I suggest you correspond with the Principal of the Transafrika Correspondence College, P.O. Box 3512, Johannesburg, and apply for an enrolment form. The fees for the National Junior Certificate are £12. 0. 0. cash or £14. 10. 0 by monthly instalments; and you may choose whichever method of payment suits you. Once you have paid the fees they guarantee to teach you until you pass your examination.

The advantage of the National Junior Certificate is that as a worker you can take three subjects at a time until you complete the course and it will be easier for you.

You should be able to pass in two years if you work hard enough.

re: Training of Health Inspectors.

I am in receipt of your letter dated 22nd April, 1952, and have pleasure in replying as follows to it:-

1. The Witwatersrand Technical College conducts part-time classes for the Certificate of the Royal Sanitary Institute. This course takes 3 years normally for students with J.C. and 2 years for those with matriculation. The fees for the three years are £6, £10 and £12 respectively, excluding books, board and lodging which must be provided by the students themselves.
2. The Union Government provides a 1 year course for Medical Aids at Springfield, Durban, primarily for government employees, although other students may be accepted.

The government employees do not pay any fees and receive a monthly salary instead during their training.

3. The address of the persons to whom application should be made are as follows:-

- (a) The Principal, Witwatersrand Technical College

- (b) The Secretary for Health, Locarno House,
Schoeman Street, Pretoria.

Dear Mr. Wright,

I write with reference to your letter dated 2nd December, 1952 in which you ask me to interview Mr. Ephraim Makhanya who has applied for the post of Library Assistant at Fort Hare.

Mr. Makhanya appears to be of a quiet unassuming personality. He would, I imagine, apply himself to work steadily and consistently. He has, as you may know, been taking his B.A. degree while employed at the University here. He has been allowed to attend lectures but has had to make up that time to the Library. This indicates a certain steadiness of purpose and a great deal of continued hard work over four years. He tells me that he attends the Methodist Church regularly every Sunday and at one time taught in Sunday School. He was also a Pathfinder Scout but had to give up for lack of time. He says he has had no serious illness.

I particularly asked him about his political sympathies. He is not a member of the African National Congress and he apparently does not feel strongly on matters which are engaging the attention of Congress members. He has not taken part in any work in connection with the Passive Resistance movement and considers that Black and White must co-operate.

His reason for applying for the job is that he sees no prospects in the University Library here as a librarian. He is at the top of his salary grade at the moment and sees

possible promotion for himself at Fort Hare.

He intends to take a diploma in librarianship.

From the interview I would say that he would do a good routine job and work effectively and co-operatively.
