"Further, multi-racialism implies the transfer of racial prejudices and antagonisms that obtain in the present society, to the future Africa we intend to

create.

"We do not regard South Africa as an island. We do not subscribe to the doctrine of South African exceptionalism.

"South Africa is an integral part of the African continent and its problems are interwoven with those of the rest of Africa."

## Glorious

Asked what the future of the European was in Africa, Mr Sobukwe said: "There is no future for the White man as an oppressor group but there is a wonderful and glorious future for indi-

viduals whatever their colour.

Many White organisations today are extremely anxious to make themselves acceptable to the African people. They will have to accept African nationalism.

"Our ultimate goal is an Africanist - Socialist democracy, with Africa united from Cape to Cairo and from Morocco to Madagascar.

"All territorial boundaries created by the imperialists must be dissolved," Mr Sobukwe said.

"We prefer starvation in freedom to opulence in bondage."
