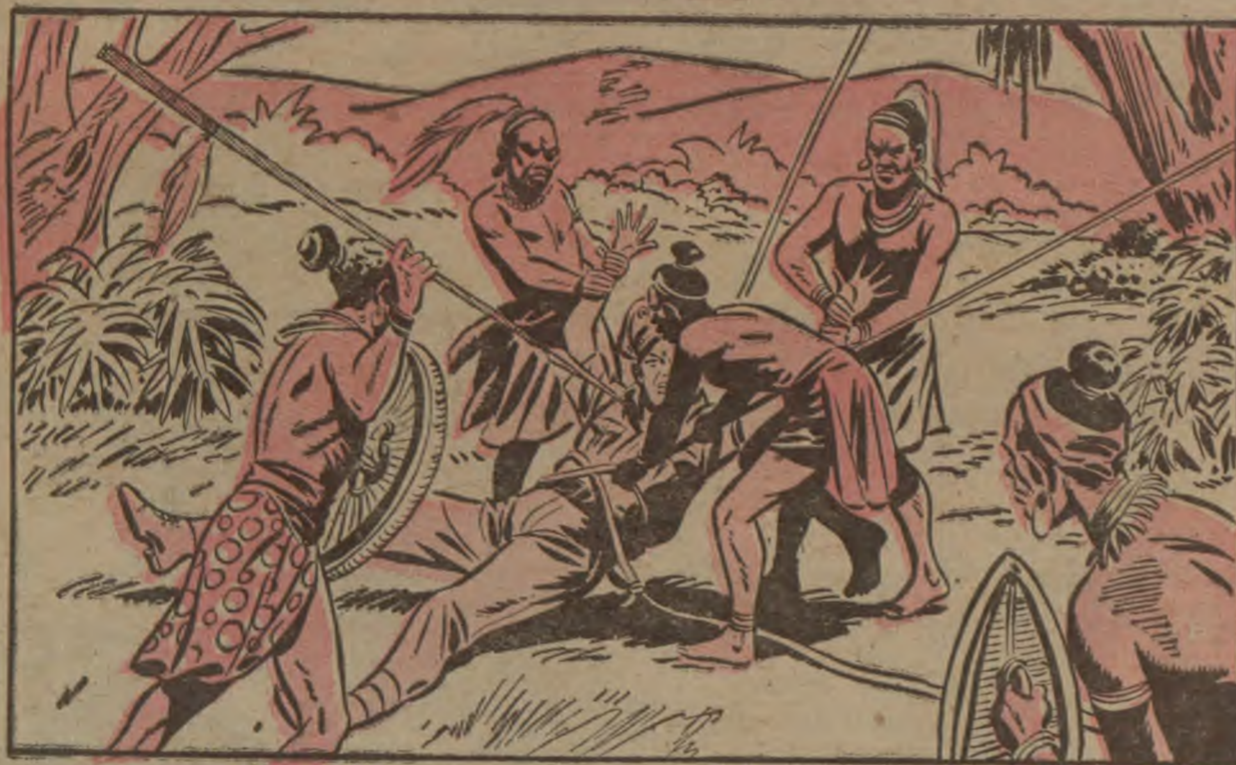

The Rex Meintjies T.B. Settlement is on the eastern side of the Jukskei River at Alexandra Township. It is named after a Chief Health Inspector for Alexandra and is today regarded as the "baby" of the Alexandra Tuberculosis Association.

It is a place of sunshine for T.B. patients who have come through the valley of the shadow.

They come to the Settlement to convalesce after their treatment at the Rietfontein and Baragwanath Hospitals, and usually stay four or five months. Most of them, when discharged, will go to live in the Alexandra Township, and they will then be looked after by the social workers. They will be regarded as part of the whole family.

The Settlement has 9 wards which take 10 patients each, and their health is in the care of the Sister-in-Charge, Mrs. Muriel T. Seperepere, who has 4 Nurse Aides and 4 Ward Aides to assist her. Everything is as spick and span as any hospital. Mr. H. J. K. Makgaleme-

le, formerly of the Johannesburg Native Pass Office staff, is the Superintendent in charge of the Settlement. He is an ex-T.B. sufferer himself and is doing all he can to develop the Settlement into a place that will have more accommodation for patients and their therapy training.

At present ward room space is taken up for therapy and for a dining room. The Settlement has plenty of ground, and Mr. Makgalemele hopes that funds will be provided for building special therapy and dining rooms; a large laundry, and septic tank drainage. He also feels there is a need to have a special building for children.

There are many other immediate needs. Mrs. Mavis Mhlambi, the Therapist, is greatly handicapped in her work through lack of materials. She would welcome gifts of leather and wood so that she can get the men working with it.

There is a great need too, for clothing, books, magazines, gramophone

records, and all types of equipment. They could do with two typewriters, and the men who much enjoy a game of golf in their leisure time, need more golf clubs.

They would also welcome a gift of pines or other tree plants for a border round the edge of the grounds.

The Meintjies T.B. Settlement at Alexandra was started in January 1953. There are at present about 75 men, women and children there, and the staff is usually those who have T.B. contacts.

After the Alexandra Group had collected about £500, it received a gift of money from Santa which permitted the Settlement being built. Some of the committee who helped to build the Settlement and are still active workers, are Mr. Bo Sibeko, Mr. A. B. Hlapo, Mr. Noge, Mr. T. Masekele, Mr. Nyamande, Mrs. H. O. Phahle, Mrs. Piliso and Mr. S. J. Mathebula.

So far the results have been very successful. The patients have regular

medical tests and injections from the hospital staff, and a doctor visits the Settlement once a week.

The patients have to take things easy and are allowed no hard physical labour. They are well fed; enjoy their therapy work and play indoor games, read and listen to music. Every one article in three they make is kept by them, or else they can have the money for it to buy themselves extra comforts.

There is a weekly service at the Settlement, and some of the patients are able to preach and lead a service.

A new causeway and bridge over the Jukskei River is now being constructed for a way to the Settlement, and the first five houses in a Red Cross scheme to help T.B. ex-Servicemen with housing will be built shortly on the ground adjoining the Settlement.

That is a brief story of the Godly work which is being well done by Africans to help their own people. Let us salute them. Let us help them.

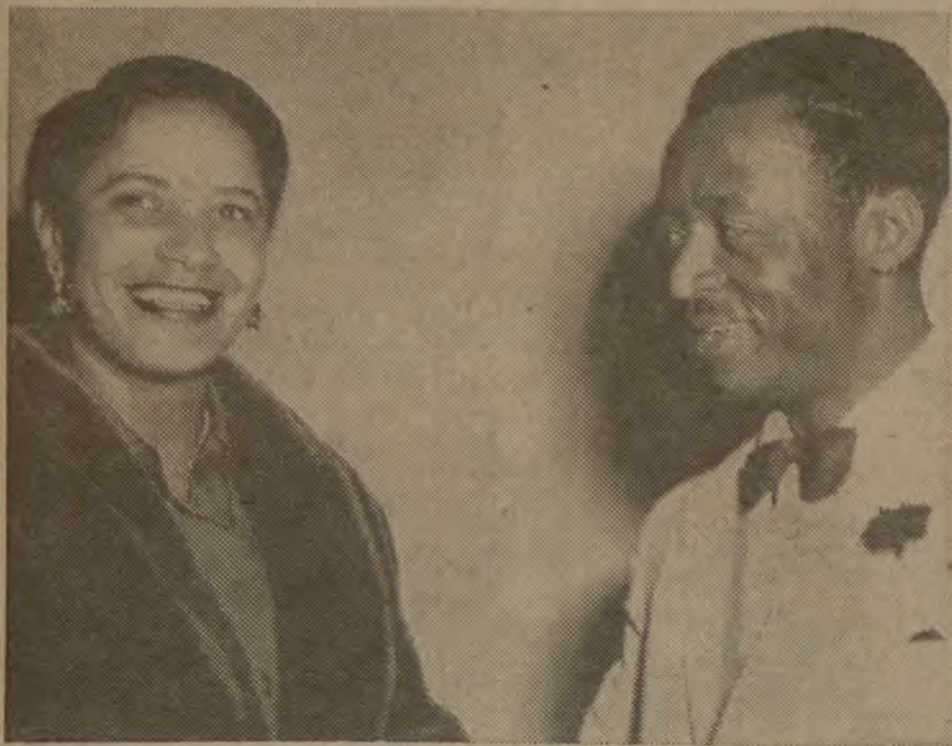

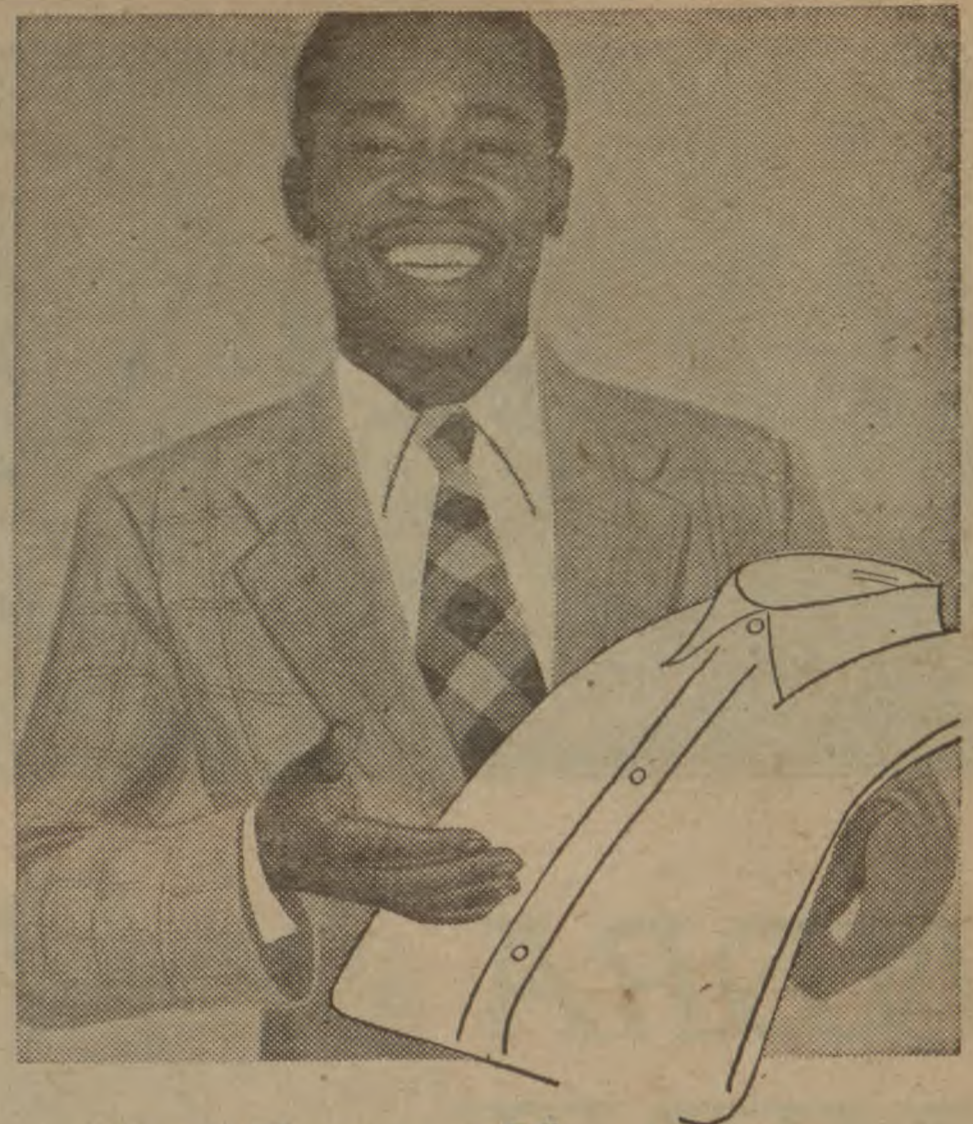

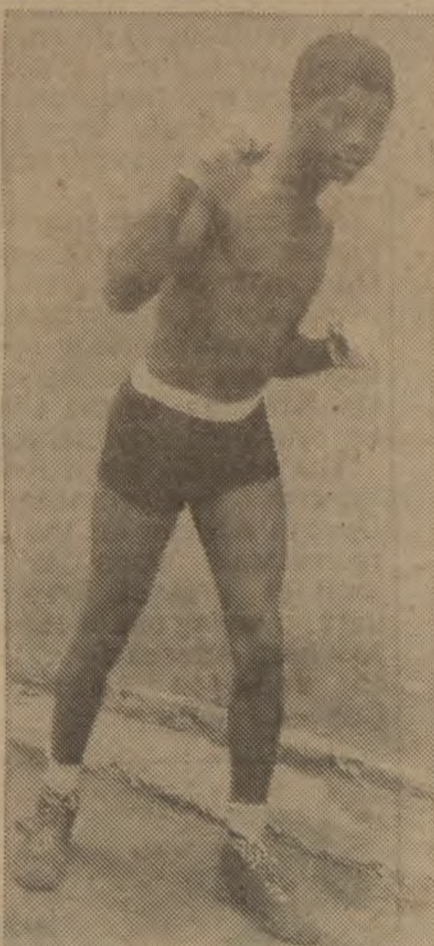

## MALITABA'S POSTBAG

If South Africa is our country, why do we pay tax?—**J.C. R. Groot Spelonken.**

There may be reason why one may question the paying of tax by Africans. The fact that South Africa is your country is not one of those reasons. In fact, it is those to whom the country really belongs who should be taxed.

Is it true that at St. John's hospital they cure eyes? How can I overcome reddish eyes? Is there a fee charged at the hospital?—**Enquirer, Benoni.**

St. John's hospital is an eye hospital. I advise you to go to the hospital for your eye trouble. I think it is free hospital.

What standard of education should I pass to become an interpreter?—**Micah, Custom-line, Springs.**

It is best to pass the Interpreters' Diploma course at Fort Hare which is taken after matriculation. Your local magistrate may recommend you, if he thinks you are able to do the work, even though you may hold lower qualifications.

Give me the address of the Y.M.C.A. Also tell me what standard one should pass to enter for the Health Inspectors' course or commerce.—**P. M. M., Messina.**

You will find a branch of the Y.M.C.A. in many centres. You may write to Mr. J. R. Rathebe, c/o B.M.S.C., Eloff Street Extension, Johannesburg. Matriculation is the entrance qualification for both courses.

I have an 18-year-old sister who left school when she was doing her Form II because of lack of money. She wants to take up nursing. What hospitals will take her in the Union?—**K. Sebela, Pimville.**

With her standard of education she can only take a nurse-aid course. She may apply to the Donald Fraser Hospital, Sibasa, or enter a Mine Hospital for a Mine Certificate. Apply to Crown Mines or the City Deep in Johannesburg.

I am a married man but my wife does not want to stay at my house. I have taken the matter to the Native Affairs Department three times. She still refuses. What should I do next?—**P. M. T., Onderstepoort.**

There must be some reason for your wife's refusal. Have you done everything to make her happy? If you can honestly say that you have done so, then it is your wife who is at fault and you must act accordingly.

I am unmarried and all my admirers are married men. How should I deal with this situation?—**"Worried," Ventersdorp.**

Ignore them.

I have a baby with a boy who stays in Johannesburg. Since the baby was born two months ago he has neither turned up nor sent money. His parents keep saying they are coming and never do. The boy has admitted the paternity of the child. What should I do?—**"Worried," Nigel.**

Your parents must insist that the boy maintains your baby. If the father refuses you may then report the matter to the Native Commissioner for your district.

I want to join the Rhodesian Railway Police. Where may I train? Secondly, can I have the right to go to Rhodesia?—**"Anxious to know."**

Send your application to the Officer-in-Charge, Rhodesia Railway Police, Salisbury. He will give you all particulars. There will be no objection if you go there for the purpose of work. If you want to emigrate then discuss the matter with the Native Commissioner of your district.

When I was young I was poor in singing. In the class I used to be told not to sing but keep quiet. When I got to a higher standard I was made to sing despite my disability. Now I am interested in singing. Where can I be trained?—**J. M., Johannesburg.**

There are many good choirs. Ask your minister to recommend one.

I am a widower. I am 25 years of age. I am employed by a Durban Hotel as switchboard operator and typist. Now I wish to get married again, either to a nurse or school teacher, of the ages between 18 and 21. How can I associate with any one of this type of girl?—**J. L., Durban.**

Surely you have some friends who would introduce you. Join a social club or a tennis club.

### Congratulations To Malitaba

I wish to extend my hearty congratulations to Malitaba on her success in handling so many complicated questions in such an efficient manner.

There is one outstanding aspect of her success: she has definitely succeeded in showing our people that some of the immoral actions they commit are not a credit to themselves and to the nations as a whole.

She has further instilled in the minds of many that observation is the basis of all knowledge.—**J. J. R. Mohlamme, Theunissen, O.F.S.**

There is a man who goes about telling people that I am dealing with his wife. And I am not. I want to take legal action against him. How should I go about it?—**"Anxious to know," Weltevreden.**

This is a case of damages. Before you take action make sure that the people to whom he has been talking will support you as witnesses. Otherwise there is no hope of such an action succeeding. Any action costs a lot of money. Why not first approach the man yourself and warn him.

Please advise me on the following point. I understand there are business sites allowed at Dube and Meadowlands. Are they only for the residents of these new townships?—**"Interested," Johannesburg.**

Yes. But where residents are unable to carry on the businesses, residents of other Johannesburg Municipal townships will be given consideration.

Would you kindly furnish information about learning "scouting" for grown-ups. I am interested and would be prepared to undergo training anywhere on the Reef.—**P. S., Springs.**

There is no such course. But you may write to Mr. J. R. Rathebe, B.M.S.C., Johannesburg.

I was born on the 16th August, 1930 and my wife on the 26th June 1933. On what days of the week were we born? I want to get a driving licence at Randfontein or Pretoria. Will I be allowed to drive a vehicle in Johannesburg?—**L. M., Orlando.**

You were born on a Saturday. Your wife was born on a Monday. If you take out a driver's licence at Randfontein or Pretoria you may drive in Johannesburg, or anywhere else.

I am employed by a cafe. I have served my employers for two years. Every damage I do I am made to pay for. Also the salary register does not reflect the amount we are paid per week. What should I do to bring this matter to the notice of the authorities.

—**K. J. S. M. L., Germiston.**  
Report the matter to the Pass Office in Germiston.

I am in love with a certain girl. Our friendship has lasted some time but she seems to be losing interest in me. I have written her three letters. She does not reply. I love her. I cannot afford to lose her. What should I do?—**M. S. N., Greenside Colliery.**

See her and talk the matter over but of course it's no use to try and force your love on her.

Can you supply me with the address of a store where I may obtain "View-Masters"?—**O. Ramanteba, Gaberones.**

Try one of the big chemists at Mafeking.

Where may I apply if I want to become a Traffic Inspector? What is the minimum qualification for that post?—**S. M., Sophiatown.**

The Traffic Department, Bree Street, Johannesburg. You must have the Junior Certificate standard at least.

I am still a scholar. One of our teachers borrowed a textbook which cost me 10/6d. When I ask for it now he gives a number of excuses.—**"Worried Scholar."**

It is likely that he has lost it but fears to say so. Ask him to buy you a new one. If he fails, take the matter to the principal of your school.

I am in love with a 23-year-old boy, now for 3 years. I am only 16 and have a baby by him. Now he wants to marry me. Should I marry him?—**E. D. M.**

But you must have your parents' consent as you are under age.

I am 18 years old. I'm doing my Form I. My father died in 1943 and my mother is too poor to afford my school fees. We have a big family for which she must also provide. I want to take up nursing. What should I do?—**Worried.**

Apply to the Donald Fraser Hospital, Private Bag, Sibasa. They may take you or training as nurse-aid. To enter a Nurses Training School recognised by the S.A. Council you must hold at least the Junior Certificate.

Where can I get a Book on Social and Cultural Science dealing with the organisation of sports and games for young and old and the general interests of the community at large? Social life this end is so dull and gloomy; the trouble being that there is no social worker or Welfare worker whose services are so urgently sought?—**"Vivacious," Johannesburg.**

Write to the Director, Jan Hofmeyr School of Social Work, Bantu Men's Social Centre, Johannesburg.

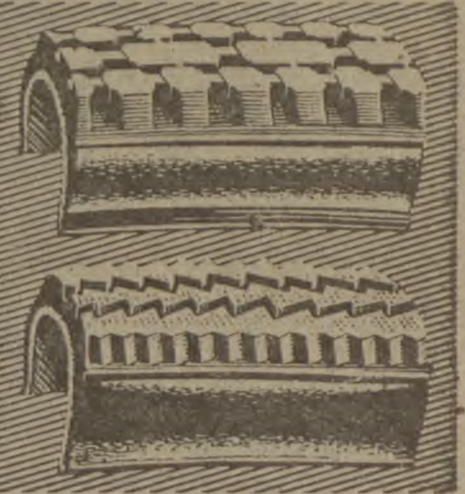
