The Secretary reported that the South African Indian Congress Conference was scheduled to be held on the Plat, "2nd and 23rd September, 1956, at the Bharat Fall, Durhan.

The reports and other material for Conference would be handled by the SAIC officials and only the Presidential Report Addresses was to be undertaken by Dr.G.M.Naicker.

The Secretary reported on the recent Jt. Executive meeting and the SAIC Executive meeting held in Johannesburg on the 18th and 12th August, 1956.

Mr. Neicker said that many areas which are occupied by non-Europeans, such as Vrededrop, Westedene, Martindale, Sophia to partly and wholly have been declared European areas. The notices to vacatefrom these areas within one year in som cases and two years in others.

These proclamations were discussed at length at the meeting and it was flet that it should not go unchallenged. The proclamations could be challenged in the Courts on the ground of equity.

The Freedom Charter campaign for a million signatures was with about 16,000 signatures collected. It was also agreed that certain constitutent bodies which wishes to continue collecting signatures may do so.

The Suez Canal crisis was discussed and the SAIC was in sympathy with the Egyptian people and their legitimete struggle to nationalise the Canal. A press statement on the Suez Crisis end our eympathy is to be issued.

Mr. H. E. Mr. Mall gave details of the present position at Duffs Road and the Vigilance Committee suggested to their tuli and unflincting support and made the following suggestions:

- 1. That they should remain in possession of their properties as long as they could.
- 2. That they should employ every tactic to delay the exprepriation of their land.
- 3. That legal action should be taken to preserve their right of ownership.
