WENTWORTH COLLEGE

It has just been brought to my notice that Africans are somewhat worried about the Medical Course which is being given at Wentworth College. This unease seems to spring from a quotation used in the "South African Outlook" of August 1st, 1951, Page 117. The Minister of Education is quoted from Hansard as having said in the Assembly: "The course proposed for the Native medico in Natal is somewhat shorter because the need is so urgent. Their period of study is not as full as that laid down for Europeans in their medical schools. We anticipate that it will be a number of years - it may perhaps be ten or fifteen - before we can even think of placing full responsibility in the hands of the people we are training to-day at the University of Natal and for which provision is made".

I, myself, understand that the course is actually one year longer than the normal European medical course but I do think it would be desirable for you to issue some statement through the Bantu Press and to the "Outlook", reassuring African parents.


