

# SOBUKWE SERVICES PLANNED

## PAC leader to be remembered

COMMEMORATION services to mark the 14th anniversary of the death of Pan Africanist Congress leader, Mr Robert Mangaliso Sobukwe, will be held throughout the country from tomorrow until February 27.

The commemorations are organised by the Sobukwe Memorial National Commemoration Committee, which has invited speakers from the Zama (FF) and has already received messages of support from Colonel Moummar Gadhafi of Libya and the Organisation of African Unity (OAU).

A huge service is planned for February 27 — the day Mr Sobukwe died — when wreaths will be laid on his grave in Grand Bazaar and his grave itself.

Services will be held in Bloemfontein, Kimberley, Cape Town, Durban, East London, Port Elizabeth, Johannesburg, Port Elizabeth, Tzaneen and QwaQwa.

Venues where the commemorations will take place will be announced on Monday in the case of QwaQwa, East London and Tzaneen, the venues will be announced later because organisers claim organisations owning churches and stadiums have been intimidated.

Messages will be read on behalf of imprisoned Pan Africanist leader, Mr Zephania Mofokeng, many non-aligned nations of the world.

The organisers announced at a Press conference in Johannesburg yesterday that from

Monday to Saturday the nation should refer back to the noble ideals Mr Sobukwe lived and died for.

Artists will also be asked to dedicate their work this week in the memory of Mr Sobukwe.

The organisers said thousands of pamphlets to explain Mr Sobukwe's ideas had been printed and badges, T-shirts bearing Mr Sobukwe's picture with his famous raised palm would be given out.
