Headline – Dramatic fall in Zimbabwe HIV infections – says a comparison of research projects, between 1998 and 2003 in the eastern province of Manicaland, shows that the prevalence of HIV infection has dropped steeply.

Writing in the US journal Science the research team, led by S Gregson from Imperial College London, show that the Aids virus does not show up as widespread as in some other sub Saharan young people.

Blood tests were taken 9, 454 people from 12 communities in the province. Findings – an overall fall, from 23% - 20. 5% HIV infection. Men aged $17 - 54 \ 19.5\%$ to 18. 2%. Women 15 - 54 25/9% to 22. 3%. On questioning those aged 17 - 19 years about sexual activity both male and female dropped 21 - 9%. Even the act of casual sex was reduced. For the male by 49% and the female by 22%.

The United Nations Global Fund that is fighting the HIV infection in Sub Saharan Africa has released figures that show that in 2003 the numbers of Adults and Children infected in a number of African countries. In Zimbabwe, the figure's reveal, that there are 1.6m adults and 120, 000 children infected by the Aids virus. – GDN page 27 C1 –

Headline – Bad luck continues to stalk Zambia's white farmers, hounded from Zimbabwe – only this time it is the consequence of their, and the countries economic success that are causing problems.

To take just one example, Brent Greatorex a second generation Zimbabwe white who left after being thrown of his farmland in 1/03, relocated to Chongwe 25 miles north of Lusaka to take over a 1,300 hectares abandoned dairy farm.

Through use of \$! m loans from the bank and the American Universal Leaf Tobacco company they were prepared to produce not insignificant harvests of maize, wheat and tobacco a year. All was well for just two seasons until the Zambian currency, the kwacha, became the currency to hold. Price comparisons between the two countries for the hire of labour and other services, cost of equipment all hit the profits. A farm labourer's day wage in Zimbabwe was \$0. 20, whilst in Chongwe \$2. 30.

As to the locations of other white farm owners, who were forced off their land? Mozambique is host to almost 100. They are mostly settled in Manica, Barue and Sussanundenga – all provinces along the border with Zimbabwe. They do not own the land; all is leased from Maputo. In all the farms employ 4, 000 labourers. Malawi is the home to 'dozens' despite the claim that "There is no land in Malawi" as claimed in an editorial in the Daily Times. Nigeria is host to 12+ who represent, according to the president, "what is good for Africa taken away." – GDN page 25 C1 –

Headline - *Mugabe invites whites to lease back land* - after years of disposing a minority community of the means of production there has had to be climbdown by the authorities in Harare.

As of this date the Commercial Farmers Union indicate that at least 200 white farmers have applied for 99 year leases, which will go some way towards hopefully lessening the dependence of the international community feeding many of the Zimbabwean people. As a consequence of the 4 years of widespread food shortages the economy has contracted by 40% and inflation has soured to 913%. - GDN page 19 C 5 -

Much of this inward investment comes from Chinese and Indian firms who can see potential profits after the Mugabe regime has ended. This is not to say that members of the ruling Zanu - PF are not able to take advantage of a situation that they themselves have not had some benefit from. Some of the largest farm estates -Kondozi where the white farmers have been evicted from - are mow in the hands of three cabinet ministers.

Other speculative profits have been made on property. Anticipating a rise in house prices, in the fullness of time, a top of the range home with four bedrooms, swimming pool and tennis court now costs \$160, 000, whereas a few years ago the same property sold for \$100, 000.- GDN page 21 C1 -

In recent weeks the government has rounded up 10, 000 homeless people in Harare and announced they will be sent to rural areas. Headline - *Mob attack Zimbabwe MP* - a group of members of the opposition Movement for Democratic Change, including one of the co founders - Trudy Stevenson, have been attacked as they travelled through Mabvuku township in the Harare North constituency.

There is some speculation that the attack was carried out by factions within the MDC who are not happy with seemingly inability of the Opposition to mount an effective counter leadership of Mugabe. So much of his song writing is enmeshed in the ideas of this that first he was jailed by Ian Smith, the Rhodesian leader, in 1970's, and now forced to flee the country by Mugabe. His crime calling on Zimbabweans to oppose the social and economic conditions through his rule.

Using his latest recording, **Rise UP**, released in 6/06, has been banned from the countries radio stations. This is in addition to the 1989 album **Corruption** that at first praised the new Mugabe regime, then records its decline.

At first, from his new home in the American state of Oregon his performances on the worlds stage were limited he was invited to open one leg of the Live8 in 2005. As appearing at a concert in Reading recently the British refused him a visa. "

Headline - *Tribunal lifts blanket ban on deportation of Zimbabwean* - following on from the judicial review ordered in 2005 (qv 5/8). As of this time the number of Zimbabweans affected by the decision is 7, 000.

However there are restrictions as to the nature of people that can be sent back to face the harshness if the Mugabe regime. It is the wish of this tribunal that, in the words of Mr Justice Hodge, 'claimants with links with the Zimbabwean opposition parties or with military or criminal records might be at greater danger of serious mistreating during interrogation' should not be sent back.

And thus ever downwards - Z\$100, 000 will become Z\$100.

This cosmetic massaging of the economy - 'From zero to hero - as the governor of Zimbabwe's central bank G Gono, calls it will do nothing for the rapidly rising inflation rate.

From the stated date the use of old style currency will not be allowed, hence the rush to the banks to deposit, in some cases substantial savings. However to be found in possession of as little as Z100m/£88 is a criminal offence which is likely to be seized by the police. To date police have confiscated Z\$700bn from 3, 200 nationals.

Exchange rates, Official US 1: 250, 000 Z. Black market US 1: 600, 000 Z. According to tales told, to take a bus ride costs Z600, 000. School fees of Z300m are difficult to pay when to caught travelling with more than Z100m is illegal. -

Obituary, Michael Hartnack 17. 10. 45 - 2. 8. 06 a chronicler of events as the then Rhodesia passed through the majority struggle for independence, the Zimbabwe Rhodesia period through to a fully independent Zimbabwe and events beyond 1980.

Born in what is now Zambia, within a family of journalists, he went to England in 1956 and attended Hastings grammar in Sussex. At the age of 18 worked at Cambridge Evening News . 1966, on his return to Rhodesia, he took up a position a court and municipal reporting on the Rhodesian Herald.

During his time there he battled, through his association with the Rhodesian Guild of Journalists, he battled with management - without success - to gain the same pay for black reporters as their white colleges received. In his position, as president of the journalists union between 1976 and 1980, he was able to produce reliable reports of the growing economic difficulties the country was facing during the dying days if the Smith regime.

In 2003, in recognition of his writings for many other publications in the region he was awarded a doctorate from South Africa's Rhodes University.

Headline - *Mugabe slated as 700, 000 stay homeless* - says the human rights organisation Amnesty International. The report states that the Harare authorities have only 3, 300 homes for those that lost their homes during the 2005 Operation Marumbatsvini in the capital Harare (qv).

This condemnation of the presidents promises, to rebuild the destroyed homes in Harare as well as Bulawayo, was also criticised by the outspoken Roman Catholic bishop of Zimbawe's second city. The report, from the solidarity Peace Trust, headed by P Ncube, indicated that a large segment of the population of the already severely disadvantaged had lost their possessions and their health during these times. - **GDN page 28 C 5** -

Headline - *Zimbabwean union chiefs tell of police beatings* - as they gather at a planned march to protest at the countries deteriorating economic system becomes more apparent.

At least 12, if not more, union leaders - officials of the Zimbabwean Trade Union

Congress - were hospitalised after the attention of police as they gathered in central Harare.

Among those injured, many with broken bones and bandaged heads were W Chibebe the ZTUC secretary general, who was beaten son badly that he remained unconscious from the afternoon of the attack - 13/9 - until 14/9 am. Despite his added injuries of fractures to his arm and his fingers he was not taken for medical treatment until 15/9.

Of those who appeared in court, which was inside the Harare hospital ward, were ZTUC officials were L Matombo president along with the union vice president L Matibenga. As to ongoing policy of detentions and torture of those opposed to the current regime the Human Rights Forum say that 69 cases of this type have been noted by them just for 7/06.

The chief selling point for these condoms, of both male and female type, will be through the 1,000 hairdressing salons where employees have been trained to be HIV aware.

PSI operatives feel that this chosen venue is ideal for such health awareness talks. In fact in 2005 more than 50% of all distributed female condoms were channelled through 700 beauty salons in low income areas.

Zimbabwe has one of the world's highest HIV rates, with 1:5 estimated to be infected. Of these 80% are unaware of their status. This PSI campaign aims to provide testing and counselling for 800, 000 people The demand for the female condom has risen by 240% since 2001. - GDN page 29 C1 -

Headline - *Gold and gems recovered in raids on illegal miners* - Police in Zimbabwe have arrested 16, 290 illegal miners in a series of raids across the country that began over a month ago it emerged yesterday. More than 3kg [6.6lb] of gold and 500 tons of gold ore, 4,876 diamonds and 20 emeralds were recovered, police spokesman Oliver Mandipaker told The Herald, a government newspaper.

Troops were recently called in to seal off Marange district to stop a 'diamond rush'after earth tremors and dry weather exposed a seam of diamonds. Under Zimbabwean law, precious metals are sold through a state controlled

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
